Mr. Hardin said cooperation of licited by his office and that within the next sixty days he hoped and methods to interested groups. "Our farm labor problems are largely restricted in this area to

grain and peanuts-as well as poultry stock raising." he said. "and labor demands are usually highest from June to November. We are now compiling the total acreages planted and this will be needed and checked periodically for seasonal changes.

Mr. Hardin said any farmer requiring hands or any farm workers looking for jobs should get in touch with the employment service office at Waco at the earliest possible moment. He pointed out that accurate demand and supply information in advance of actual needs would help to prevent conusion and dissappointment when ne big rush begins.
