Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Russell this reck received official notification. in a letter from the War Depart ment, that their son, S/Sgt. John **Transact Business** Harold Russell, reported as miss ing in action for the past 18 nonths, must now be presumed to have lost his life in the service of his country.

Sergeant Russell, tail gunner on B-29 carrying cargo and personnel. "over the Hump" from India to China, was reported missing long with all other crew members pt. 3, 1944.

#### **Gay Fred Astaire Performs Most Colorful Dance**


