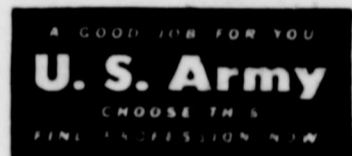

Highlights of Regular Army Enlistment

- Enlistments for 1 1/2, 2 or 3 years. (One-year enlistments permitted for men now in the Army with 6 or more months of service.)
- Enlistment age from 18 to 34 years inclusive (17 with parents' consent) except for men now in Army, who may enlist at any age, and former service men depending on length of service.
- A reenlistment bonus of \$50 for each year of active service since such bonus was last paid, or since last entry into service, provided reenlistment is within 90 days after last honorable discharge.
- Up to 90 days' reenlistment furlough with pay, depending on length of service, with prescribed travel allowance paid to home and return, for men now in the Army who reenlist.
- Consult your Army Recruiting Officer for other furlough privileges.
- Mustering-out pay (based upon length of service) to all men who are discharged to enlist or reenlist.
- Option to retire at half pay for the rest of your life after 20 years' service—increasing to three-quarters pay after 30 years' service. (Retirement income in grade of Master or First Sergeant up to \$185.63 per month for life.) All previous active federal military service counts toward retirement.
- Benefits under the GI Bill of Rights assured for men who enlist on or before October 5, 1946.
- Choice of branch of service and overseas theater (of those still open) on 3-year enlistments.

Earl Huddleston Has Final Word For Voters of Hico

In offering for State Representative I do not feel that it is necessary for me to tell you much about myself because most of you know me and have observed the kind of service which I have rendered as your Representative. Here are a few things I have tried to accomplish, with your help.

I have worked and voted for all legislation which I felt would aid Agriculture, including Soil Conservation, Research for new uses of Cotton and Other Farm Products. I helped defeat a bill in the last session of The Legislature which if passed would have taken away the 4 cent gas refund tax now allowed farmers who use tractors for farm use.

I favor The Legislature making the proper provisions for strengthening our Law Enforcement Work in Texas so that the mounting crime wave in Texas can be checked.

I have had a small part in getting our state on a cash basis. We now have over Thirty Million Dollars in the State Treasury. I do not think we will need any new taxes the next two years unless some unknown emergency arises.

I want each of you to take this as a personal solicitation because it has been impossible to see each person in my district. I assure each of you that your support will be appreciated and that I will continue to give my best in serving you and my district the next two years. (Pol. Adv.)

The Hamilton County Democratic Chairman ruled that Mrs. Headrick's application and fee for a place on the ticket failed to reach him before the deadline, although other chairmen of the district accepted fillings post-marked identically, before midnight, May 20, as she had been authoritatively advised would be acceptable. Under these conditions Mrs. Headrick has no other course than to ask the citizens of Hamilton County for a write-in vote.

"With full confidence in the fairness of the people of Hamilton County," she states, "I submit my claim to them and shall abide by their decision in the usual Democratic manner."

Her views and platform follow: The last few years have made news of tremendous import to women. News which changed their lives, opened new doors to them and gave them a view of future fields of opportunity. Women entered into almost every kind of occupation from rivet driver and sheet metal worker to airplane pilots, formerly considered the province of men. Executive and professional fields found them alert and efficient. No one will deny that they did a good job. Thus women have proven that service and privilege in the field of good government is neither of masculine nor feminine gender.

When I announced as a candidate for Congress, I did so after prayerful and careful consideration. It has taken much courage to put in action my better impulses, straightforward and unafraid. My platform is simple. In the laying of its foundation, the words of an old adage came to my mind: "Prepare thy work without, and make it fit for thyself in the field; and afterward build thine house." The intelligent voter will consider more about what the candidate will be required to do as an official than what he or she says in order to win votes. Worthiness for office and fitness can be determined more largely by the record of past years of service than by any promise or pledge made during a campaign.

EDUCATION There are many serious problems before our American democracy. The problems of education are of particular importance, and should be of vital concern to every citizen and every home. I heartily favor Senate Bill 181, which provides for Federal Aid to schools, with such funds under state control.

THE VETERAN To those boys who served in our armed forces we owe a debt of gratitude we cannot repay, but we can meet their problems fairly and justly, endeavoring to compensate them for the time lost by their years in military service. I favor legislation to strengthen the GI Bill of Rights to give more efficient and greater assistance in providing homes and in making up lost educational opportunities. More flexible insurance benefits should be extended and greatly improved.

AGRICULTURE Issues of far reaching importance and concern to the farmer and stockman are pressing hard for solution. I am familiar with the problems which confront these industries, having lived for over twenty years on a West Texas farm. I recognize the need of better farm to market roads and the need for the expansion of the rural electrification program. I shall insist on Federal Aid to assist the farmer and rancher in which have been so destructive to livestock, and for the eradication of certain weeds which threaten to possess our farm lands in many sections of the district.

OLD AGE PENSIONS Experience is a good teacher. I say with no hesitancy that no candidate in this race for Congress has had more experience with old age groups than have I. I am serving my fourth year as a member of the board of directors of a home for the aged. Out of the conviction that we should stop a dolle which we grant to the needy. I believe in an old age pension as a matter of right—something we earn in our productive years by our contributions to

the upbuilding of the community. I shall do my best to see that just principles are embodied in our pension laws. We have had far too much political hypocrisy in connection with this issue in recent years.

LABOR AND INDUSTRY Strikes and labor disputes are today the most disturbing issues in our national life. America stands on the brink of economic disaster. Once we thought it could not happen here. Regardless of the justice or injustice of individual strikes, when the welfare of our nation itself is threatened, we must call a halt. When collective bargaining fails in such cases, I favor compulsory arbitration by a government agency responsible to the people. Though we may disagree as to the remedy for these ills, we are all agreed on our aspirations for our country. All of us aspire to establish social and economic justice and to maintain equality of opportunity. Stabilization of the relationship between labor and industry must be established and maintained. American institutions, traditions and ideals depend upon this.

In 1940 I received an appointment from the U. S. Department of Commerce as assistant supervisor of the 17th district for the Bureau of Census. I traveled over ten thousand miles over the district in this capacity. It was truly a fact-finding job. During the business census I came to know the problems which confront the business man both large and small, as well as the problem of the farmer and stockman. The growth and welfare of our district must be aided and encouraged by a courageous voice in Congress. I purpose to work with our business leaders in the removal of discriminations against the South-west, and with our public officials and other groups who seek advice and assistance from Federal agencies. My compelling desire is to represent and serve all of the people of the 17th Congressional District in every attempt in making our district a better place in which to live.

S. J. R. No. 5

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization of the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows:

"The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary, not to exceed

Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1946, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE"; and
"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election. (19-4tc)

H. J. R. No. 19
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
 proposing an amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said Fund from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the

compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid.

"(b). Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the

Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, (being the 5th day thereof) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to Provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch one of

waid clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.
