Drive Opened On Memorial Stadium For Stephenville

Stephenville, Nov. 25.—At a meeting Nov. 19, citizens of Stephenville were asked to join with ex-students of John Tarleton Agricultural College in a drive to raise \$100,000 to build and equip a memorial stadium on a 38-acre tract directly west of the college.

Action on the adoption of the plan started last spring when several thousand Tarleton exes assembled here for the first homecoming since the war.

The ex-students association has named R. F. Higgs chairman of the drive, and he presided at last week's meeting.

According to plans of the architect the stadium will have a seating capacity of 7,500. The grounds will be landscaped. At a recent meeting of the directors of A. & M. College, \$5,000 was appropriated for beautifying the grounds.

Cecil Ogle, post adjutant, promises the public a cordial welcome and a full evening of entertainment at this stage show, receipts from which will be shared with the local VFW post.

Health Conditions Add to Reasons For Thanksgiving

Austin, Nov. 25.—The first Thanksgiving Day in this country was proclaimed for the purpose of expressing thanks not only for the bountiful harvest which the colonists had reaped, but for the sturdy health and endurance that had permitted them to survive the hardships and exposure of that first rigorous year in America.

"We have much to be thankful for in that our national health level has remained high despite the nervous tension, the sacrifices, the deprivations of a post-war period," Dr. Cox stated. "Our people have maintained a remarkably high level of health and even under existing conditions, Texas has shown a continued decline in maternal and infant deaths."

"The people of Texas have reason to be thankful for the steadily increasing interest and cooperation being shown in matters pertaining to general sanitation and the control of communicable diseases," Dr. Cox asserted. "Responsibility for advancement of the general public health program lies not with the State Health Department primarily but with the people who support and encourage the local community efforts exerted and who apply in their own individual lives the health rules with which they have become acquainted through public health education."

Dr. Cox pointed out that one direct result of public health efforts in this nation has been the lengthening of the normal life span by more than 15 years. "Certainly this is something to be thankful for and it should lend incentive for further efforts to promote and maintain community as well as statewide public health programs."

Credit Facilities And Services Under New Organization

Credit facilities and services formerly provided by the Farm Security Administration and the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Division of Farm Credit Administration are available to eligible farmers through the Hamilton county office of the Farmers' Administration, Lester J. Cappelman, Texas State Director of FFA has announced.

Mr. Cappelman also announced the designation of Wilburn H. Denham, Hamilton county supervisor of FSA, as interim-supervisor-in-charge of the Hamilton FFA office, which is located on the first floor of the Court House.

"The Farmers' Home Administration, created by the 79th Congress, took over functions of FSA and ECFL effective November 1. The new agency will make production and subsistence loans as well as loans for farm purchases. Facilities are available only to farmers who are unable to get the loans they need at interest rates not exceeding five percent from banks, cooperative lending agencies or other responsible sources in their communities."

The farm purchase loans made by the new agency are similar to those formerly made by FSA. Loans are made for 100 percent of the purchase price of family-type farms, plus needed improvements. Repayment is scheduled over a period of 40 years, and interest rate is 3 1/2 percent.

Operating credit extended by the Farmers' Home Administration under its production and subsistence loan program includes both annual loans and adjustment-type loans at five percent interest.

The adjustment-type credit is similar to the "rehabilitation" loans made by the Farm Security Administration, and is based on farm and home operating plans worked out by the borrower with the aid of FFA supervisors. It is accompanied by on-the-farm management assistance provided by FFA personnel. Loans may be repaid over a maximum period of five years.

The annual loans made by FFA are similar to the "feed and seed" loans made by the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Division of the Farm Credit Administration. Farm and home plans are not required as a basis for these loans, but they must be repaid within 12 months.

Production and subsistence loans to any one borrower may not exceed \$3,500 in any one year. Total indebtedness of any one borrower may not exceed \$5,000.

Veterans will be given preference in all phases of the Farmers' Home Administration program.

The only attendants were the groom's sister and husband, Mr. and Mrs. J. V. Gallaher of Fort Worth. They will reside in that city.

Home For Thanksgiving—Maybe

Sammy will soon be discharged from Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Crippled Children in Dallas where he has undergone treatment for polio for the past four months. Each year at this time generous persons in all parts of Texas are planning their gifts to the Nathan Adams campaign for funds with which to continue the operation of the hospital for another year. The hospital treated 90 cases of polio during the 1946 epidemic in addition to some 500 various other cases throughout the year.

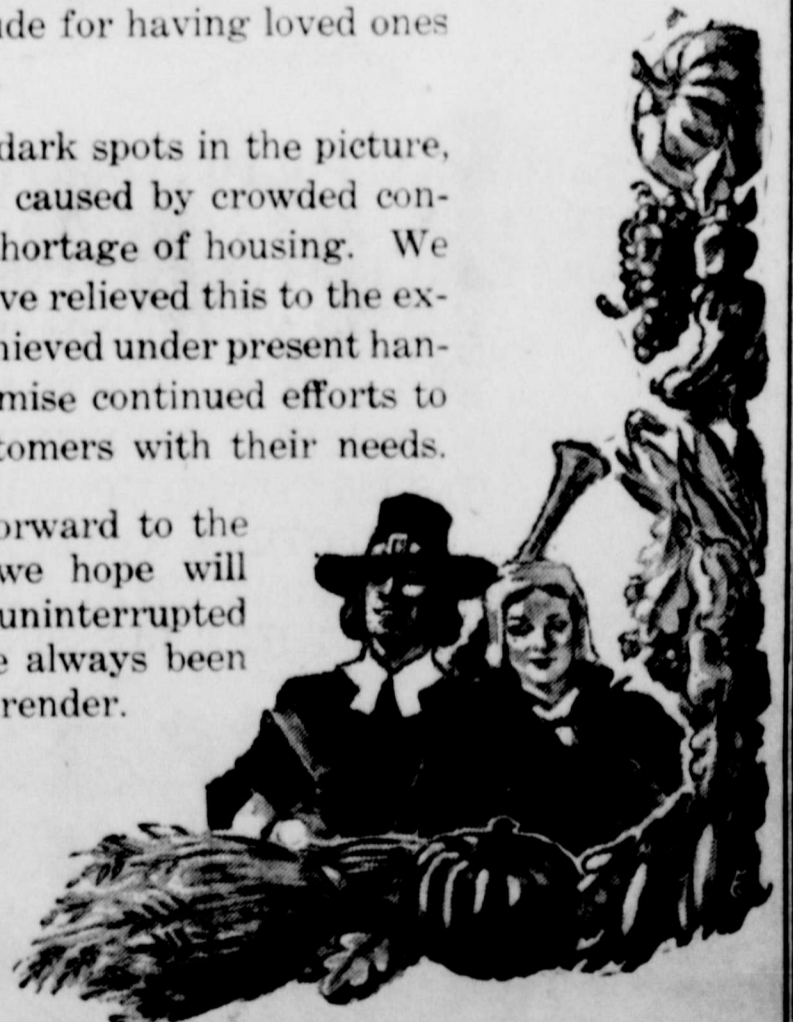

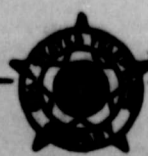

Six-Inch Sermon
BY REV. ROBERT H. HARPER

A Letter on Christian Living.
Lesson for December 1: Acts 19:23-30; Ephesians 6:13-18.
Memory Selection: Ephesians 6:10.

In a Mexican city the writer found all kinds of booths were doing business almost against the wall of the cathedral, while men offered wares for sale on the steps in front, with none to interfere. But centuries ago the lucrative trade in silver images of Diana about the doors of her temple was so reduced, after Paul had labored two years in Ephesus, that Demetrius and his fellows raised a great uproar under the pretense of pious concern for the city's religion.

The incident shows how opposition arises against Christian work everywhere from those who exploit the vices of their fellows in greed of gain. The second passage of the lesson text shows how such opposition must be met and tells of the armor that Christians must wear against the forces of evil.

About ten years after the uproar in Ephesus, Paul wrote a letter on Christian living to the Ephesian Christians, exhorting them to put on the whole armor of God. He then worked out his metaphors with all the accoutrement of an ancient soldier. Girdle of truth, breastplate of righteousness, sandals of the preparation of the gospel of peace, shield of faith, helmet of salvation, and the word of God, which is the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God, must arm Christians. Thus in full panoply, with prayer and supplication, watchfulness and perseverance, the soldier of the Cross must stand in the evil day "and, having done all, to stand."

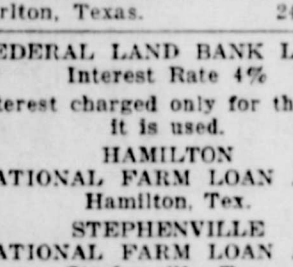

Registration At 18 Compulsory, Says Selective Service

Local Board No. 1 at Hamilton has received the following article from National Headquarters for Selective Service and believes that it should be printed for the benefit of all men:

"While the Selective Training and Service Act, as amended and extended until March 31, 1947, exempts men under 19 years of age from induction, except as volunteers, prompt registration at the age of 18 remains compulsory. Local boards should make sure, by communication through the press and radio, that this requirement of the law is generally understood in their areas.

"The responsibility of every male citizen of the United States and every male person in the United States, including those who become 18 years old, to register for military training and service is set forth in Section 2 of the Act.

"Any such person becoming 18 years old is required to present himself immediately for registration by the local board for the area in which he has his permanent home or for the one in which he may happen to be on that day.

Failure to register is punishable upon conviction, by fine or imprisonment, or both.

"Furthermore, the law requires every man (1) To keep in touch with his local board; (2) to notify it of any change of address; and (3) to notify it of any fact which might change his classification. Many men have forgotten to heed the second item listed above. This is called to your attention."

State Tractors Seen Numbering 200,220 by 1950

Texas may have as many as 200,220 tractors rumbling over its farm lands by 1950 under the im-

petus of a vigorous nation-wide drive toward complete agricultural mechanization.

This number would be the state's quota of the 3,000,000 tractors expected to be in use on all U. S. farms by 1950, according to a study by SKF Industries, Inc. This full total is dependent, however, upon the South mechanizing to the same degree now prevailing in the Middle Atlantic states.

"The demand for farm machinery, particularly tractors, is the heaviest in history," said C. W. Moore, market analyst for the ball and roller bearing company. "Tractors are sorely needed to help the farmer to offset lost manpower and increased acreage and to continue to meet high food production goals."

Texas farms had an estimated 158,056 tractors on July 1, the study disclosed. Of these, between 29,307 and 26,981 are past their normal junking period and 7,093 more are wearing out annually.

"The farmer is in the best financial condition he has ever known," Moore said. "The demand for, and supply of, farm equipment are expected to continue a profitable relationship for some time," he added, pointing out that the state had a record gross farm income last year of \$1,189,301,900 from crops and livestock.

Moore said tractors and other farm machinery now in production or on drafting boards would enable the farmer to stretch his income dollar.

"Not only will this equipment be lighter in weight, but it will have better resistance to wear and corrosion," he said. "It will be equipped with anti-friction bearings that require fewer repairs and less frequent lubrication, and it will be easier and less expensive to operate."
