Booster Trippers Promised Heavy Attendance During 62nd Reunion Next Week

Parade Opening Day To Introduce One of "Biggest and Best"

Reports from the Reunion Boosters, headed by C. Allison Jr., who has taken the lead in the day's route through the town and communities, that Hico might as well prepare for the biggest attendance ever at next week's 62nd Annual Celebration.

S. J. Cheek Sr., veteran manager of the affair who puts so much work into it that he feels impelled to make each Reunion his last to ramrod, is enthusiastic over the outlook this year and reiterates that this will be the "biggest and best one ever."

Ceremonies will open with the traditional parade, which this year will feature some novel entries. The parade will be held at 3:00 next Wednesday afternoon, following which the address of welcome will be delivered by Jim Barrow, who has accepted appointment as master of ceremonies for the full celebration upon insistence from Cheek and Dr. H. V. Hedges, the present mayor.

Schafer's "Just For Fun" Shows promise additions to their array of shows, rides and attractions, and have already started moving some of their equipment in.

Square dancing, fiddling, and similar entertainment under the pavilion at City Park will as usual attract many visitors. Political speakers are being contacted, and a well-rounded program is in sight.

This week's edition is devoted largely to invitations and welcoming messages from Hico's merchants who are joined by the entire citizenship in opening the gates of the city for the annual entertainment which attracts so many visitors from near and far.

AAA Secretary At Hamilton Addresses Message to Farmers

Jim Gilbreath, AAA Secretary at Hamilton, who was in Hico Tuesday morning, requested publication of the following notice to farmers of this area:

"August 2, 1948 is the date that the A. A. A. office will begin issuing Prior Approvals for 20 per cent Superphosphate. The amount is limited to 3,000 pounds per farm or producer. No Phosphate will be issued to alfalfa.

"This office still has funds for carrying out the following practices: Terracing, Diversion and Drainage Ditches, Tanks, Eradication.

"This office has Approvals for about 60 stock tanks, several miles of terraces and approximately 1000 acres of eradication.

"If you are planning to carry out any of these practices, it will be well to make arrangements as soon as possible, as our funds are limited.

"If you have not been contacted on your 1948 peanut crop, please get in touch with this office as soon as possible, as it is necessary that the 1948 peanut acreage be measured.

Weekly SURPLUS NEWS WAA

Veterans, state and local governments and non-profit institutions have only four weeks left to claim preference in purchasing surplus personnel property. Existing priorities will be eliminated by order of Congress, on August 31.

War Assets Administration will, however, continue to accord prior claim rights to federal agencies, particularly those having to do with national defense. And general offerings of consumer goods will be made in such a way that individual veterans and representatives of small businesses will have as favorable an opportunity to purchase as any other buyers.

Top Texas sale for veterans and others before the priorities are abolished will be an offering of about \$25,000 worth of merchandise at the Amarillo Air Base. Included will be 11 vehicles, to be sold on a bid basis to veterans only. Other lots, which all buyers are invited to bid on, will consist of steel cots and bunk beds, gas ranges, nuts, bolts and screws and numerous small miscellaneous items. Sale will be held the morning of August 5, with inspection the day before.

Now is the time for people who need surplus housing to get bid forms and mail in their offers to War Assets Administration. Currently, buildings at both Camp Bowie, Brownwood, and Camp Swift, Bastrop, are up for sale by the sealed bid method. Arrangements for inspecting the various structures may be made with camp facility managers. Letters should be addressed to WAA's Office of Realty, P. O. Box 6030, Dallas.

A sizeable offering of surplus materials will go on the bid block in Houston August 5. Office furniture and machines, scrap steel and lumber, vehicles and general miscellaneous products will be grouped for veterans and other bidders. Inspection may be completed August 2, 3 and 4. The spot bid awards will be made at the WAA Warehouse 6, 4600 Clinton Drive, Houston, starting at 9 a.m.

Buildings, fixtures, and utilities of two former air fields in Texas are being placed on the market by WAA. At the Pampa Air Field, water and sewage facilities, the above ground gas system, and various types of GI buildings are offered on a sealed bid basis, with priorities to expire August 16 and remaining property going to the general public. At the Abilene Air Field, one large recreation building is available to government agencies and non-profit institutions only until a cut-off date of August 10.

Believe it or not, some people working for the government don't like government red tape either. One War Assets employee, Robert F. McDonald of Dallas, decided to try to do some slashing by submitting a recommendation that numerous record forms be combined into a single pending case form to consolidate and keep surplus property transactions up to date. This week his idea won \$20 in an employee suggestion campaign and some words of praise from his boss, WAA Regional Director Karl E. Wallace.

Veterans' News

Next Saturday, July 31, is the last opportunity for World War 2 veterans to reinstate lapsed National Service Life Insurance on a "comparative health" basis, VA has announced.

All VA offices in the Dallas Franch Area of Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi will remain open Saturday so that veterans may reinstate under present liberal regulations.

After Saturday, veterans whose insurance has been lapsed more than three months must take physical examinations to qualify as insurable risks.

To reinstate on a comparative health basis, veterans need only fill out a simple application form, in which they certify that their health is as good as when the policy lapsed, and pay premiums for two months to reinstate their NSLI policies.

REASSIGNMENT ON RURAL ROUTES OUT OF HICO

Orders have been received at the Hico post office for a reassignment of rural carriers on routes out of Hico, according to R. B. Jackson, postmaster. The new arrangement will become effective August 1.

Morse Ross has been appointed carrier following a recent civil service examination. He will replace J. R. Bobo, temporary carrier since retirement of R. L. Beaman several years ago.

J. P. Rodgers reports that the route formerly assigned to Bobo has been re-assigned to him, and that the route he has been serving will be served by Ross.

Following a campaign season featured by listlessness and — in some cases — almost contempt of the voters so far as campaigning was concerned, a fair turnout of them went to the polls Saturday and cast their ballots in a way that they won't be bothered much the rest of the year.

Four hundred and thirty-some odd registered their choice in the local box, according to a midnight report after tabulation.

Fern Jordan, running for a second term as Commissioner of Precinct 3, won handsily over Bob Hancock, a former commissioner, by around three to one. The local vote in this race comes from boxes at Hico, Carlton, Olin and Fairy.

N. Y. Terral, incumbent, was renominated sheriff of Hamilton County by a 450-vote margin over his only opponent, Bob Sullivan, in the only contest for county office. Hico voted almost two to one for Sullivan.

W. A. (Son) Shofner of Temple carried the Hico box, along with the rest of the 21st Senatorial District when he won a majority over W. W. (Red) Roark and W. A. Ferguson. He will be one of the only two new faces in the State Senate next year.

Public Invited to Visit Parade Float Later At Reunion

Odus Petsick, president of the First National Bank in Hico, announced this week that this progressive banking institution had made arrangements for the cooperation of the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District in sponsoring an educational exhibit for the Reunion, featuring soil conservation.

R. C. Madeley, district conservationist at Stephenville, has agreed to take charge of the technical details connected with the exhibit, in which he will be assisted by J. N. Gearreid who is in charge of the Hamilton office of the local soil conservation district. Supervisors for the district are Cliff Tinkle, Glenn Riley, Elmo Newsom, Virgil Lockhart, and Sam Powell.

The exhibit, featuring pictures and modern practices, and various phases of conserving cultivated land, will be mounted on a large float which will be entered in the Reunion parade next Wednesday. After the parade, the float will be taken to the park where it is hoped that farmers and interested citizens will call and inspect it.

Both Mr. Petsick and Mr. Madeley emphasize the fact that this money and effort is being spent for the purpose of helping in the soil conservation movement which is considered so important by those who have studied the situation. They are especially enthusiastic over the way the work has started in this section, and anxious to promote it in any way they can so that the coming years will find a country better suited to farming than before, instead of washed away and eroded through carelessness and improper methods of farming.

Nix, tax assessor-collector. Joe Eldson was unopposed for county attorney. W. A. Patterson was renamed as county chairman, A. A. Brown as precinct chairman at Hico, L. L. Hudson as justice of the peace, and B. F. Williams as constable.

Elmo White, county Clerk of Erath County, won his race as usual.

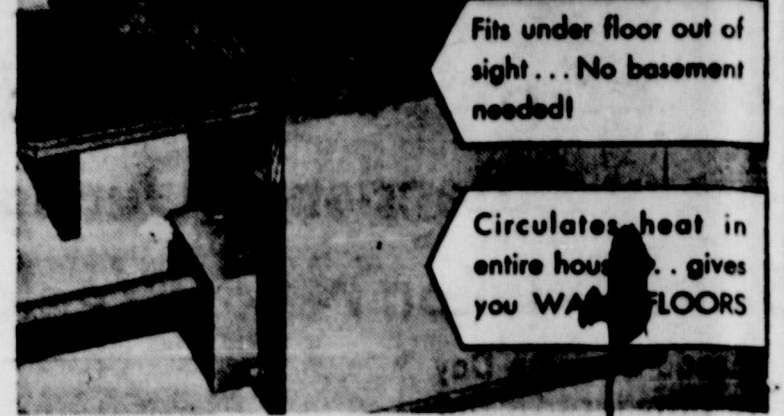

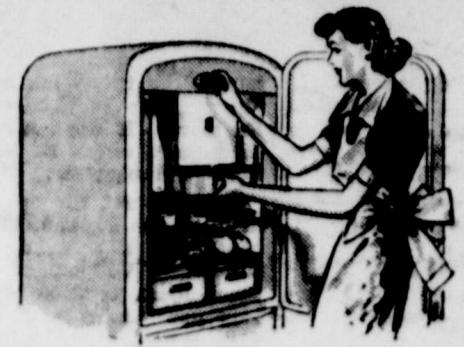

HELP YOUR REFRIGERATOR SERVE YOU BETTER



DEFROST whenever frost reaches thickness of one-quarter inch

Thick frost retards coldmaking, makes your refrigerator run longer, increases operating cost. It should be removed whenever it becomes one-quarter of an inch thick. It is necessary to defrost more often in summer than in winter because of more moisture in the air and greater use of your refrigerator.

A Quick Method of Defrosting

Empty defrosting tray and turn control to "off." Remove ice trays and frozen foods from freezer. (If latter are wrapped in several thicknesses of paper and placed on refrigerator shelf, they won't thaw out in short time it takes to defrost.) Fill proper-sized pans with very hot water and place on shelves of freezer. Use fresh hot water as needed.

When frost has melted wash freezer with weak solution of baking soda and lukewarm water. Clean food compartment, wash thoroughly with baking soda solution and wipe dry. Empty drip pan, replace ice trays and frozen foods and start freezing. The entire operation should take only 20 to 30 minutes.

The Best Time of Day to Defrost

During the hot summer months it's best to defrost in the late evening just before bedtime, when the refrigerator has less work to do. If you defrost during the middle of the day, the refrigerator may run excessively when started up, because of the heat, frequent door openings and warm foods being placed in food compartment.

**Increased Funds for
Farm Operating Credit
Announced by F. H. A.**

An increase in appropriations
for farm operating credit for the
fiscal year that began July 1, was
announced this week by L. J. Cap-
pleman, State Director of the
Farmers Home Administration,
through Charles B. Williams Jr.,
County Supervisor.

The amount for operating loans
in Texas is \$6,940,000.00, a 20 per-
cent increase over last year's
funds. "We expect to provide
these loans to 2500 more families
this year than last," Mr. Capple-
man said.

The agency is also authorized to
insure farm real estate loans made
by private lenders. For direct
farm ownership loans in the State
it has \$100,000.00, which is the same
as last year.

Direct or insured farm purchase
loans are available to qualified
farmers, tenants, sharecroppers,
and veterans who can find sound-
value farms, and who can't get the
credit they need anywhere else.

"Loans are made or insured only
on farms that will pay out in
terms of their longrange earning
capacity," Mr. Williams, County
Supervisor, said, "rather than at
today's relatively high farm
prices."

The Farmers Home Administra-
tion also has funds for water fac-
ility loans in the 17 Western States.
Texas will participate in loans for
water facilities in the amount of
\$170,000.00.

Changes recently made in the
insured mortgage programs are de-
signed to broaden opportunities
for family type farmers to become
farm owners. Lenders now get 3
percent interest instead of 2 1/2
percent. Borrowers pay 4 percent
interest on both direct and insured
loans, with the 1 percent differ-
ence in insured loans going to the
Farmers Home Administration for
insurance charges and administra-
tive expenses. The agency services
the loan without extra cost to the
borrower or to the credit institu-
tion.

Lenders now have an assured
market for the mortgages. From
now on they may turn over the
mortgages to the government after
seven years, and be paid in full.
It is felt that these revisions in the
Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant
Act will provide a greater incen-
tive to private lenders to help farm-
ers buy farms.

As formerly, all types of loans
will be accompanied by supervi-
sion in good farm practices.

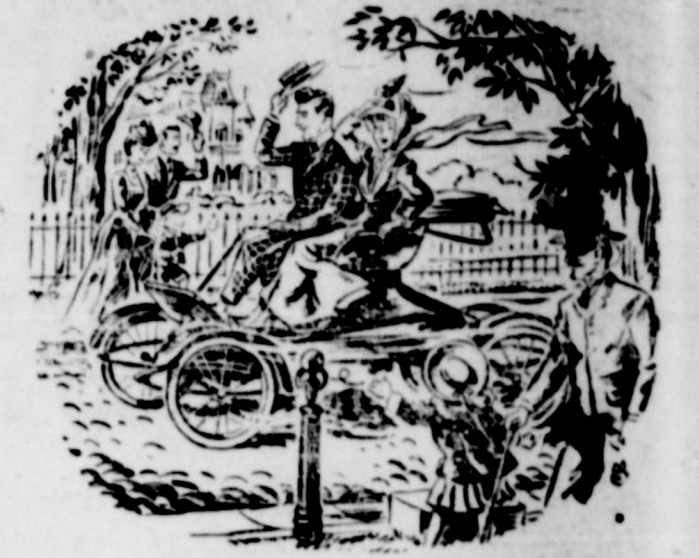

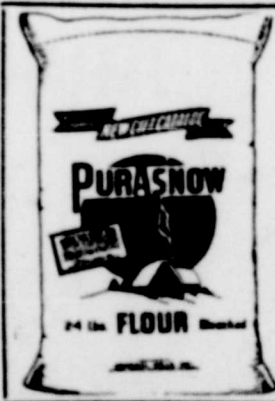

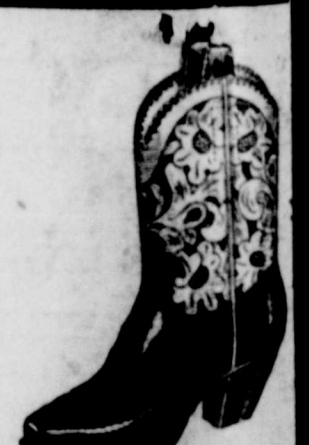
