Austin, March 8 .- "Fire is slowing down the peace effort in this country," said Marvin Hall, State Fire Insurance Commissioner, in commenting ou Governor Jester's proclamation of Spring Clean-Up Week in Texas for April 4-10.

In urging the citizens of this State to participate in this program by removing fire hazards from their homes, institutions and places of business, Hall said that fire was destroying valuable property, raw materials, foodstuffs and other materials vital to the recovery of this nation from a devastating war.

"Almost 550 persons were killed by fire last year," he said, "and nearly 21 million dollars in property was destroyed. The 1947 loss of property was the highest in the

history of this State. Commissioner Hall hopes that every Texan will consider it his individual responsibility to cooperate in helping Spring Clean-Up Week to be a success and in preventing fires, to build an even greater and richer State.
