County Voters Favor Republican Candidates

Parmer County voters, turning out in near record numbers for a governor's race, generally favored the Republican candidates in Tuesday's general election.

Like most of their neighboring Panhandle counties on Tuesday, Parmer County gave its margin to "good old boy" Clayton Williams, 1288, to Ann Richards' 685.

Ms. Richards upset the free-spending Williams campaign, in spite of last-minute personal appearances on his behalf by President George Bush and Senator Phil Gramm.

Richards received a majority only in the Bovina precinct, a traditionally Democratic box that gave the governor-elect 140 votes to 135 for Williams.

Richards' biggest vote total was in Friona's 2-1 precinct, with 149 votes, but that was just 35 per cent of the vote. Her campaign had said if she beat 40 per cent in the predominately-conservative Pan-

handle, it would help her win, and she managed to do that in several counties.

County voters gave incumbent Sen. Gramm a big margin, 1417-678 over Hugh Parmer. Gramm had visited the county several times during the past year.

One of a few Democrats given the majority here was to John Sharp, in the Comptroller's race vacated by Bob Bullock. Sharp received 1213 votes to Warren G. Harding's 703. The "famous name" failed statewide as well.

Parmer County gave a 70.1 edge to Rick Perry in his successful bid to unseat controversial Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower. The vote was 1469 to 627. Perry scored a narrow win overall.

Area voters also favored Amarillo's Morris Overstreet, 1208 votes to 850 for Louis Sturns, as Overstreet became the first Afro-American to win a statewide office, on the Judge of the Court

of Criminal Appeals, Place 5.

County voters favored Rob Mosbacher over Bob Bullock in the lieutenant governor's race, 1120-971, although Bullock prevailed in statewide voting.

Also favored were Buster Brown (R) over Dan Morales (D) in the Attorney General's race, 1199-812; Kay Bailey Hutchison (R) over Nikki Van Hightower (D) for State Treasurer, 1245-770; Gary Mauro (D) over Wes Gilbreath (R) for Land Commissioner, 1035-869.

Beau Boulter (R) was favored over Bob Krueger (D) in the race for Kent Hance's Railroad Commission seat, 1118-906. Krueger was elected, however.

Tom Phillips (R) got the nod over Oscar Mauzy (D) for the Supreme Court, 1404-624; Bob Gammage (D) won over Charles Ben Howell (R) for the Supreme Court, 994-872.

County voters approved the constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and other offices and to provide for filling vacancies, 848-740.

Total vote by precinct was as follows: Black (1) 36; Friona (2) 115; Friona (2-1) 479; Friona (2-2) 177; Bovina (3) 311; Farwell (4) 416; Lazbuddie (5) 156; Oklahoma Lane (6) 142; Rhea (7) 49; Lakeview (8) 66; and absentee, 217. Total vote: 2164.

Area Receives First Snowfall

The first snowfall of the season was experienced here last Saturday, on a day that featured rain, snow and sleet.

A total of .71 inches of moisture was measured during the day. More than half of it fell in the form of rainfall as the temperature was just above freezing. But about noon it changed off into snow, and around two inches fell. Some of the snow melted, but a good inch was still evident the next morning.

The coldest blast came on Wednesday, when the high temperature reached only 29 degrees, but a predicted snow failed to materialize. However, another .10 inch of moisture was logged. It was sleeting again on Wednesday, then a light rain Thursday morning.

The moisture called a halt to the area's harvest operations.

60 YEARS AGO--NOV. 7, 1930

A telegram received by J.D. Thomas, attorney for the Friona Independent School District, states that the attorney general of Texas has approved the bonds for Friona's new \$60,000 school building, voted at a recent election and which have been in controversy since that time. This action wipes away all legal opposition to the sale of the bonds which will be sold immediately, and work of construction of the new building will go forward at once. The school building which will be erected at the north end of the athletic field, will be 250 feet long and 85 feet wide. It will be one story high and contain a large study hall, gymnasium and nine classrooms, and will relieve the present congestion in our schools.

55 YEARS AGO--NOV. 1, 1935

County Agent Alex R. Bateman has notified the wheat growers of the county that Saturday, November 9, will be the closing date for making application for signing wheat contracts and requests all who are interested in signing one of these contracts to call at the Maurer building previous to that time and make their application for contract.

50 YEARS AGO--NOV. 1, 1940

The contractor, who has the job of building the new club house, now being erected by the members of the Friona Woman's Club, with his force of workmen, have been making rapid progress with their work, and the building will soon be ready for use. It is a frame building with a veneer of red and gray stone, which when completed, will make of it one of the most picturesque buildings in Friona.

The Christmas Gift Shop at the Veteran's Hospital for the veterans in the hospital will be held December 9, 10 and 11 and anyone interested in working with this program is welcome to attend.

A large Christmas tree will be placed and decorated in the lobby of the VA Hospital, November 25 and all are invited to help with this at 2 p.m.

The local American Legion and Auxiliary meets the fourth Thursday night of the month at the local hall, 119 West Sixth Street, at 7:30 p.m.

Bovina nine-mile strip was assured this week with a letter from District Highway Engineer S.C. McCarty to Parmer County officials. This project, costing some \$84,000.00 is financed through state and federal funds under the Farm-to-Market portion of the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1950, and it is scheduled for construction some time within the next two years. Likely its construction will commence next summer, but it is part of a two-year program now being formulated by the highway department.

35 YEARS AGO--OCT. 28, 1955

The City of Friona this week was tendered deed to the acres of land, covering the present cemetery sight, for care and development as a perpetual care park. G.B. Buske, cemetery association president, and the director delivered the deed to the city after several conferences and discussions, wherein all agreed upon need of cemetery improvement. Lots will be sold by the city, and for some time the cemetery association also will assist in lot sales.

The Friona High School Band

passed another milestone in its history Tuesday night in the Buffalo Stadium at Canyon. The band entered the marching contest for the first time and received a superior or first place rating for its performance.

30 YEARS AGO--OCT. 27, 1960

Sealed bids were opened Tuesday afternoon at Parmer County Community Hospital on the hospital's proposed addition. Panhandle Engineers and Construction Co. of Amarillo submitted a low bid of \$53,263. Seven other bids were submitted ranging to \$64,792. The addition will contain 3,250 square feet and will extend from the main entrance of the hospital south for 108 feet. Part of the present building will also be altered and changes will be made in office arrangements. McMurty and Craig are architects for the addition. If the Amarillo firm's bid is accepted by the directors, work may be completed soon since the bid only specified 84 calendar days for construction time.

25 YEARS AGO--OCT. 28, 1965

Deposits at Friona State Bank as

of October 1, showed a healthy climb of 17.2 per cent over the total for the same date a year ago, a quarterly statement issued by the bank revealed this week. Total deposits as of October 1 this year stood at \$6,492,126.17, which was a net gain of \$947,868.77 over the figure of \$4,544,257.40 which was on deposit at the bank October 1 of 1964.

20 YEARS AGO--OCT. 29, 1970

The new Community Shelter Plan for Parmer County indicates that there is public shelter for most of our people, according to County Judge Archie Tarter. The plan provides official information that will tell the people what they need to know to have the best chances for survival in the event of a nuclear attack.

5 YEARS AGO--NOV. 10, 1985

A 21.4 mile section of State Highway 86, from south of Bovina to the East Parmer County line, will be rebuilt beginning next year as part of a major highway rehabilitation program approved by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation Commission.

Villarreal Writes From Saudi Arabia

David Villarreal, a graduate of Bovina High School, has been in Saudi Arabia since August 28. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Zeferino Villarreal of Bovina, and has been in the Army three years.

Following is a letter he wrote to Scooter Russell, a neighbor, and readers of the Bovina Blade:

Dear Scooter,
I hope everyone at home is doing well. I'm doing fine.

I want to take this opportunity to thank you for sending me the Bovina Blade. It was really nice to learn about news from home.

Well, Saudi Arabia is just what I had expected, with the exception of a few things. For example, the Arabian nights, which stories fail to mention, are extremely cold.

When we first arrived, the temperatures for the day would range from 110°-130°, now they stay pretty much around 110°. However, at night, it gets down to about 70°. The temperature being hot throughout the day makes 70° feel as though it were freezing. Soon it should get down to 50°-60° at night. Also, the flies are horrible. I have never seen so many flies.

Being that my job is an Arabic linguist, I studied the Arabic language, culture and customs. Therefore, the culture was not a big shock as it might have been for others. We do not have the opportunity to interact with the natives very often. However, the times that I have encountered them, they have been very friendly, for the most part.

The people, in general, have had misconceptions of us, as we have had about them. This may be the cause of some problems in our world today. We should continue

to expand our knowledge of other cultures in the hopes of one day, obtaining better international relations.

Most everyone here is getting homesick, especially since the holidays are coming up. Letters from families and friends help to ease the boredom. Receiving letters from home is like Christmas around here.

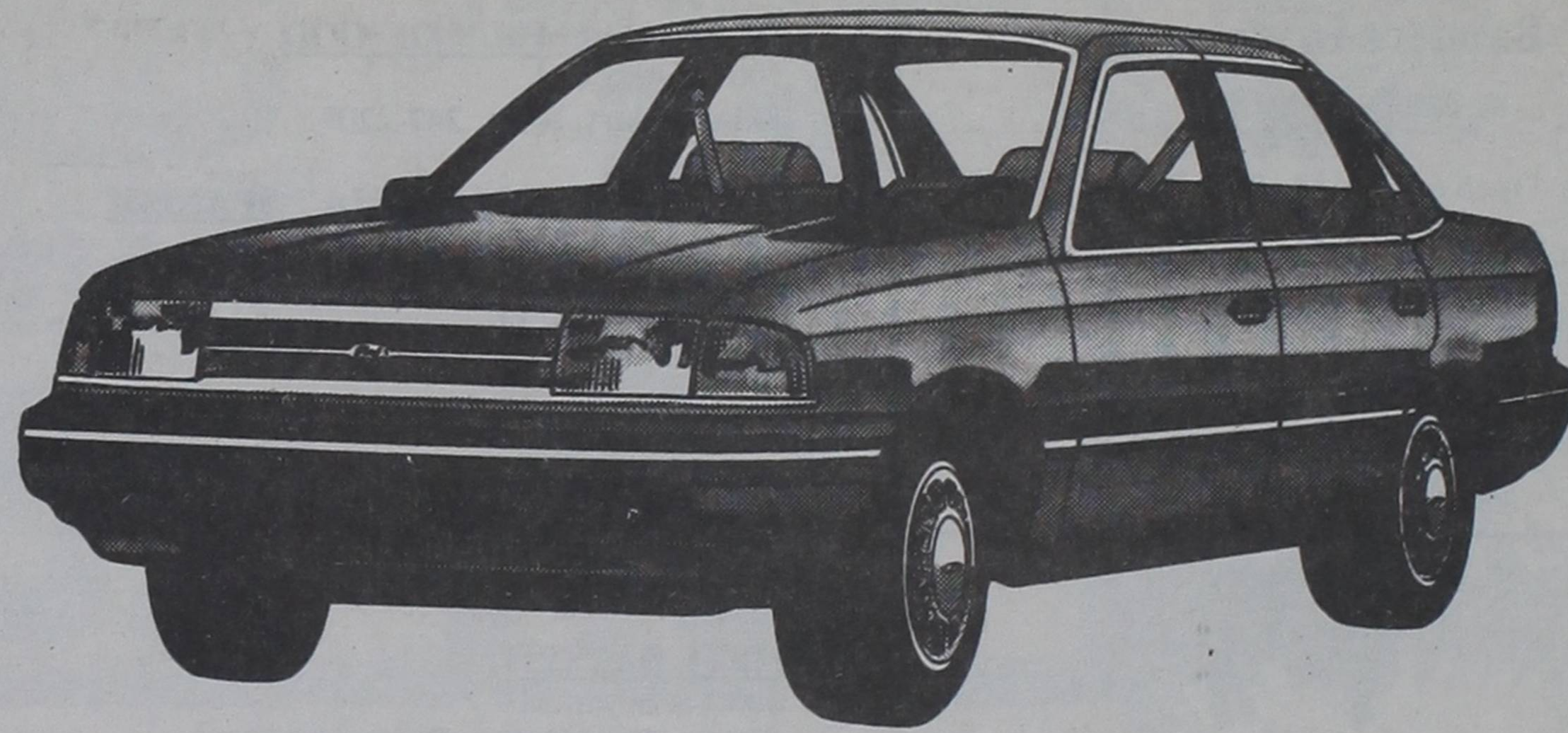

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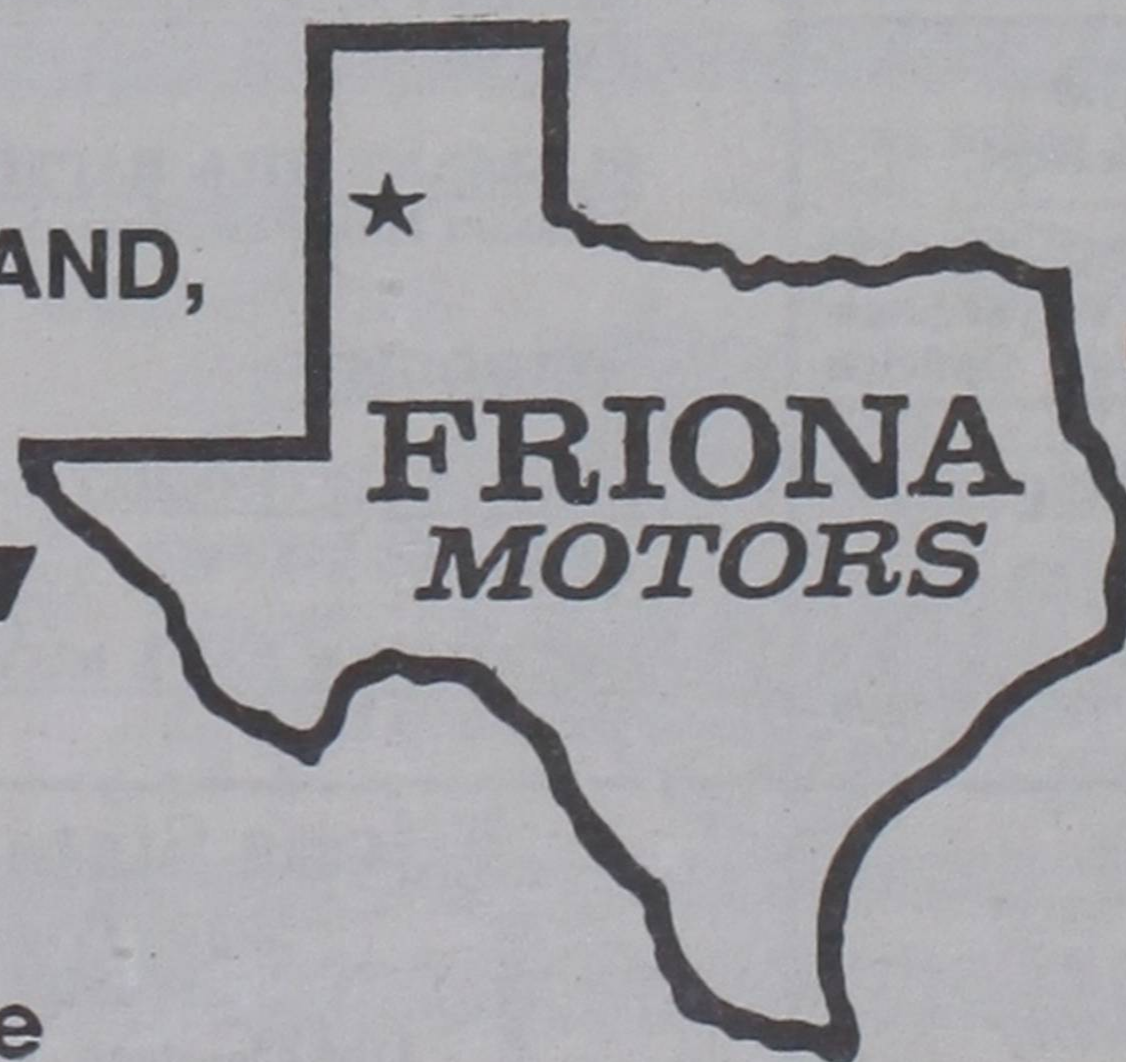

Daniel Echols Has Best Game At SMU

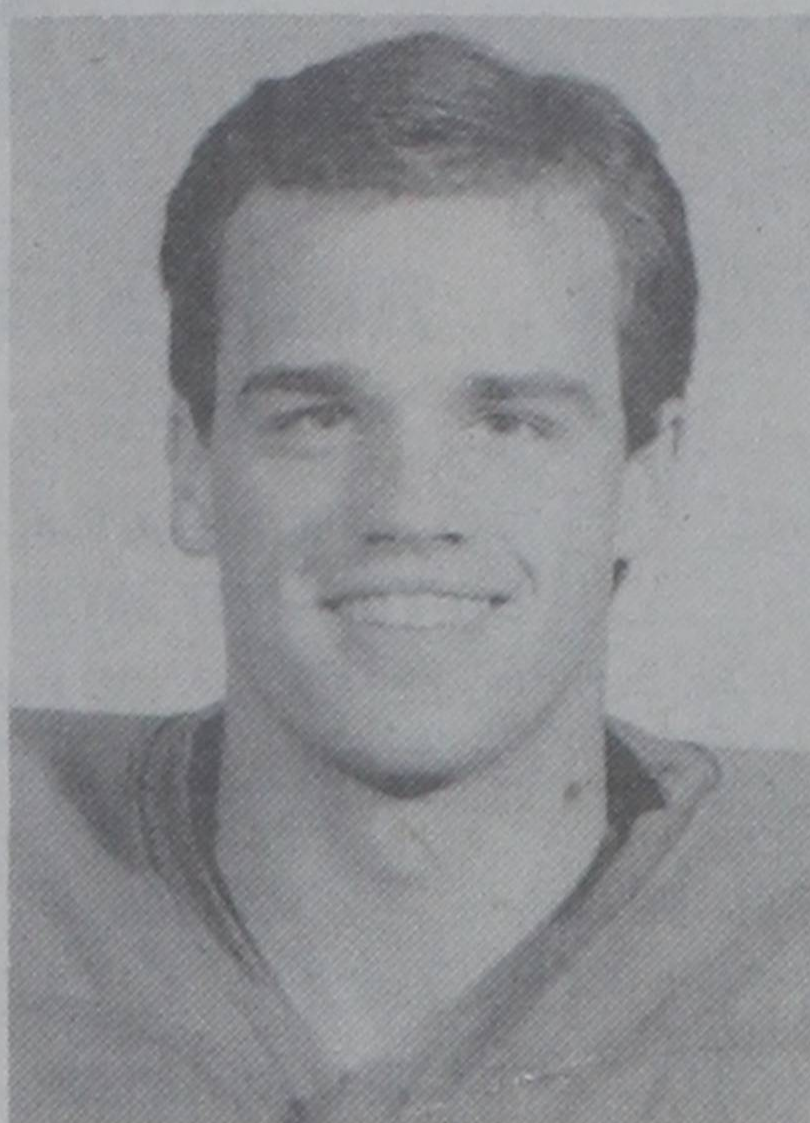

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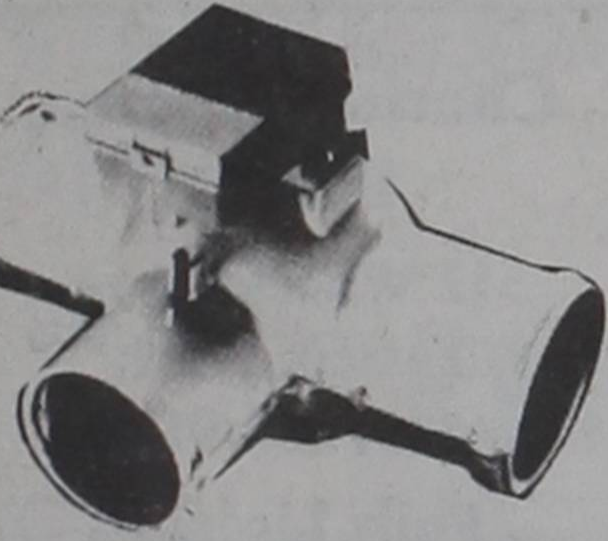

Good Defense Seen vs DHS

In spite of a super defensive performance, the Friona Chieftains lost their seventh straight game-sixth by shutout to visiting Dimmitt here last Friday.

The Bobcats took a 36-0 win to move into a four way tie for first place in tough District 2-AAA.

"I was encouraged by the way we played. I felt we played exceptionally well on defense. But offensively, we just miss a block, drop a pass, or something to keep the offense from moving," said Chieftain Coach Steve Williams.

The Chiefs, who had been buffeted with five consecutive shutout losses going into the game, may have surprised the Bobcats by repulsing their first four offensive possessions—a first in district play, including a pair of brilliant goal-line stands in the first quarter.

A 42-yard run by Armando Arce set up the Bobcats with a first and goal situation at Friona's six-yard line. But on the next play FHS linebacker Steven Dickson met halfback Johnny Oretagon head-on, and the Dimmitt lad came loose from the ball, Friona recovering.

Only two plays later, freshman quarterback Blair Burney was intercepted by Lincoln Stewart of the 'Cats, who made a leaping catch at the Friona 38-yard line. That set up Friona's second successful goal-line stand.

Stewart ran ten yards giving Dimmitt a first and goal at Friona's four, and even the most stalwart Chieftain fan wouldn't have given the team much of a chance.

But three plays found the Bobcats still on the one, and on fourth down they went for all the marbles. Linebacker Chad

Hamilton rushed through to tackle quarterback Freddy Martines for an eight-yard loss and Friona took over on downs.

Curtis Brady ripped for an eight-yard gain on second down, but on third down he was separated from the ball and Dimmitt was back in business at the Friona five-yard line.

This time the Bobcats were not denied, scoring on a pass play for a 7-0 lead.

Omar Saenz gave Friona its first first down with three straight gains, and Burney hit Hamilton for a 15-yard gain across midfield, as things perked up for the Chieftains.

But facing fourth and one at the Dimmitt 40, a pitchout to Brady went awry, and Dimmitt took over.

Two possessions later the Bobcats drove 46 yards for their second score, and led at the half 14-0 despite a good performance by the Chiefs.

In fact, Friona held the 'Cats to just one TD in the third quarter, which ended with a 22-0 score.

But the 'Cats were point-hungry. They took to the air with five straight passes to score with 3:19 to play for a 29-0 edge, and then called time out with 50 seconds left and that allowed their final TD, which came with 33 ticks left on the clock.

The Dimmitt coach explained the time out, saying he had his wrong team on the field after expecting a Friona punt on fourth down. For whatever reason, the stopped clock allowed the 'Cats to win by their favored ratio, although those watching the game knew it should have been 22 or 29-0.

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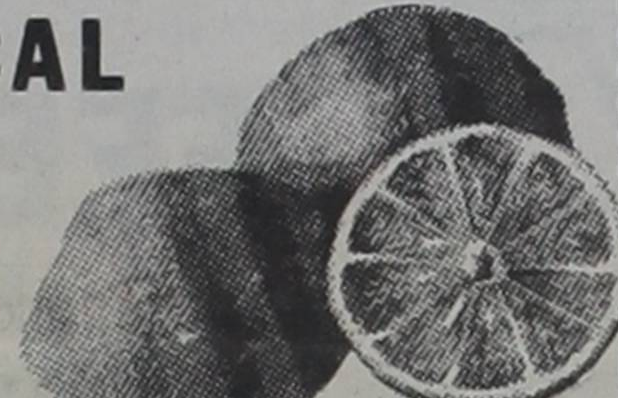

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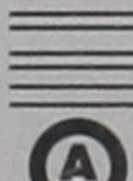

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- * A gaseous or hydrocarbon odor

If you suspect a natural gas leak in an area where American Pipeline or Westar Transmission markers are located, immediately leave the area and call us at our toll free number, 1-800-562-5879.

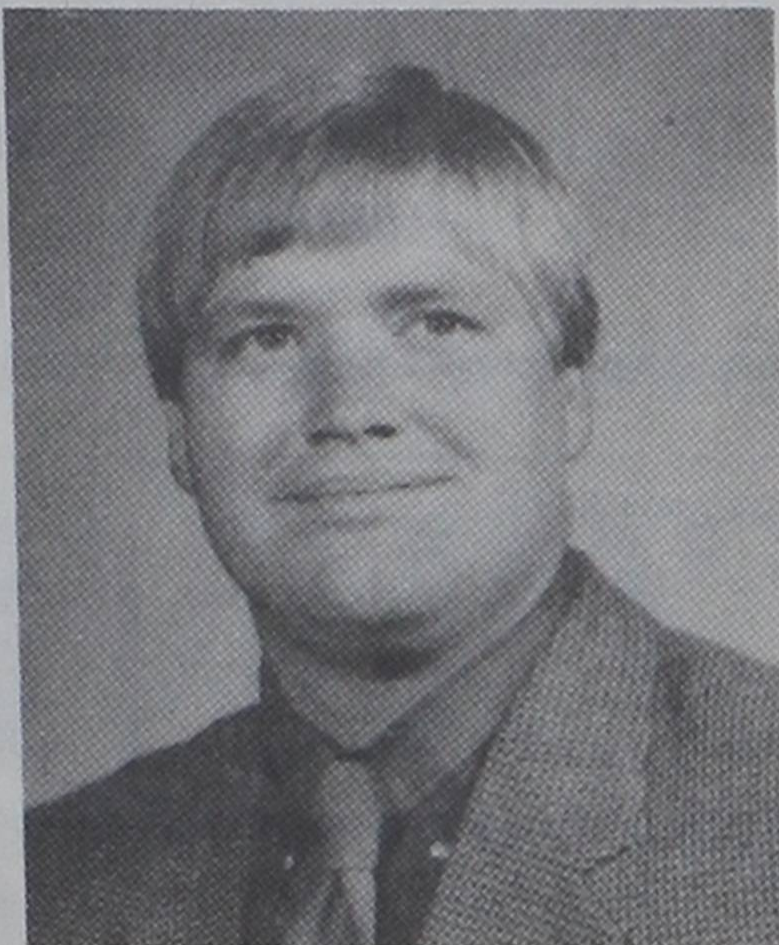
L. Burnam Honored By S-FC

So, once again, I am forced to be left with only a memory. What a memory he left me!

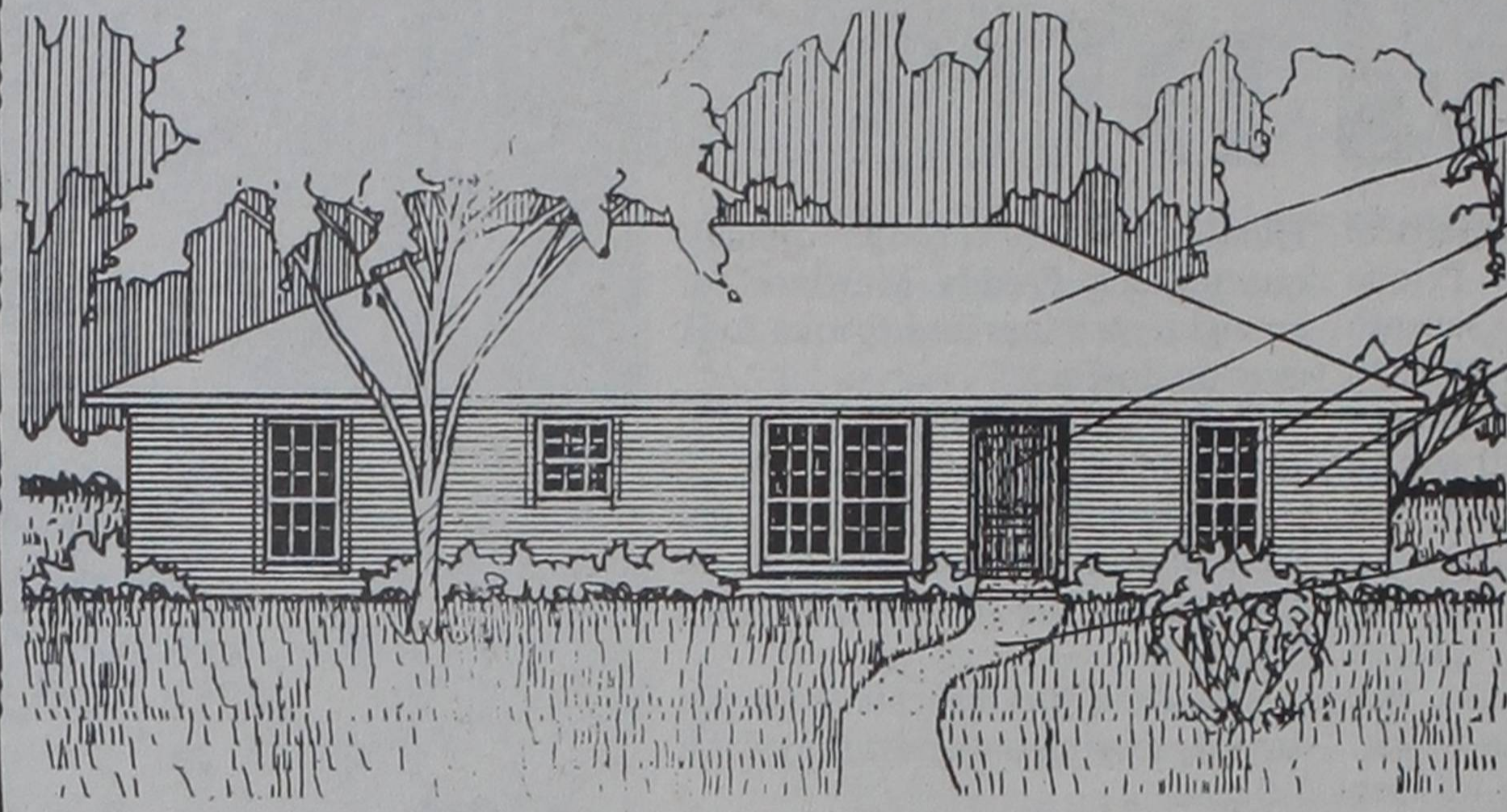

Know How To Value Your Mutual Fund

While reviewing his annual mutual fund statement, an investor once noted that the net asset value of his mutual fund shares had increased only 36 cents per share in a 12-month period. "This investment is going nowhere fast," he protested.

The man had failed to consider accumulation of shares, a very important feature of mutual funds that is achieved by reinvesting all income and gains into additional shares rather than taking them in cash. This feature is so often overlooked or misunderstood by mutual fund shareowners that a brief review is always beneficial.

Mutual funds are required to distribute at least 90 percent of all investment profits. This is done by paying dividends, which consist of (1) capital gains recognized by the fund from the sale of securities and (2) income paid to the fund from interest or dividends on the portfolio.

The choice of whether to accept these mutual fund distributions in cash or to reinvest them in additional shares of the fund is yours. Regardless of the choice—cash or reinvestment—taxes are due on the distributions during the tax year they are declared. And if you

elect to receive all distributions in cash, the number of fund shares you own remains constant.

If, on the other hand, you choose to reinvest the dividend distributions in additional shares, the number of shares you own increases and compounds.

When measuring the performance of your fund, these distributions must be considered. Because the fund distributes most of its profits and income to investors, the quoted price of the fund could remain relatively unchanged while you continue to receive dividends.

In our shareholder's case, he owned 720 shares valued at \$12,556 at the beginning of the year. At the end of the year, by reinvesting income and gains, he owned 773 shares, 53 shares more, valued at \$13,759. This represented a dollar increase in value of \$1,203 or a 9.58 percent increase. As our shareholder pointed out, however, the value of each share had increased only 36 cents.

This example illustrates the importance of considering the number of shares owned or accumulated, any dividends received in cash, and finally, the power of compounding when measuring the performance of your mutual fund.

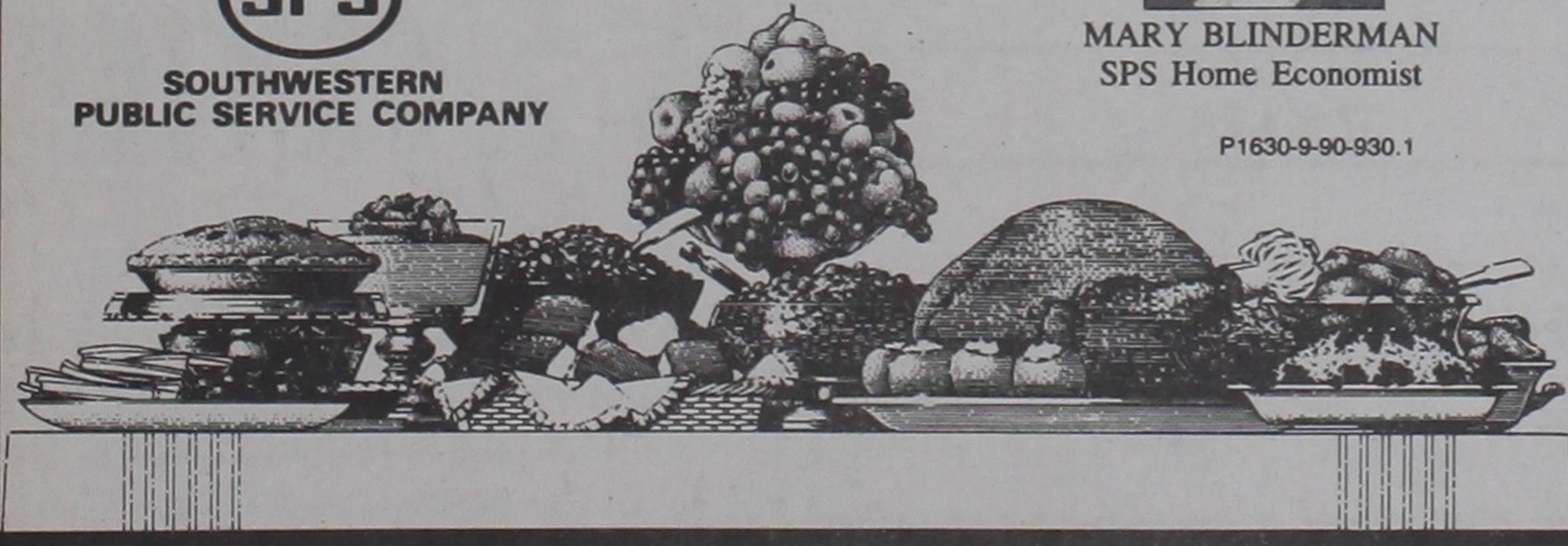

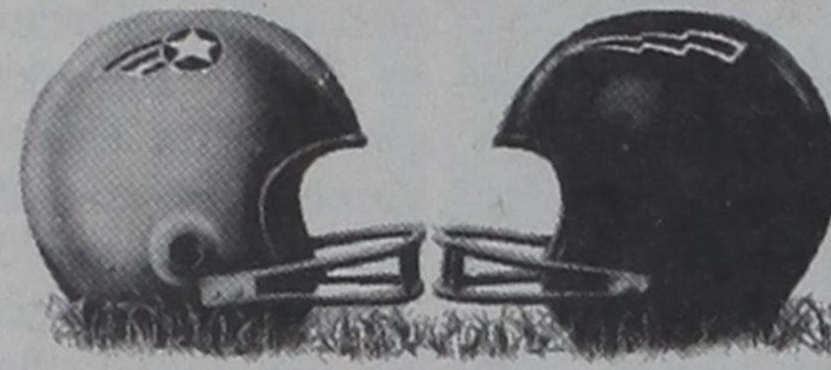

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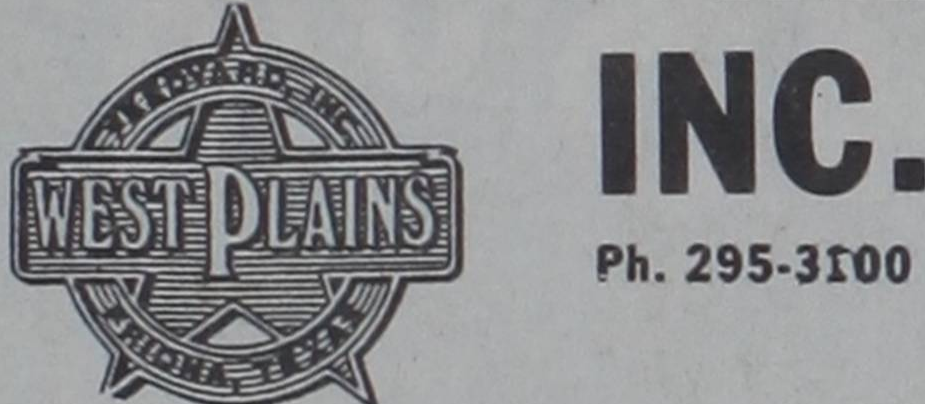
