WHO IS SADDAM HUSSEIN? Before the events of the past couple of weeks, few Americans could have told you, unless they had paid strict attention to world politics.

Hussein, Iraq's strongman and architect of the recent invasion of small Kuwait, is the latest "bad guy" of world politics. He is vollying for a place alongside Hitler, Hirohito, Stalin, et al. Their recent eight-year war with Iran left Iraq bankrupt. It was said that Saddam, as he is known in the Middle East, borrowed \$60 billion to pay for his country's war expenses, and even that wasn't enough. The press reported that at a recent Arab conference, Saddam told his Arab neighbors that he needed to borrow another \$30 billion, "And if they don't give it to me, I'm going to take it from them." Kuwait had personally loaned Saddam \$15 billion for his country's debts, and Saddam wanted Kuwait to write off the debt. Saddam apparently felt as though Iraq's battle with Iran was partly on Kuwait's behalf. In addition, he felt like Kuwait was helping drive down the world price of oil by pumping more oil than it was allotted under quotas established by OPEC. The beginning of school schedule was announced this week by Hal M. Ratcliff, Superintendent of Schools for the Friona ISD.

Students who will be in kindergarten or first grade will have a very important orientation night on Thursday, August 23 at 7 p.m. in the Elementary Cafeteria. Room assignments will be made at this time.

For those K-1 students new to the district or who have not preenrolled, registration needs to be done at the Primary office any time during the day prior to August 27. All immunizations and records need to be completed by this time.

Many people, including those in the Middle East, see the Iraq-Kuwait issue as an Arab problem, and deplore the action by the United States in sending troops and equipment to Saudi Arabia.

However, a specialist on Iraqi politics said recently that if the outside world had failed to react to the Kuwait invasion, Saddam would take over Saudi Arabia's oil fields within 30 days.

Historians are quick to equate this scenario as resembling too closely Germany's power-play that led to World War II.

Saddam, meanwhile has been equated with Hitler, and even by a fellow Arab, who called him "as blood-thirsty as Hitler ever was."

When he took power in 1979, Saddam had 22 of his top rivals executed.

Last week, a Parmer County grand jury indicted Lumbrera on three counts of capital murder stemming from the deaths of three other children: Mellissa Lumbrera, three; Melinda Ann Garza, two; and Joanna Lumbrera, three In Corpus

The charges allege she killed the children for insurance money.

Two more of Lumbrera's children, 14-week-old Jose Lionel Garza and five-month-old Christopher Daniel Lumbrera, also died in her care, as did Erica Lenore Aleman, the six-week-old daughter of a cousin.

Grand juries in three Texas counties, Castro, Bailey and Lubbock, are investigating the other deaths.

With the exception of Jose Antonio Lumbrera, all the deaths occurred in Texas between 1976 and 1984.

Lumbrera, who had been free on a \$50,000 bond in the Garden City case, was arrested on the Texas warrants last Wednesday. She appeared without an attorney Monday remained and composed throughout the 25minute hearing.





Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are:

1. Learn and perform breast self examination every month. 2. Have a physical examination every year.

3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age.
