"Last Tuesday Cornelius Johnson, Ed Wade and Alex Bragg, all colored, went from Whitney in the employ of the Texas Central railroad to load cotton on cars from the depot wharf at Hico as enough workers could not be procured there. Hico is a non-negro town, and the three boys had hardly alighted when they were surrounded by a threatening They returned on crowd. the next train without loading the cotton.'
