WELL FOR FRIONA MUNICIPAL WATER SYSTEM STARTED THIS WEEK TO BE FINISHED SOON

During the past week some progress has been made toward getting the municipal water system into process of construction.

J. A. McDade, of Amarillo, arrived here last Friday with his well drilling outfit and at once put the rig into operation, with the result that water was reached some time during the day Tuesday, when the drill bit had reached a depth of 165 feet.

It was found, however, that the quantity of water reached at that time was not nearly sufficient to supply the demands of the pump that is to be installed, and drilling was resumed again Thursday in an effort to reach a sufficient supply of water at a greater depth, and if necessary Mr. McDade proposes to reach a depth of 200 feet in search of a sufficient supply before abandoning the well.

It is indeed hoped that a bountiful supply will be reached at the location in order to avert the labor and expense of drilling another hole.

MORE ROOMS NEEDED

The demand for living quarters in either furnished or unfurnished rooms, small houses, etc., continues unabated. Although there are more houses being built and more rooms the demand increases faster than the supply and almost daily the Star receives inquiries for rooms or houses.

It is true the gas pipe gang which recently passed through Friona caused a great demand for rooms and many of them were accommodated by citizens opening their homes to them for sleeping quarters, while they were able to get meals at other places, but the demand for rooms for those coming here to live seems even greater than the supply.

A splendid suggestion has been made by one of our citizens regarding shade trees along Friona streets and in the yards. This suggestion is from J. M. This will give a better outlet to a number of farmers living in that part of the Friona territory for reaching town and will probably take a few miles from some of the school trucks.

This is a good move as Friona needs more highways leading into it for the benefit of our people, and there are several others needed which will probably be opened up before many months.

James P. Wilson reports the sale of his farm a few miles west of town to Oscar Pope, the deal having been made Tuesday.

Mr. Wilson says his plans are to come to Friona and build a modern home where he will live and devote his attention to exclusive wheat farming. BETTER HOMES MOVEMENT IN FRIONA

A few weeks ago the Star carried an article pertaining to the Better Homes for Friona, a movement that is being sponsored by the Friona Woman's Club, in accordance with the plans and regulations of the Better Homes in America organization, and Mrs. J. C. Wilkison has been appointed as chairman of the local campaign.

As was stated, the Better Homes in America is a non-commercial, educational organization which has for its object the improvement of home-making conditions throughout the country and looking toward a more wholesome type of homes and family life.

A man or woman who is active in civic affairs and interested in the general well being of his town or community is appointed as chairman of the Better Homes Committee and this chairman in turn appoints a committee of dependable men or women to conduct the campaign. These campaigns vary in size and extent and fervor, according to the size or enthusiasm of the people of the community and may include programs, lectures, pageants and contests as the committee may decide. Some times a house is planned and built or a suitable one borrowed to be used as a sample or demonstration for the benefits of the contestants in the case of a contest, or as a mere example for those who are striving for better homes, but who may not have entered the contest.

In this manner families of moderate means are encouraged to show home ownership and are shown how they may be able to plan a suitable and pretty home within their means. Through such demonstrations also prospective home owners may receive valuable suggestions for planning, building or equipping their new homes. From such homes they also receive a fair idea of the standards of good taste combined with economy.

There are families who wish to have the very best possible information on home improvement, remodeling, reconditioning and making necessary replacements. Do Friona homes meet the necessary requirements for the present high standards of living? Are unkept home surroundings being replaced by attractive home surroundings? Nearly 6000 communities entered the contests with the result of some kind of home improvement which added comfort, convenience and beauty to the homes.

INTEREST IN SCHOOL BUILDING

Considerable interest in the plans for providing more much-needed school room seems to be gaining in the minds of our people.

Some believe that for the present it is better to build more small buildings to house certain departments of the school for another year at least, while others take the view that a new and a larger building must eventually be erected and that at no distant future, since the enrollment is growing so rapidly.

The people holding the latter view favor the issuance of bonds for the purpose of erecting one substantial and permanent building large enough to take care of the needs of the district for many years to come, and to do so at once, rather than to invest any more funds in the smaller buildings.

A kind of straw vote on the proposition is being taken by circulating a paper headed with both propositions and allowing each person to sign for the proposition of his choice.

such purposes, there is no reason why every home within its limits should not be entered in this contest in some form or other and thus improve the general appearance of the city by growing trees, shrubbery, flowers and beautiful green lawns the coming season.

It seems the proper thing to join the contest, but whether one does or not, one should use every reasonable effort to beautify the home just for the pleasure and satisfaction to be derived from the beauty and pardonable pride one may have personally, aside from the fact that such effort has added to the beauty of the town.

While doing this to add beauty to the grounds, it is advisable to add a fresh coat of attractive paint to the home, the fences and out-buildings. There are few things that create a more pleasing effect to buildings and fences than paint and aside from its beauty the preservative properties of the paint are worth the labor and cost.

Not only the homes but the business buildings can be beautified by an occasional coat of paint and the business section of towns are more frequently visited by strangers than are the residential sections and first impressions made on visitors are the most lasting. For this reason it is well for merchants, bankers and shop men to keep their buildings neatly painted.

"CATERPILLAR" TRACTOR COMBINE SCHOOL

A comprehensive program has been arranged for the "Caterpillar" tractor and "Caterpillar" (Holt) combine school to be staged at Plainville February 24, 25 and 26. According to the local representative, Fullwell Bros., of the West Texas Tractor and Machinery Co., dealers of these lines and sponsoring this school, the first day is to be devoted to agriculture. You will note in connection with their first day they will have as one subject Killefer Tillage. A talk is to be made on this wheat land chiseling with the Killefer System by W. M. Hansman of Oklahoma City, a representative of the California factory of the Killefer Corporation, building the machines. We are also advised that Dean A. D. Leflugh will make a talk on West Texas agriculture in the afternoon. These talks will fit into the regular program which is composed of mechanical lectures and moving pictures of an educational nature in power farming. The last two days of the school are to be devoted to a large extent along an educational line for the benefit of county commissioners, their operators and both tractors and graders, contractors, and to a certain extent also this program will be of interest to farmers.

The building committee met on last Thursday night and adopted plans for the new Methodist church building. It is to be a three-story brick building, containing fourteen rooms besides the auditorium. The auditorium, including the balcony will seat about 500 people and the general dimensions will be 42 by 74 feet and the cost will be between \$12,000 and \$14,000.

The work on the basement is progressing rapidly, and we appreciate the labor as well as the money that has been donated.

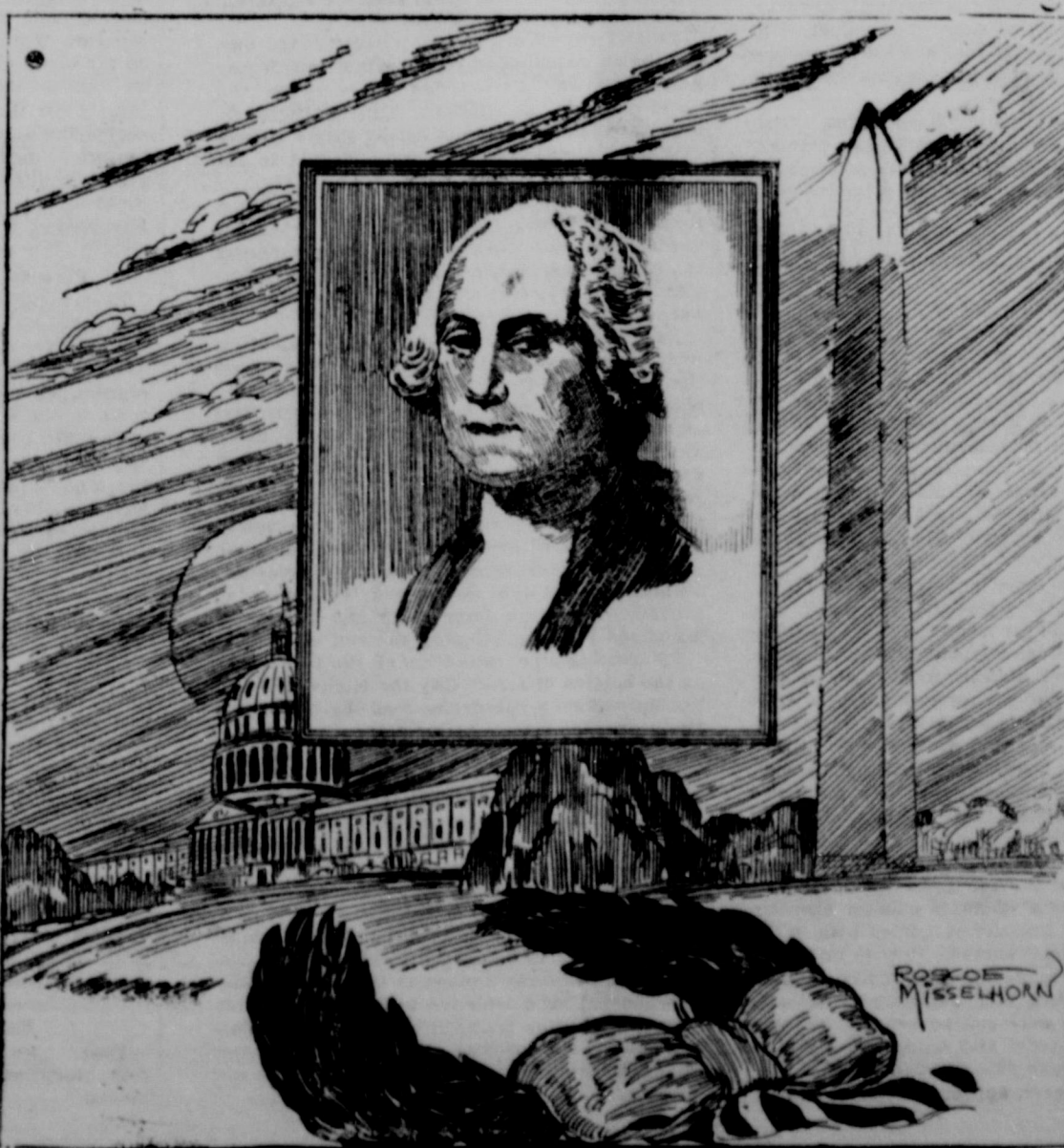

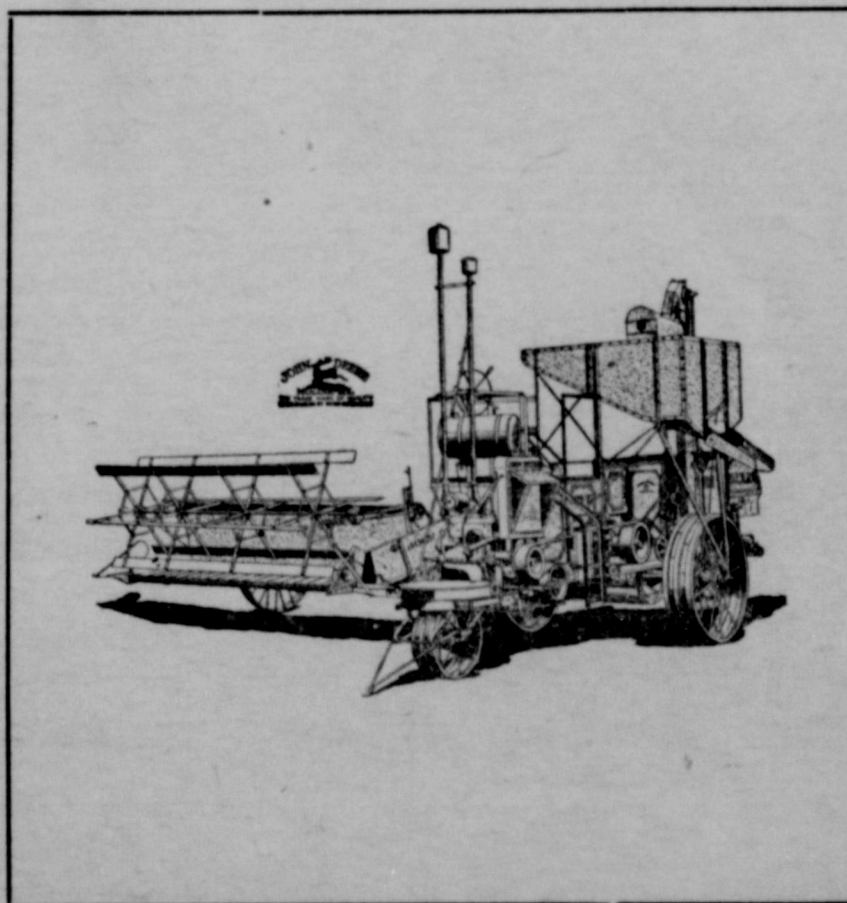

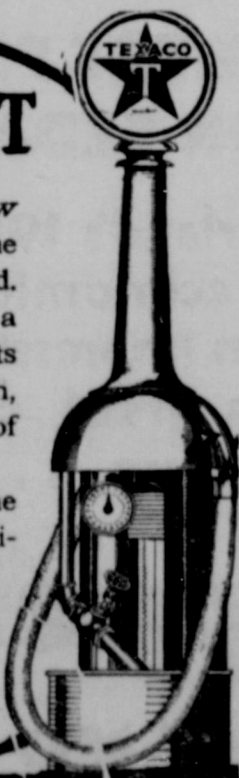

More Lambs If Ewes Well Fed

Extra Ration in Breeding Season Is Treatment in Big Favor.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Not only has science been able to make two blades of grass grow where but one grew before, but it is now able to induce ewes to drop a larger number of twin lambs. Extra feed at the breeding season is the treatment that produces the additional lambs.

This statement comes from the United States Department of Agriculture, whose sheep specialists have been at work on the problem for the past twelve years. The results of their work show that liberal feeding just before and during the breeding season, commonly known as "flushing," has given a larger number of twins. While the percentage of increase has varied from year to year, the average has been more than 16 lambs per 100 ewes for the flushed ewes than for lots which did not receive this extra feed.

Supplementary Feed.

A study has been made of the comparative value of a supplementary grain ration and of extra-quality pasture for furnishing this extra feed. Very little difference was found in the lambing percentages of ewes flushed by these two methods. However, it is usually cheaper to supply the additional feed in the form of extra-quality pasture.

"The pasture should be sufficiently luxuriant to cause the ewes to gain rapidly. Seasons sometimes occur, however, in which pastures are too short for this purpose. In such seasons it is advisable for farmers to give the flock a supplementary grain allowance of from one-half to one and one-half pounds per head daily, the amount depending upon the size of the sheep and the amount and quality of the green feed available.

Mixed Grain Ration.

"A mixed grain ration consisting of equal parts by weight of corn and oats has been found a satisfactory ration for this purpose. Forage crops, such as soy beans, cowpeas, sweet clover, and alfalfa, in sections where they can safely be used for pasture, makes satisfactory pasture crops on which to flush ewes. Blue grass pasture is also excellent. Although ewes gain readily on young, tender clover, much difficulty has been experienced in getting them to breed while on this type of pasture."

Spraying Thoroughly Is Best Plan for Insects

The time for spraying the orchards will soon be here. In fact, spraying can be done at any time now when the weather is suitable. It is well to emphasize the importance of doing this work thoroughly. A few branches missed here and there may have enough scale on them to reinfest the entire tree before the next season is over. Use a fine spray and do a good job.

A spray that develops a strong pressure is essential. Either lime sulphur or the miscible oils, properly applied, should be used for scale insects, which are becoming more numerous. It is reported that San Jose scale, which at one time was well under control, is now menacing our orchards and bringing about a situation that requires prompt attention.

Look over the fruit trees and get the spraying done before growth starts in the spring.

Custom Grinding May Be Best in Some Instances

Experiments at Iowa State college lead to the conclusion that the farmer who needs only one or two hundred bushels ground annually should have it done at a custom mill if within reasonable hauling distance. Where more than four hundred bushels are needed per year, the farmer can well afford to own his own equipment and do the grinding work on his farm. Home grinding costs about one-half that of custom grinding when more than seven hundred bushels are ground per year. A small electric grinder will operate from 25 to 35 per cent cheaper than large equipment, especially when arranged for automatic or semiautomatic operation. It is cheaper to operate, a smaller transformer can be used with much decreased core loss, and it gives an improved load factor and better diversified load.

Egg Quality Important in Sending to Market

Some hens consistently lay a higher quality of eggs than others. That is the conclusion of Prof. W. C. Thompson of the New Jersey Agriculture college at New Brunswick, N. J.

Hens were selected that produced from 190 to 200 eggs per bird during the year. Yet the price received for the eggs from different hens during the year varied from \$5.05 to \$8.74 per bird. This was due to the fact that some hens laid eggs of which over 90 per cent were extra quality while others laid a high percentage of small eggs. The time will come when markets will compel us to take into account the value of the eggs produced as well as the numbers in selecting our poultry breeding stock, just as the dairyman has already learned to take into account the test along with the weight of the milk produced by different cows.

Advantage in Favor of Spraying Potato

Found More Efficient in Control of Diseases

For several seasons past experiments have been under way on the grounds of the New York State Agricultural Experiment station at Geneva to test the relative efficiency of a copper-lime dust and liquid bordeaux spray, which contains much the same ingredients as the dust mixture, for the control of insect pests and diseases of potatoes, particularly potato blight. The results of the tests show a decided advantage in favor of spraying over dusting.

In each of the four experiments, the spray gave much the better results, as shown both by the appearance of the foliage and by the yield of marketable tubers. Both early blight and late blight were controlled fairly well by dusting, but considerably better by spraying. For the control of tipburn or hopperburn, caused by leafhoppers, the dust proved almost valueless, while the spray showed high efficiency. Since neither flea beetles nor Colorado potato beetles were important factors in any of the experiments, no data on the control of these insects were obtained.

Notwithstanding the lesser efficiency of the dust, its use may be advisable under certain conditions, for example, where water is difficult to obtain and in small fields where it is necessary to use hand machines.

Winter Sun Scald Quite Troublesome in Orchards

"Southwest" injury (sometimes called winter sun scald) is quite troublesome in many apple and cherry orchards last winter. This injury is said to occur late in the winter and results in a splitting of the bark down the southwest side of the trunk. The trouble can be prevented by shading the trunk during the winter. There are many ways of doing this, such as, low-hanging branches, wrapping the trunk, leaning a board against the southwest side of the trunk. Some authorities recommend whitewashing the trunk. When the sun shines on the trunk of a fruit tree on a clear winter afternoon it warms the bark and the part just underneath, and possibly causes a rise of sap. Then, when the sun sinks below the horizon the warmed portion of the tree trunk turns cold very suddenly and the bark freezes and splits. Thus one can readily understand why shading the trunk from the direct rays of the winter sun is a preventative.

Eradication of Onions From Cultivated Land

The eradication of wild onions from cultivated land is a slow process, and can be accomplished only by the regular and systematic rotation of crops and the thoroughly clean cultivation whenever such crops as corn and soy beans come on the land in rotation. Late fall plowing by which the roots are exposed to freezing is also an essential means of eradication.

Wild onion is a pest in wheat fields, for the seed, or bulblets, are about the same size and weight of a grain of wheat, and it is impossible to clean them out in threshing even with the best sieves and fans. But if infested grain is kept for several months and subjected to cold, the onion seed dries and shrivel, becoming light enough to be fanned out with a good machine.

Thorough Cleaning Out Is Poultry House Need

The chicken house should be thoroughly cleaned out and the floor, walls, ceiling and fixtures thoroughly drenched with some powerful disinfectant at least twice a year, preferably the early spring and in the fall. A 3 per cent solution of a coal tar stock dip will serve. The litter kept in the house should be removed and replaced with fresh whenever it becomes so broken up that grain thrown out to the birds does not disappear so that the birds have to search it out to find it.

Spain Becoming Alive to Value of Schools

No less than 6,800 new schools have been created by the Spanish dictatorship since 1924. Gen. Primo de Rivera proposed to create 1,000 schools every year. At first the villages and towns most in need of schools showed little enthusiasm and municipalities were remiss in sending in petitions to meet their requirements. Persistent governmental propaganda, however, has had its effects, and for the last two years demands for schools have exceeded the quota provided for in the budget. Thus it would appear that an appetite for education is being roused—one of the healthiest signs the Spanish nation has shown in years. Also girls are waking up to the possibilities of self-earned independence. Prior to 1916 there were no female students at Madrid university, but in that year 69 girls took examinations in philosophy, sciences and pharmacy. Six years later the number was 363. Today more than 25,000 woman students are matriculated in Spanish universities. The first woman doctor appeared in Madrid in 1917. There are 92 today.

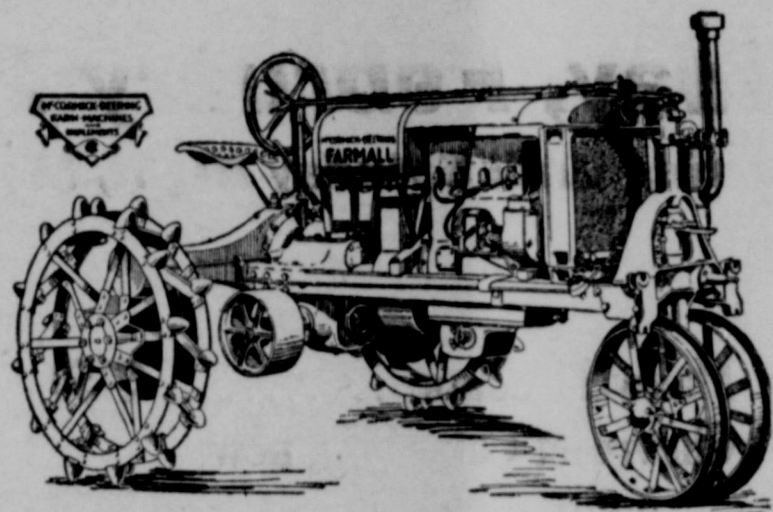

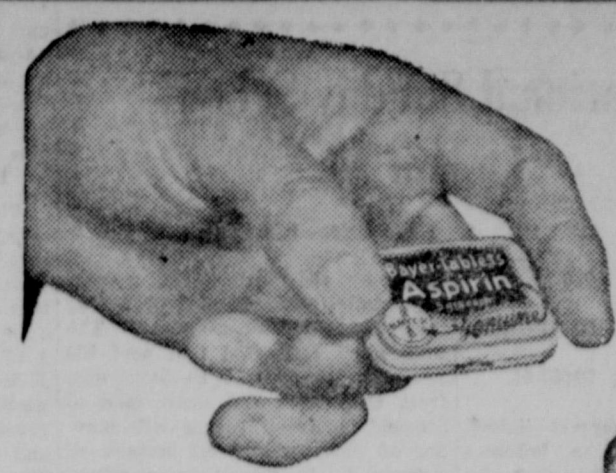

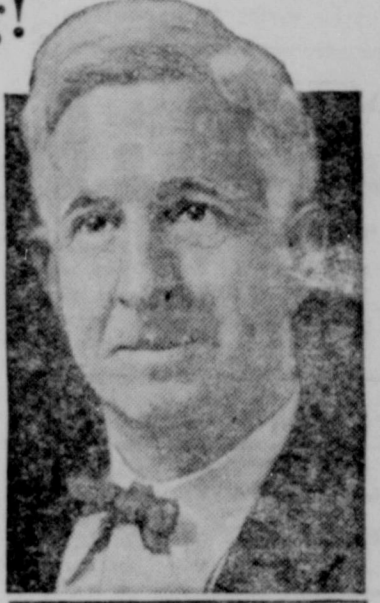

THE TWELVE SENT FORTH

Matt. 9:35; 10:8; 10:40-42

Golden Text: The harvest indeed is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he send forth laborers into his harvest.—Matt. 9:37, 38.

Introduction.

The special mission of the Twelve which we are studying today must have occurred not less than ten months after the call and ordination of the apostles. Jesus had probably made two tours thru the populous district of Galilee attended by the disciples, himself doing the preaching and performing the miracles. Now he authorizes them to begin their ministry as his apostles. He therefore sent them out two-and-two into different sections of Galilee, empowering them to preach and heal. The purpose of the mission seems to have been threefold: (1) The apostles needed practical experience, (2) the people needed their ministry and help, and (3) through them, Jesus could be in six different places at once, and they could greatly broaden his field and open up the way for a more thorough work by him.

Jesus' Active Ministry.

"And Jesus went about all the cities and the villages." Galilee in the time of Christ was much more densely populated than at present. Josephus declared that it had 204 cities and villages, the least of the villages containing more than 15,000 inhabitants.

"Teaching in their synagogues." These were all open to a visiting rabbi, who would be invited to

speak by the "rulers" or managing committee. "And preaching the gospel of the kingdom." The good news that God had sent his Son into the world to save men from their sins and draw men to himself. "And healing all manner of diseases and all manner of sickness." It was thus a ministry to the bodies, minds and souls of men; such a ministry as the church at home and abroad has been conducting ever since.

Christ's Twelve Helpers.

The Saviour knew that no one person, confined to one place at a time, could reach all the multitudes that must be reached. He therefore inaugurated the plan which, with increase after increase has been in force ever since, and will be used with ever-growing power and magnitude until the whole world is won for him. This plan consists in sending forth disciples to teach others about Christ and these new disciples are to teach others, and so on until the coming of the King in his glory. "And he called unto him his twelve disciples." He had already appointed them, just before the Ser-

mon on the Mount (Mark 3:13-19). "And he gave them authority over unclean spirits to cast them out. The power to work miracles would be a manifest commission from him.

Lists of Twelve Apostles.

"Now the names of the twelve apostles are there." Four lists of the Twelve are given us, one in each of the first three Gospels, this passage in Matthew; Mark 3:14-19; Luke 6:14-16, and Acts 1:13. All these lists fall into four divisions, each containing the same names but not in the same order. Peter stands first in all four lists and with him Andrew, James and John, the inner circle of the Twelve, and Judas Iscariot ends all the lists. Philip heads the second division and James the son of Alphaeus heads the third division.

Peter and Andrew.

"The first, Simon, who is called Peter." "Peter" means "Rock," and is of Greek origin. The Aramaic form of the name, "Cephas," has the same meaning. His father was named Jonah. Born in Bethsaida, he came to live in Capernaum, and Jesus, who probably made Peter's home his headquarters, healed Peter's wife's mother of a severe fever. Peter was a fisherman, and Jesus made him a "fisher of men." "Peter was full of human nature. We are ever reading ourselves over in the story of his life. No man more human than he. In this he comes near

to us and hears us. "And Andrew his brother." Andrew, whose name is Greek and means "manly," was also a fisherman. Andrew is the "bringer," forgetful of himself and ever leading others to Jesus. He was "a true, brave, humble, self-forgetting soul, loyal and ever ready at the word of command, content to fill a little place, and free from self-seeking ambitions."

James and John.

"James the son of Zebedee." His mother was Salome, one of the women at Christ's tomb. "James the elder and his brother John were called 'Boanerges,' or 'sons of thunder' because of their fiery dispositions. Living at first in Bethsaida and afterwards in Jerusalem, James was the first martyr among the apostles, being beheaded by Herod Agrippa I., A. D. 44, at Jerusalem. "And John his brother." John was "the disciple whom Jesus loved" as being near-

est to himself in thought and feeling. He was probably the youngest of the Twelve, hardly more than a boy when Christ called him, and lived to be nearly a hundred, dying a natural death after his banishment on the island of Patmos. John wrote the world's greatest book, the fourth Gospel.

Philip and Bartholomew.

Phillip, who came from Bethsaida, brought Nathanael to Jesus and also (with Andrew) the Greeks that wished to see Jesus before the crucifixion. "And Bartholomew." This name meaning "the son of Tolmai," was probably the surname of Nathanael who came from Cana of Galilee, and who was called by Jesus "an Israelite indeed, in whom is no guile" (John 1:47). "These words, when sounded to their depths, reveal the finest compliment Jesus ever paid to a new-comer." It is characteristic of this hum-

ble disciple that he sets down here the facts that he once was a hated and despised tax collector. His other name was Levi and his father was an Alphaeus, but probably not the Alphaeus whose son was James the Less. "Only those who have been much forgiven can interpret the great Forgiver. It was a publican redeemed who first saw the infinite room for sinners in the heart of Jesus Christ."
