



A large number of the vetch men dusted and sprayed in Erath, Comanche and Eastland counties with some success.

The Texas A. & M. College has done a lot of work on control of this insect, and according to G. D. Everett, county agent of Erath county, there are a number dusting materials on the market containing Parathion, which has been very effective. He has all the necessary information on this, as well as precautions to be used in handling it. He says several of the local handlers will appreciate getting early orders for this.
