"Periodic inspection by trained mechanics or inspectors is the Clarke said. Profesdrivers, such as truck drivers, inspect their vehicles before every trip. That's a good idea for every driver, and it would save a lot of lives.

The Future Farmers of America was originated by Henry C. Groseclose of Virginia twenty-five years ago and today there are 238,269 members, boys averaging 17, and they have \$30,000,000 invested in farming. Ninety per cent of these boys started their project with less than \$25.00 capital. By 1925 the organization in Virginia was statewide. Then seven other states followed and since then the project has spread to every state in the Union, plus Hawaii and Puerto Rico. Each Autumn some 12,000 boys, our future farmers and livestock men, convene in Kansas City in connection with the American Royal Livestock Show.

This year our local boys who are making great strides in their projects have planned to present a livestock show in Hico. The date has been set for March 24, and the place is the City Park. The boys will be busy this week and the weeks to follow in getting entries for the many divisions. They will be around to see you to explain more in detail and secure your entries in beef cattle, dairy cattle, hogs, sheep, goats, chickens, turkeys, horses and dogs. There will also be some home projects in connection with the stock show. If you have entries you want to make and the boys fail to see you, please turn in your entries to Mr. Vandergriff by March 10. Let's get behind our boys and help them put this stock show over. It means a lot to these fellows, they are our futures, and that is very important.

Here is what the FFA program means to our boys: FFA is restricted to Vocational Agriculture students and 70 per cent of the members go into actual farming-where their leadership in modern agricultural methods and community improvements are outstanding. Each member must carry out farm projects and keep adequate records. He must learn to speak in public, must take part in community enterprises and must prepare himself for intelligent citizenship of our State and Nation. Future farming activities are correlated with high school instruction in Vocational Agriculture and so important that the National Government appropriates funds through the Smith-Hughes Act to help carry

The Future Farmers of America are learning by doing and are delving into the agriculture theory and economics, and through this type of training they will be qualified for better and more economical types of farming in the future.

America depends on the soil for her existence and we as Americans are depending on the youth of our land to continue to carry on. Let's get behind our boys and through the Future Farmers of America secure for ourselves the future that the soil holds for us by improved methods. BILL NORTON.




