influenza Incidence In Texas Surpasses Seven-Year Median

Austin, Texas, Sept. 27.-The 414 ases of influenza reported in Texas last week, bring the incidence of this disease up to forty median, as shown from the figures submitted by 181 counties sending in reports to the Steate Health Department.

Influenza without complications reveals. may be a fairly mild ailment, according to Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, but, he pointed out, complications car turn this disease into a dangerous condition very quickly.

"Many cases of influenza are

mild," Dr. Cox said. "Often they able-bodied. lend themselves to treatment read-However, two important factors enter into the treatment of influenza, and they are, calling the family physican as soon as the first symptons appear, and taking life very easy for a reasonable length of time after the acute stage has subsided."

Dr. Cox declared that influenza ngt mass-controllable. He emed that maintaining the ghest possible health level at all es affords an individual the pest protection from contracting

Getting plenty of sleep and rest, laily exercise in the open, nourshing foods, and strict personal ygiene are our best known defenses. A person who avoids all habits and practices detrimental to a maximum well-being and thus builds up a strong resistance to disease, is much less likely to conract influenza than is the individual who does not guard his health in this manner."



The physically disabled, when per cent more than the seven year properly placed, make slightly FORMER HICOAN PASSES better workers than the ablebodied, a study prepared by the U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics for the Veterans Administration

The study matched the work of some 11,0000 impaired and 18,000 unimpaired employees in all major industries. The survey discloses the following:

1. Handicaped workers suffered fewer serious accidents than the

2. The disabled experienced the same number of minor injuries as their able-bodied fellow workers. 3. Production records of the impaired were higher than records of the unimpaired.

4. The disabled were absent from work more frequently than the ablebodied.

5. The voluntary quit rate of the handicapped was higher than the the able-bodied.

According to the study, impaired workers experienced 8.9 serious disabling accidents per 1,000,000 man-hours worked, compared with 9.5 accidents for the able-bodied.

Both Measures Get Approval of Voters By 3 to 1 Majority

Voters of Hico County Line Independent School District last Saturday at the polls adopted two measures presented to them necessary for keeping the local schools in step with progress.

There were two ballots. One was for the issuance of \$50,000 in bonds for erecting a new grammar school building and remodeling present structures, and the other was for an increase in the tax rate from \$1.00 to \$1.40 as an enabling measure

An unoffical report from the polls, presided over by A. A. Brown, at the close of balloting disclosed that both measures had been approved by more than three to one, with more than 250 ballots registered. The offical canvas was to be made by the School Board, but has not yet been re-There was a difference of only two or three votes in the majorities polled for each proposition, it was reported.

W. M. Horsley, secretary of the local school board, was busy Thursday making arrangements to have the buildings recently purchased from Camp Hood moved to Hico. Present plans, he said called for moving intact three of the nine that have been arranged for, and wrecking the others for materials. He feels that the board has been fortunate in securing these particular surplus buildings, and is enthusiatic over the outlook for improving the school plant at the least possible cost, in spite of higher building

Detailed plans for construction and remodeling are still in the formative stage, Horsley said, but no time will be lost in getting things ready for the improvements and enlargement authorized. Several plans have been presented, which are all being considered, and at the earliest possible date the board hopes to have the building program under control.

Ordinarily the immunity pro vided by diphtheria toxoid lasts a child until he is of age, however a Shick test should be given be fore the child enters school. needed, an additional shot of tox. old should be administered.


