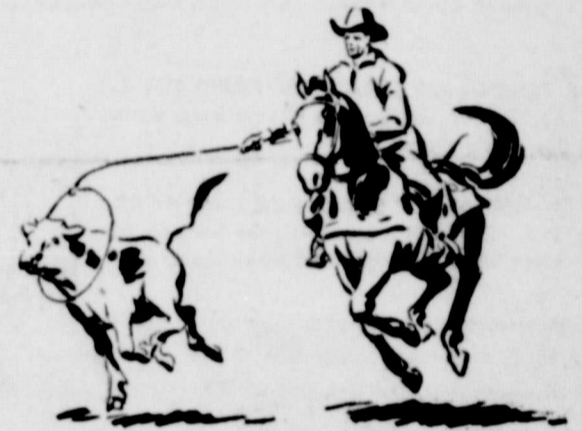

WHO WON THE STRIKE?

Who won the General Motors strike? Labor leaders claim a victory, having won an 18 1/2c raise per hour for its members. But statisticians figure that it will take the average GM worker over five years, with his extra pay, to replace the money lost during four months of striking. General Motors stockholders probably feel that they won a victory to the extent that the settlement was made at a cost of approximately one-half of the union's original demand. But unless prices of cars are increased to take care of increased labor costs, the stockholders are due for a major reduction in profits. Prices will be increased—but the bulge in the inflation line for John Q. Public will not be nearly as great as it would have been if General Motors had settled the strike months ago by giving in to labor's demands.

VICTORY GARDENS

During the war a lot of us in Hico who never went in for gardening before discovered that it was an interesting and profitable pastime. But as far as the food supply is concerned, the war hasn't ended yet. In fact, because of the necessity of feeding hungry war victims throughout the world, our domestic food supply is apt to be less this year. Thus the need for victory gardens is perhaps greater than ever before. We can assume that there will be more such gardens than before the war because of the large number of families who have learned to like gardening and are looking forward to having another garden this year. When making that decision of whether or not to have a garden, each American family should consider that it may mean the difference between life and death to a family in war-torn Europe.

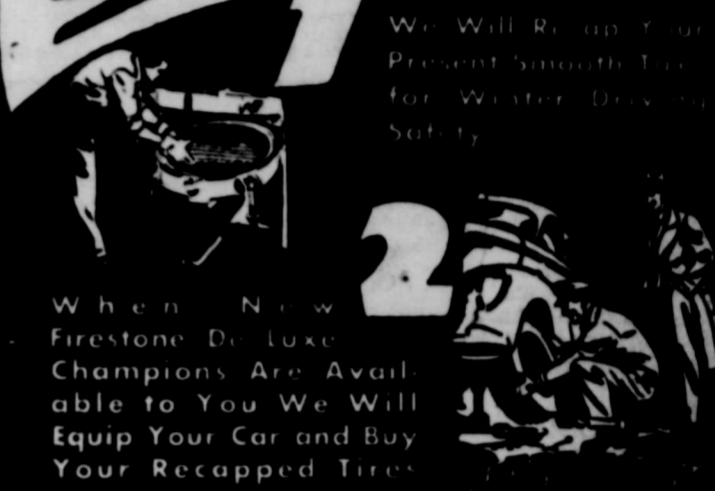

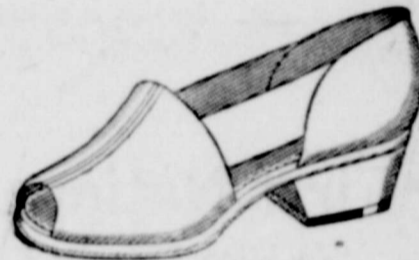

● According to a recent announcement by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, a reasonable extension of time will be granted to producers who for reasons beyond their control cannot fully comply with the new regulations by April 1, 1946.

"Farmers in some areas," says a communication from the Austin official, "report to us that they have been told they would have to construct Grade A barns in order to sell ungraded milk or cream. This is not true. The regulations for ungraded milk and cream have no connections with Grade A requirements."

We are assured that these new regulations are designed to put the farmer in the milk and cream business, rather than to put him out. Compliance is urged to insure clean, legal milk which will help not only farmers but the entire industry to solve problems faced now.

U. S. Air Force and Navy during the entire Italian campaign. The Base is commanded by Brigadier General Francis H. Oxx.

After arrival in Naples Port, Private Allen was transported to the 7th Replacement Depot for processing according to Army skill and civilian specialty. At the depot, he was provided with bed and mattress, adequate blankets and Post Exchange supplies in buildings of the "college" area in Bagnoli. Within 36 hours he boarded coach trains to Leghorn. Enroute here, the train stopped at Rome where a hot meal was served. At Grosseto, almost mid-way between Rome and Leghorn, coffee and doughnuts were provided in a railroad station club of the American Red Cross. Upon arrival at Leghorn, the soldier went to the 1st Staging Area to be transported to his assigned unit in the near vicinity.

Peninsular Base Section has a record of uninterrupted service in this theater extending over three years. Advance echelons arrived with combat units invading North Africa in November 1942. After ten months in support of the North African and Sicilian campaigns, selected personnel of these Army Service Force headquarters and units were organized into the present Base Section for movement to Italy. Again an advance echelon sailed with the invasion convoy, landing D plus 2 at Salerno.

PBS rehabilitated the ports of Naples, Anzio, Civitavecchio, Piombino and Leghorn in support of Fifth Army's drive up the Italian peninsula. PBS also played a major part in the mounting of the Southern France invasion.

Private Allen was a farmer before entering the Army on May 28, 1945. He took training at Fort Sam Houston, before coming overseas.

AIRBORNE INFANTRYMAN FROM HERE REENLISTS

Wayne H. Howie, 23, Hico, Tex., recently reenlisted through the U. S. Army Recruiting Office at Waco.

He is a veteran of 4 years and 11 months spent with the 1st Infantry Division, holds the Purple Heart, three battle stars, Pearl Harbor, Good Conduct and Victory medals. He was wounded in action in Belgium in 1944. Howie joined the Airborne Infantry for three years.

Sergeant Howie thus stated, according to Waco Station Commander Allison J. Dick: "I want to make the Army my career."

Undulant Fever Disease Transmitted Through Animals

Austin, Texas, March 25.—Undulant (Malta) Fever is a disease which is transmitted to human beings by infected animals. Individuals may acquire the disease (1) as the result of direct contact with infected animals or (2) following the use of raw dairy products obtained from infected dairy cows. If the disease is due to contact with infected animals or their waste products, the germ gains entrance to the human body through the skin, stated Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Persons who live on farms are more subject to undulant fever than those who live in cities. On farms the disease is more apt to affect men due to the fact that men come in contact with hogs and cows to a much greater extent than do farm women. Farmers have direct contact with animals during loading and unloading for market. The handling of infected cows or sows and of the young at time of birth represent hazardous types of contact. The danger of undulant fever may be reduced greatly by avoiding as much as possible all forms of direct contact with animals which may be infected. The wearing of heavy gloves if contact is unavoidable should aid in protecting the skin against exposure.

Urban residents have little or no occasion to come in direct contact with infected animals. Undulant fever acquired in city or town is due, as a rule, to the use of milk, cream, and butter which lack certain safeguards. Prevention of undulant fever, whether due to contact with infected animals or to ingestion of contaminated dairy products, is dependent to a further extent, upon the eradication of contagious abortion from farm animals.
