Under Texas Skies Features State's Sacred Documents

By A. GARLAND ADAIR Curator of History, Texas Memorial Museum. The fourth edition of Under Texas Skies, published by the Texas Heritage Foundation, has just recently come from the press. It is in the form of a 100 page brochure and contains the basic features included in the dual heritage of the Lone Star State, which are the National and State of Texas Constitutions, the Declaration of American Independence, and the Declaration of Texas Independence. Other subjects briefly given are the signers of all of these most precious documents, the story of the Liberty Bell, the State House at Philadelphia, the presidents and vice-presidents of the United States, dates of ratification of the federal constitution and dates of the admission of all 48 states, territorial governors and governors of the states, names of delegates who signed the Texas constitution when drafted at Austin in 1875, the governors of Texas and the membership of the fiftieth Texas legislature.

Penalty Reduced On Fire Insurance Effective March 1

Good news for local property owners is contained in a communication from the Gulf Insurance Co. of Dallas advising W. M. Horsley, local agent, that effective March 1, 1948, the penalty on insurance on property here had been reduced. Policies written after that date will carry a 10 per cent penalty instead of the 15 per cent which has been in effect for several years. While there is still much room for improvement in the record, and an opportunity to secure up to 25 per cent credit, still insurance men and property owners feel that a step has been made in the right direction. The record is based on a five-year record of losses, Mr. Horsley explained, and with continued care and good work by the local volunteer fire department, all are hoping for a steady annual decrease in the cost of insurance.

Vets In Schools Entitled to Raised Subsistence Pay

Only veterans in schools, colleges and universities pursuing full-time courses of education will be entitled to increased subsistence allowances under a law signed February 14 by President Truman, the Waco Veterans Administration office has announced. Part-time students, on-the-job trainees and others will not be entitled to the increases, the VA ruling held. The bill signed into law, S. 1394, amends the Servicemen's Readjustment Act (GI Bill) and the Vocational Rehabilitation Act (Public Law 16) for the disabled. The new payments will be at the monthly rate of 75 dollars for a veteran without dependents, 105 dollars for a veteran with one dependent, and 120 dollars for a veteran with more than one dependent. The higher rates are applicable to periods of training on and after April 1. However, since subsistence allowance checks are not due until the end of the month in which the veteran is training, most of the eligible veteran-students will receive their first checks at the higher rates on or shortly after May 1. Veterans taking any of the following types of training are not entitled to the increases, but will continue to receive subsistence payments at the old rates: 1. Part-time institutional training. 2. Institutional or on-the-farm training. 3. Apprenticeship or other on-the-job training for which veterans receive compensation for productive labor. 4. Combination or cooperative training in which students attend school part time and are employed part time, usually in a related field. 5. Internship and residency training. 6. Graduate training under a fellowship requiring a reduced credit-course-load because of services rendered under the fellowship. Eligible veterans now in school, who are entitled to 75 dollars or 105 dollars under the new rates will not have to apply for the increased allowances. Existing applications will supply all the information needed to pay the new benefits. These veterans, therefore, need not write VA at the present time concerning their increases. Veterans-trainees entitled to 120 dollars because they have more than one dependent will be required to submit information about their additional dependents before payments at the new rate can be made. In the case of dependent children, photostats or certified copies of their birth certificates will be necessary. In the case of dependent parents, evidence of actual dependency must be submitted. If veterans now in training submit evidence of dependency prior to July 1, 1948, they will receive retroactive payments at the new rates back to April 1, 1948. Next time you decide to donate some blood to the American Red Cross, you'll probably appreciate the blood transfusion equipment that the Red Cross now has. The ARC recently purchased 43,000 transfusion sets from war surplus stocks of the War Assets Administration for use in its offices over the country. The sets, originally intended for emergencies on the battlefield, will be needed during the coming blood bank campaign.

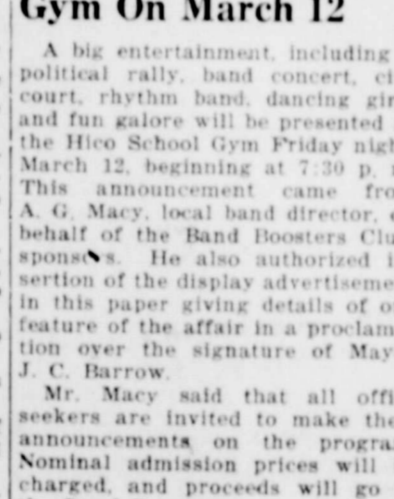
Quotas Set and Chairmen Named For Red Cross Drive

Boy Scouts Discuss Lincoln Day At Recent Meeting

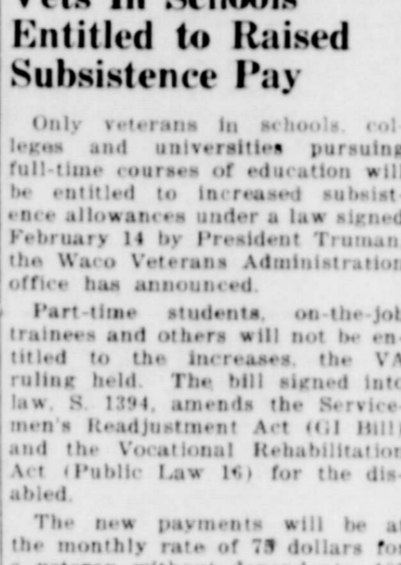

Service Station's Appearance Friday the 13th

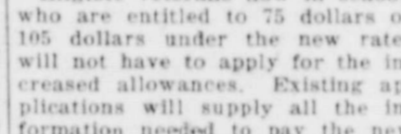

Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District News

C. R. Houston, whose farm is located 6 miles northwest of Hamilton on the Leon River and in the Elza Soil Conservation Group, requested Hamilton-Coryell District assistance in establishing a soil and water conservation program on his farm. A soil survey was made by the Soil Scientist for this and surrounding districts and on the basis of land use capability classes as determined by this survey, a conservation plan was worked out for treating every acre according to its needs and using every acre according to its adaptabilities. Upon the completion of this plan Mr. Houston signed a cooperative agreement with the district. An Application of Soil Conservation Practices meeting was held Monday evening in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Cates, 12 miles south of Hamilton in the North Evans group. Present at the meeting were Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Stephens, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Perkins, Mr. Curtis Stephens and Mr. Haynes Baize. Visitors attending were Messrs. O. B. Graham, Vocational Agriculture teacher, Evans; Dupree Sanders and T. L. Edmondson, Soil Conservation technicians from the Lampasas Unit; Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Farmer of the Trading Post Conservation group, and Mesdames Lee Colwick and J. N. Gerreald. The discussion of practices was principally along the lines of maintaining the productivity of level of crop land by the use of adapted conservation rotation and the improvement of permanent pastures by a proper management program. Accomplishments reported were: R. W. Stephens, 7 acres of Austrian winter peas which have withstood the recent cold weather and are growing very nicely; Curtis Stephens, 30 acres of vetch and rye with superphosphate applied which is growing in a most satisfactory manner; Jack Cates has 30 acres of vetch and rye in his regular rotation. These crops are now furnishing some very good grazing. Portable light plants are included in a sealed bid WAA sale of surplus industrial equipment during February. Sixteen of the 4-hp blasts are offered, along with a locomotive, a steam turbine, an airplane propeller and a quantity of replacement air filters. The sale, subject to standard priority range, ends February 21. Complete listings and information are available at the Grand Prairie Customer Service Center of the WAA.
