UNCLE AUSTIN was amazed at the Texas Panhandle flat lands and at the fact that we actually water trees and grass with a garden hose to make it grow; then we cut the grass and prune the trees and water them again. He said it was kind of like sweetening your iced tea with sugar and then putting lemon in it.

"Never in my wildest dreams would I have imagined miles and miles of corn fields stretching as far as the eye can see." He was quite inspired by our crops and by the fact that they are all irrigated by underground water.

The last evening that he was here, we had one of those beautiful orange and purple sunsets that we enjoy in this area. He asked what made the sun look so much bigger just before it sank below the horizon and the same when the moon is just coming up? We all thought it had something to do with the atmosphere and the bending of light rays. Uncle Austin thought a minute and said if light rays could bend then why couldn't he see around the corner when a car was coming toward him? We didn't have an answer for that. Perhaps some of our more learned scientific readers could come up with an answer for him.

We took him out to a field of sugar beets and dug one up and told him that turnips grow bigger here than anywhere else. Then we went out to Howard Fleming's place to look at the ostriches just to prove to him that even the birds are bigger here in Texas. He thought that it would take at least a week to gnaw through a drumstick that size. He said he wished they had had ostriches back on the farm in Western Tennessee when he was growing up. "Everybody had big families back then, you know. An egg from a bird that size could have provided breakfast for a family of two parents and eight or ten kids."

"We hit on pretty hard times one year, ourselves," he said, "and we got down to one old scrawny chicken between us and starvation. My brother and I went out to kill the hen for dinner but Momma said not to kill it because she believed that the Lord would provide for us. Sure enough, the next day the hen laid an egg, so we had egg soup for the rest of the week and then on Sunday we had a good meal. We ate the egg."

"Living through hardships like that is kind of like trying to climb a fence that is leaning toward you or trying to kiss a girl that is leaning away from you."

I took Uncle Austin to the Regional Art Show at the Depot and he liked the paintings. I pointed out a couple of the artists to him and he said, "Oh! A pair of drawers!"

He enjoyed being in the Maize Days parade but thought that Main Street was not long enough because he was just getting warmed up at waving and hollering to the people when it was all over. He said it was sort of like the time he borrowed some money from the bank and it was going to come due in the spring. "That turned out to be the shortest winter ever on record in Western Tennessee."

We invited him to go to the football game with us on Friday night but he declined because he thinks that football involves two of the worst aspects of life: violence and committee meetings.

We had hoped to talk him into staying with us a little longer but he said, "Fish and visiting relatives begin to smell bad after three or four days and anyway, some people can stay longer in an hour than others can in a week."

When we took him to the airport he left us with one more of his bits of wisdom that we call "Uncle Austin-isms": "It's not what we eat, but what we digest that makes us strong. It's not what we earn, but what we save that makes us rich. It's not what we read, but what we remember that makes us learned. It's not what we profess, but what we practice that makes us great."

## Wayne Jackson Is First Grid Winner

Wayne Jackson comes from a family of football players. At sixteen, he's a junior starter for the Friona Chieftains.

His brother, Nelson, holds the all-time high school state record (probably national as well) for longest pass interception returns—a 109-yarder!

Wayne not only had a hand in Friona's opening week win over Amarillo River Road with six unassisted tackles, he also proved his worth in picking football games.

He emerged as the first week's winner in the Friona Star football contest.

Jackson and John Seright of Lubbock were the only ones entering the first week's contest to correctly pick as many as 14 of the 20 contest games.

Jackson won out on the Dallas-San Diego tiebreaker game, to win first place and a check for \$10.00. Seright settled for second, and \$7.50 cash.

Seright's misses were Hereford-Tascosa, Baylor-Arizona State, Miami-BYU, SMU-Vanderbilt, LSU-Georgia and L.A. Rams-Green Bay.

Jackson picked San Diego 21, Dallas 10, missing by 14, and Seright picked the Chargers, 24-10, missing by 17.

## City To Challenge 1990 Census Totals

Based on the information sent to the City of Friona by the Census Bureau containing the "preliminary and partial" totals for 1990, the City plans to file a challenge to the Census Bureau, it was announced this week.

"We did some spot counting, and there are at least a couple of areas in town where we're challenging them on their figures. They provided us with a map showing the number of housing units. The areas in question were significantly below what is actually there," said City Manager Beelee Goodwin.


Any resident who knows they were not counted is urged to contact the city immediately, as a response to the Census Bureau needs to be made by September 21.

The Bureau indicated that the city had 124 vacant housing units.

Realtor B.K. Buske said he questioned that number. "At the present time we have two rental houses and one apartment for rent, and that's a high number for us."

Buske, who also is a former Friona mayor, said that he thought the tendency for census workers was to list a residence as unoccupied if they go by a couple of times and don't find anyone there, when in reality it may be occupied.

Anyone having ideas on how to make the 1990 count more accurate is urged to come forward, since the city has to live with this total for the next ten years, and it's very important for funding, voting redistricting, etc.

Williams heaped praise on the team's performance against River Road in the season opener. "There are some areas that need improvement, but overall our performance was far better than I could have hoped for," he said.

Williams singled out Glen Shirley, Harvey Martinez and Wayne Jackson for their defensive play against the Wildcats, and also had praise for the offensive line, which was a key factor in the 39-point and big offensive explosion. They are Ryan Sifford, Steven Dickson, Alex Mendoza, Blue Field, Wes Drake, Corbin Riethmayer, Adam Lopez and Wade Procter.

Williams said "Take away a couple of plays and River Road wouldn't even have scored."

Among the class AAA teams in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal's circulation area, Friona ranked second in defense with the 166 yards allowed, and third in total offense, leading in rushing. Ismael Rocha was first in individual rushing, and Curtis Brady third.

## PCCH Gets Cash Grant

Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona was one of 24 rural hospitals in Texas which has been awarded a grant under the Rural Health Care Transition Program, U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm of Texas announced this week.

The Friona hospital will receive \$19,950 through the program. The funding will be provided by the U.S. Health Care Financing Administration, an agency of the Department of Health and Human Services, said the senator.

The Rural Health Care Transition Program was created within the Health and Human Services Department to assure adequate delivery of health care in underserved areas.

## 60 YEARS AGO--AUG. 22, 1930

Buford Taylor, who has been conducting a cafe on the west side of Main Street just opposite the Rockwell Hardware Store for the past few years, has moved his business into the new Hicks building on Main Street south of the railroad.

## 55 YEARS AGO--AUG. 16, 1935

The Friona territory, especially to the west of town seems in line to produce some good row crops far above average, especially as to sudan and hegari, also much good kaffir. This condition, however, does not prevail in all localities nor on all farms, as the rainfall has been very spotted this summer.

## 50 YEARS AGO--AUG. 23, 1940

Mr. Brunk, manager of the Harley Saddler comedians tent show, was a business visitor here Tuesday afternoon. Mr. Brunk was making arrangements for his show to appear here on the night of September 20. Further details for the show will appear in the Star at a later date.

## 45 YEARS AGO--AUG. 24, 1945

Issuance of sugar for home canning will stop August 25, the War Price and Rationing Board states. All applicants in this county received only five pounds per person after the drastic cut in sugar rations were announced in the early summer. Originally plans were to continue issuance through October, but the local board has been advised to issue the entire allotment for 1945 by the end of August.

## 40 YEARS AGO--AUG. 17, 1950

"Along with pix of new inventions, etc., the Perfect Circle Piston Ring magazine for August carries the picture of Ray Landrum's land-locked sailboat. The caption reads, 'No telling how many drivers took the pledge when they saw Ray Landrum of Friona wheeling across the plains of the Panhandle in his road-rolling sailboat.'"--Bert Neelley's column.

# Rocha, Brady Pace Chiefs Past River Road, 39-23

Huge lightning bolts flashed in the distance throughout Friona's opening football game here last Friday. But the lightning that struck the River Road Wildcats came in the form of two fleet runningbacks--Ismael Rocha and Curtis Brady.

Rocha rambed for 243 yards rushing, and Brady added 54, plus a 70-yard pass interception return (that's 467 yards between them if you add it all up), as the Chieftains notched the opening-day win, 39-23 at Chieftain Field.

The Chieftains scored the first two times they had the ball, to grab an early 12-0 lead, then after River Road scored an easy touchdown to cut Friona's lead to 12-7 at halftime, Friona scored in three of its first four second-half possessions, then salted away the game with a 70-yard interception return by Curtis Brady.

The two talented junior runningbacks, Rocha and Brady, provided ample entertainment for the opening night crowd. Each scored three touchdowns to thrill the opening night home crowd.

Rocha started off where he left off as a sophomore sensation who was named all-district after playing in only four games in 1989.

River Road won the toss and elected to kick off. Given the fact that the Chieftains rolled to an average gain of 7.7 yards per carry for the game, this proved to be an unwise decision by the Wildcats, who hoped to gain the benefit of the wind in the second and fourth quarters.

Rocha returned the opening kick out to the 31, and it took the Chieftains just 11 plays to light up the scoreboard. Showing a new brand of optimism in Friona's first offensive series, Coach Steve Williams let the team go for a fourth and one from their own 40. Brady's five-yard burst rewarded his decision, and ignited the opening scoring drive.

An eight-yard run by Rocha, and a nine-yarder by Brady gave Friona first downs, and then Rocha ran a cross-back to the right and scored from 25 yards out with 6:55 left in the first quarter for a 6-0 Friona lead. Mike Scott's PAT kick was barely wide left.

Three offensive plays by the Wildcats gained only a yard, and Friona took over at its 32-yard-line following the punt.

Brady ran twice for ten yards to the 42, and Rocha sparkled on a 22-yard burst to the River Road 29. Three plays later Rocha burst up the middle for 27 yards and another touchdown as Friona's lead became 12-0. A passing try for points fell incomplete.

The Chieftains, who had had much trouble scoring any points at all in their first several games of 1989, had scored twice in only 9:23 of clock time in the opening quarter.

The Wildcats punted Friona into a big hole midway through the second quarter, and a couple of minutes later benefitted from Scott's short kick, taking over at the Friona 34.

Two plays later Jimmy Cook ran 27 yards for the Wildcats and the kick got the visitors right back in the game at 12-7, which turned out to be the halftime score. A personal foul penalty stymied what might have been another Friona

drive prior to halftime, and erased an 18-yard gain by Rocha.

Friona put the ball in play at its 27 yard line to start the second half. On the second play Rocha took the handoff, raced to his right, made a move on one defender, and outran another on a 66-yard ramble up the west sideline.

Quarterback Daniel Saiz passed to Rocha for a two-pointer and Friona had a 20-7 lead. Only 58 seconds had elapsed in the third quarter.

River Road was held, had to punt, and Friona took over at its 40-yard line. Rocha ran 14 yards to move the ball into Wildcat territory, and five plays later he darted 25 yards to the River Road one-yard line.

Two plays lost back to the four, but on third down Brady got into the end zone for his first TD, and a bad snap ruined the PAT try. However, Friona had hiked its lead to 26-7 with 5:22 left in the third.

A high snap on a punt attempt gave River Road a great opportunity at the Friona three on the first play of the fourth quarter, and the Wildcats accepted Friona's generosity by scoring their second touchdown. A pass for points made the score 26-15 with 10:45 left in the game.

Two plays following the kickoff, Brady showed his speed potential when he broke through the line, found himself in the clear at midfield and raced 68 yards for his second touchdown. Scott kicked the point-after for the Chieftains, who took a 33-15 lead.

A little later, River Road had driven to the Friona 30 with their

passing attack when Brady stepped in front of Clint Latham's pass at the Friona 30, and raced 70 yards the other way for his third straight score. The PAT kick was wide, but Friona had a 39-15 lead with just over eight minutes to play.

Chad Hamilton's interception at the Friona 15 once again foiled a River Road scoring attempt, but five plays later the Chieftains gave it back with their only fumble of the night.

The visitors had a first and goal at Friona's one, and the Chieftains showed their defensive might. With penalties added in, it took the Wildcats six plays to score the TD, which made the final margin of 39-23.

The 398 yards total offense were the most by a Chieftain team since Friona posted a record 553 yards in the fifth game of the 1987 season at Pampa, and the 39 points were also the most since the 49-20 win over the Harvesters.

Rocha's 243 yards are the most individual rushing yards by a


Chieftain runningback in the past ten years, edging Charlie Morgan's 242 yards against Farwell in 1983 and Daniel Echols' 218 yards at Pampa in 1987.

In fact, the individual total is the most in 21 years at FHS, since Izzy Cordova gained 247 yards against Tucumcari in 1969. It's the third-best game in 23 years, behind the 258 yards gained by Tony Perea against Crosbyton in 1968 and Cordova's game vs Tucumcari.

It's only the third 200-yard game by a Chieftain since 1980 and just the sixth since 1972.

Brady's 70-yard pass interception return was the third-longest by a Friona player, topped only by Nelson Jackson's state record 109-yarder in 1980 and Bruce Patterson's 80-yard run in 1982.


The win hiked Friona's all-time lead over River Road in the series to 8-6, and made Coach Steve Williams a winner in his first outing as head coach of the Chieftains.





# Angler's Corner

One particular species of fish has so dominated fresh water fishing, that it has grown into a multi-billion dollar a year industry. That fish is, of course, the largemouth bass. Besides the bass tournaments and bass television shows, there are monthly bass publications, bass boats, bass busters (small water boats), an

avalanche of bass lures, bass tackle, bass clothing, bass trinkets and even the bass themselves for stocking (if you haven't already guessed it) a bass pond.

You can purchase bass instructional videos, bass pattern books and computerized bass games to just name a few of the informational items available. The sport of bass fishing has elevated all forms of freshwater fishing even extending its influence into the world of saltwater fishing.

The desire to pursue this particular sunfish has brought boats, electronics and tackle into the modern age. Built in upright and level flotation for boats as well as improvements in deep vee and semi-vee hull technology have evolved as a result of the demand of this market. Today's boats are much safer than those of even ten years ago.

You see them on almost every lake, plying the waters near the shoreline or drifting the drop-offs and channels. Elevated casting decks and every available space stuffed with tackle describes the typical bass boat. The helm and bow bristle with electronics.

Once awkward baitcasting reels have evolved into smooth casting tools designed for all anglers. Through the handle rod blanks have brought sensitivity to the forefront. One touch spinning reels with heavier construction are commonplace. Fishing line has become an entire industry in itself.

With all this taking place, the largemouth has become subjected to a condition not even thought of a few years ago, that being "fishing pressure."

Simply stated, the sheer amount of angling hours put into an average lake for this particular species will not only deplete improperly managed fisheries, but will also force the largemouth to adapt to the pressure and change its habits.

Twenty years ago, the bass did not have to contend with as much boat traffic. As the traffic increased, the fish headed to areas almost inaccessible to boats. As these fish stuck tighter to cover

with the increased activity, a technique known as flipping was discovered. This allowed an angler to get close to heavy cover, and with the use of a long rod, flip the bait directly into the habitat. Soon the bass were going deeper into the cover, so then did presentations. The cycle continues making the largemouth harder to catch.

Lake Fork is thought to have the potential to produce the next world record bass. Its proximity to Dallas turns the lake into a parking lot for boats subjecting the fish to an extraordinary amount of pressure. The once easy trophy lake is getting more difficult as time goes on.

Gibbons Creek near Bryan was expertly managed from the initial construction phase. Fishing was banned for four years to allow the bass to grow to record weights. Before it was opened to the public, the press and a few pros were invited to fish. Boating 50 to 60 bass that day were common occurrences.

Once opened to the public, a reservation system became necessary as the impound was inundated with anglers and boats. The fishing pressure grew to incredible proportions. As time passed, the catch rate fell to the point to where the reservation system was dropped and stories of long days with no fish became commonplace.

Gibbons Creek looks like a bass angler's version of heaven. It is a shallow impoundment completely covered with trees and underwater obstructions. It has it all from standing timber to lilly pads. Therein lies part of the problem. Early pressure aside, the amount of cover boggles the mind. A Panhandle angler that is used to fishing shoreline brush and subsurface cover can only stand on the bow in awe of the sheer amount of structure. How can you spot "isolated cover" in thick forest? Where do you cast? Every spot could hold an armbrake.

This illustrates the fact that the bass are reacting to the pressure, their characteristics are adapting to the changes around them. Throw

in an overabundance of cover and you can understand the problem.

While thick cover is certainly not the bane of the Panhandle angler, fishing pressure is. It is estimated that over 600,000 people visit Conchas per year. Just take a small percentage of that figure as anglers. Be conservative, say 20%, which would be 120,000 fishermen or about 328 average per day probing the depths and pounding the shore. Other area lakes face similar pressure in relation to their size.

All this considered, one can see that today's bass angler needs to be armed with as much information as possible to consistently catch bass. As more boats hit the water every year, so increases the pressure. Bass fishing is evolving into a finesse game with tight cover. Longer hours on the water with fewer strikes could befall the uninformed angler. It's you against the fish, and you can bet the fish has the advantage.

This is the last of the series of Angler's Corner and I hope that at least some of this information has been helpful. This sport has a future only if we practice conservation as the angling population explodes putting more people on the water. Everyone has a right to keep fish within the law and no one should have to defend their right to do so. Without conservation, we will surely lose that right.

Keep a tight line and above all, be careful on the water. Good luck.





### Serious Investors Are Serious About Investing

Two stumbling blocks to successful investing are magazine mutual fund rankings and investment advisory newsletters.

Mutual fund rankings appear annually in most well-known financial publications. Of course, these rankings seldom agree because each magazine has its own unique rating system.

Investment advisory newsletters, on the other hand, can be published by almost anyone with enough venture capital to buy a mailing list. And the newsletters are usually so skillfully marketed that one often finds them hard to resist. Take, for example, my latest newsletter subscription.

The offering flier was a slick, multi-colored piece. It raised enough economic questions that satisfying my curiosity might have been worth the special subscription price. Wrong. There was no

mention of important economic issues. Instead, I read about some sure-fire foreign stocks and coin deals you couldn't refuse.

This month I finally got the worst--a newsletter that rates mutual funds. If you consider this sour grapes, far from it. The entertainment was worth the price.

By now you've probably realized that most of this article is a tongue-in-cheek observation. Although the facts are correct, it is alarming that many subscribers will blindly select a mutual fund from the "Top 30," call the convenient 800 number and invest money. They have no idea of the objectives, risks, history or management of these funds. They also know nothing about the newsletter editor or his or her qualifications to offer investment advice.

Investing is serious business. Serious investors should be serious about it.

Neiman-Marcus \$250 Cookie Recipe....(Chapter 2)--Thanks to everyone who has written or called about this recipe. I'm glad to report that without exception the cooks have been happy with the outcome of their cookies.

However, there have also been some inquiries about procedure. To those who were puzzled about whether to grate the chocolate fine, medium or coarse, what kind of nuts to use, whether to use milk chocolate chips or dark chocolate chips and whether the oatmeal was to be measured before or after blending, here are my answers:

Probably the oatmeal part would have been easier to understand if it had read, "5 cups oatmeal, blended" rather than 5 cups blended oatmeal. I'm basing that conclusion on my understanding of the difference between "2 cups flour, sifted" and 2 cups sifted flour. The latter means sift the flour before measuring.

Then, the latter three questions can be answered by a Rule of Thumb in an old old J.R. Watkins Cookbook. It reads, "When ingredients are not specifically stated as to brand, type or color, the choice is left up to the cook."

One reader's report causes me to question the veracity of the original story even more. She has an identical recipe and a similar story, which was given to her by a sister-in-law in El Paso several years ago.

The difference in the two stories is that the Mrs. Fields, who began her cookie business a few years ago and has been highly successful, charged an enormous price for the recipe.



### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."
