Bill Ellis THIS WEEK, A chapter of major league baseball will be finished with the closing of Comiskey Park in Chicago.

Residents of the Windy City may not expect a eulogy about their famed, 80-year-old ball park from, of all places, Friona, Texas.

But it happens that Ye Editor, a longtime baseball fan, happened to see his first major league game at old Comiskey Park on August 23, 1953.

That just served to convince that teenager that he wanted to become a sportswriter and cover major league sports, which he eventually did with the San Francisco Giants.

With the imminent closure of Comiskey Park, ye editor dug this week into his "treasure box," and found the game program from that August day 38 years ago when the White Sox engaged the Detroit Tigers in a doubleheader.

Two games for the price of one? This old refugee from the cotton fields thought he had died and gone to heaven, and stayed for all 18 innings, and enjoyed every

pitch. Maybe some of you old timers will recognize some of the players in the lineup that day. A couple have made the Hall of Fame, although most of them were just "everyday" players who probably were just making a living wage at their craft at that time before inflated salaries.

There were second-baseman Nelson (Nellie) Fox, one of the early "mighty midgets" of baseball at 5-10; shortstop Chico Minoso, one of the players who helped break the sports "color barrier," who went on to have a great career.

The pitcher in the second game was none other than Virgil (Fire) Trucks, who had made history the previous year by pitching two nohit games in a single season. He won the game that day, 11-6.

Some of the other White Sox players were: Sam Mele, Jim Rivera, catcher Sherm Lollar, Ferris Fain, Vern Stephens, and Gene Bearden. The manager was Paul Richards.



He's best known for his exploits with the California Angels, but also pitched nine years at Houston, plus his early years with the Mets, and now is in his twilight with the Texas Rangers.

NASA Balloon Seen In Area Wednesday

Friona residents were treated Wednesday morning to a spectacular view of a helium research balloon as it floated aloft across the area at heights of up to 25 miles.

First spotted in the dark earlymorning sky to the southwest, the balloon at first looked like an extra-bright star. It continued to be a bright object well past sunup, and was clearly visible throughout the morning hours except for a time when some high clouds obstructed the view.

By noon, the intriguing object was almost directly overhead to Friona residents, and later moved on in a north-easterly direction, and was photographed later in the day by the Amarillo news media.

The balloon is thought to be a helium research balloon of the type launched at Fort Sumner, N.M., by a scientific group affiliated with New Mexico State University and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA).

A number of people were able to observe the balloon through binoculars and telescopes, and could see four "feet" which protrude downward to the gondola that is loaded with scientific instruments.

The balloons never carry passengers. Instead, they tote state-ofthe-art monitoring equipment used to study such things as ozone, the colorless gas providing protection from the sun's ultraviolet rays that some scientists believe is being destroyed by pollution on earth.

Observers could also see a pair of "sun spots" on the balloon, due City. to its transparent nature, as the sun was hitting the side of the balloon closest to the sun and going through to the other side.

Although the object appeared small to the naked eye, that was due to the fact that it was so high aloft. The balloons released at Fort Sumner are 350 feet high and 400 feet in diameter when fully inflated, and are large enough to contain a football stadium.

It is thought that the balloon 41 points. seen Wednesday was similar to one that came to earth in a wheat field on the farm of Russell O'Brian ten miles east of Hub on March 16, 1962, and was photographed by the Friona Star.

O'Brian was one of the many viewers of the balloon on Wednesday, but didn't get to see this one quite as closely as the one in 1962.



The National Scientific Balloon Facility previously launched their balloons at a Palestine, Texas, site, between Dallas and Houston.

However, due to the possibility of the 3,000 pound gondola falling on people or houses, the launch project was moved to Fort Sumner in 1987.

Fort Sumner is located 57 miles west of Clovis, N.M., on U.S. Highway 60, which makes it roughly 90 miles west of Friona.

GARDEN CITY, Kan. (AP) - A woman accused of smothering her 4-year-old son told police she could have killed her son during a mental blackout, a police detective testified said. Tuesday.

Kendall Elliott testified that another evidence of food in the victim's detective, Michael Utz, suggested to Diana Lumbrera that she might have smothered her son during a mental blackout and could not remember killing him.
