





upon it for fuel. The convenience it brings to a farm home compares favorably in every respect to that enjoyed by his city cousin using natural gas. Most users of Liquefied Petroleum gas give very little thought to the problems of the industry that makes this convenience possible, so we are setting out some of the facts concerning the distribution of L. P. gas.

 These fuels are recovered in the process of gasoline manufacture, and the amount available for distribution is dependent upon the amount of gasoline produced in a given time. The greatest consumption of gasoline occurs during the summer months. The larger part of the L. P. gases are needed during the winter months. We have reached the point where there is not enough L. P. gas produced during the winter season to meet the users' needs. This has been very evident in most communities during the last thirty days. The solution of this serious problem depends upon cooperation between the consumer, the distributor and the producer. Principally, the responsibility rests upon the consumer and the distributing dealer, since the producer can only furnish up to their recovery capacity. The consumer must provide storage for fuel enough to meet his requirements for a ninety day period during the winter season. For most families that means a 500 gallon storage system. Small families can do on less.

Due to the conditions that exist, no dealer can guarantee service on a system that will not provide the customer enough storage for a ninety day period during the winter months. No dealer can carry all the load -the customer must share this storage problem.

The dealer must provide storage enough to meet the difference in the users' requirements between summer and winter. This is the difference between a Servicing Dealer and a summer-time free-lancer. The servicing dealer provides storage to partly carry his customer through the critical season. The summer-time free lancer operates while the gas is plentiful and leaves his customers to shift for themselves when it is scarce; -not from choice, but for the simple reason that the gas is prorated in the winter and the dealer who stores gas, thereby helping the producer equalize the production load, receives most of the winter production. Any consumer who patronizes a dealer without storage facilities will surely be left without fuel during a part of the winters to come.

A Servicing Dealer with large investments in storage facilities must receive a price for L. P. gas that will justify the investment made for the protection of his customers. It is obvious that gas can be delivered direct from the refineries in the summer time cheaper than it can be stored and delivered during the severe winter months.
