### Interesting Data In Gilmer - Aiken Committee Report

Most citizens of Hamilton county are willing to pay higher taxes in order to have better schools, it was revealed at a meeting of the Hamilton County Gilmer-Aikin Committee in the Court House at Hamilton Monday night. This conclusion was the result of a questionnaire sent out to parents for Friday night of next week, in all parts of the county. Citizens expressed themselves

five to one in favor of higher taxes in order to have better teaching if the increased funds would bring about the desired improvements They further expressed a collect ive opinion that the minimum salary of the classroom teachers should be \$1710 a year as against an actual minimum of \$1480 as the pay scale now exists. They voted a maximum of \$4600 a year for the best qualified teachers. whereas the highest paid teacher at present is drawing \$2880.

Other results of the survey show that Hamilton county parents think 8 per cent of the teach ers are very poor and that 13 per cent are mediocre. A general sat. isfaction is reflected because 79 per cent of the teachers are judged good or excellent. However, it believed by a majority that some improvements should be made in the quality of teachers, and two out of three of those polled believe that the State should set up higher standards of achievements for teachers.
