Dispersal Sale Of Golightly Herd Tuesday

Polled Herefords Go To Number of Buyers, Most of Them Local

W. R. Gallihar of Whitney, topped the list of buyers at the dispersal sale of the G. H. and J. G. Golightly herd of Polled Herefords, held at the Hamilton auction ring last Tuesday afternoon, April 24. Gallihar bought the top sale cow with first calf, being an outstanding bull calf, by paying \$855.00.

Jack Martin of Morgan bid in the largest number, and also put in the second highest bid of \$430 on the sale cow.

Two herd bulls brought \$440 and \$425 respectively.

Hal Thomas acted as auctioneer at the sale which offered 42 cows, 34 calves, 11 yearling heifers and three herd bulls. A check for the total price paid for the herd was said to have been the biggest ever issued at the Hamilton ring.

Satisfactory results were reported from a similar sale of grade cows, held at the same place on the previous Tuesday.

Other bidders and buyers in this week's dispersal sale were Les Cates of Hamilton; Crockett Clossner, Morgan; Grady Wolfe, Clair-ette; W. D. Manning, Hamilton, who purchased several of the good cows with calves by side; G. B. Arnold, Clifton; Lloyd Green & Son, Hamilton, and Ray Lunn of Vicksburg, Miss., who purchased six head.

J. G. Golightly, co-owner of the herd with his father, the late G. H. Golightly, stated that he considered this a good sale. The cattle were sold in pasture condition, and went mostly to local buyers. He expressed his thanks to those who assisted in the dispersal.

Weekly SURPLUS NEWS WAA

Two locations near San Antonio will be swept clean of unneeded war surplus by a War Assets clearance sale on May 12, 13 and 14. The goods are stored in WAA's San Antonio Warehouse Number One, and at army depots of Kelly Field. The total offering will represent materials which cost the government originally a quarter of a million dollars. The lots to be awarded on a high bid basis will include office machines, furniture, textiles, hardware and plumbing, portable electrical power units, industrial machines and miscellaneous auto, motive vehicles. It will be one of the few remaining sales of surplus personal property including sizeable inventory to be held by WAA in Texas. Priority groups and commercial buyers are invited to inspect May 12, with veterans buying May 13, and all others buying May 14.

War Assets extended its rules further this week to accommodate emergency needs of the armed forces. Hereafter all sales announcements will carry the line, "Items currently being purchased by the Federal Government for National Defense are subject to withdrawal up to the time of commitment for sale." This will mean that on all sales offerings of materials conceivable of use to the military, the army, air force, navy and marine commission will have the right to claim goods any time prior to their award to any other buyer or claimant. Generally, any withdrawals will have to be in whole lots rather than in separate items.

Schools and similar non-profit institutions will benefit under an expanded discount program put into effect this week by WAA. Public benefit discounts of 95 percent of their fair value hereafter will be allowed on most types of materials and available in surplus stocks. However, as pointed out by Grand Prairie Regional Director Karl Wallace, eligible schools and other claimants already have received about ten million dollars worth of surplus in the five states of the southwest, pretty well exhausting supplies of a type usable by them.

SERGEANT HELVEY TO TAKE PART IN MANEUVERS

McChord Air Force Base, Washington.—Sgt. Wilfred D. Helvey, son of W. H. Helvey of Hico, Texas, departed recently from McChord AFB, Washington for Pope AFB, North Carolina.

Sergeant Helvey, a member of 7th Squadron of 62nd Troop Carrier Wing, 12th Air Force, left for the East following the advanced part of the Wing which will participate with the Third Army and Ninth Air Force in "Exercise Assembly"—a joint Army-Air Force maneuver to be held along the Kentucky-Tennessee border in the month of May.

As a member of the 7th Squadron, Sergeant Helvey will be in Task Force Lucky, a small, fast-striking, airborne force which will be pitted against an "Aggressor" force.

On completion of the maneuver May 10, the sergeant will return to his home base at McChord.

Review Club Met Last Week With Mrs. J. T. Appleby

The Review Club met April 22 at the home of Mrs. J. T. Appleby, with eleven members present.

Refreshments of canapes, banana nut cake, and frosted ginger ale were served. Suggested subjects for next year's study were turned in to the program committee.

The program consisted of the life of the composer, Engelbert Humperdinck, given by Mrs. E. H. Randals Sr., and discussion of his opera, "Hansel and Gretel," given by Mrs. S. E. Blair Sr.

Engelbert Humperdinck was born in the Rhine Province on September 1, 1854. Though always interested in music, he originally planned to be an architect.

An overture he composed for Goethe's "Claudine von Ullabelle" so impressed the musician Hiller that he persuaded Humperdinck to abandon architecture and enter the conservatory. While on an Italian trip he made the acquaintance of Richard Wagner, who took an immense interest in the composer and invited him to Bayreuth to assist in the preparations for a premiere of "Parsifal."

The opera "Hansel and Gretel" grew out of a fireside play. Humperdinck was invited to compose the music for "The Miracle," produced by Max Reinhardt. The hurried completion of the score told on the composer's health. He suffered an attack of apoplexy from which he never completely recovered. Ten years later the beloved singer and composer died, mourned by all the world.

Humperdinck blazed no paths save perhaps in the utilization of nursery subjects for serious opera. He was content to apply the methods of Wagner and wrote with straightforward sincerity. What he had to say was not of epic character, but it had qualities of tenderness, imagination, humanity and honesty that have endeared it wherever it is known.

The opera, "Hansel and Gretel" is based on the well known and universally beloved fairy tale. Some of the best known songs are "Susy, Dear Susy," "The Sandman Kind Am I," sung when the sandman puts two tired children to sleep in the woods; the "Evening Prayer" sung by the children around whom 14 angels place themselves; and "The Angels Spoke to Us in Dreams," sung by the children whom Hansel and Gretel have liberated from the witch's enchantment.

Veterans' News

World War II veterans are now training in hundreds of different occupational fields under the G-I Bill.

One out of five is preparing for a career in business administration and other general business fields.

A similar number are training for engineering and mechanical occupations.

Nearly one-tenth of all trainees are following agricultural pursuits.

The occupational fields are listed in a Veterans Administration survey of the principal training courses of 2,000,000 veterans studying in schools and colleges and 546,000 training on the job on November 30, 1947. The survey was released this week.

Business administration courses rate first among the veterans attending schools and colleges, with more than 311,000 studying in these fields. Engineering ranks second with 252,000 students. Agriculture with 223,000, is third choice. The 85,000 preparing for teaching careers place education fourth.

Of the veteran students enrolled in colleges and universities when the survey was made, 287,000 in liberal arts courses had not reported their major courses of study.

Among the veterans taking job training, almost 94,000 are training to be mechanics and repairmen. About 77,000 are taking training in business courses, with another 69,000 enrolled for managerial training. About 44,000 are training as metal workers. Close to 41,000 are in electrical courses.
