



Having Fun Rewards 4-H'ers In National Recreation Program

The 1949 National 4-H Recrea-tion and Rural Arts program—a newcomer in the field of sponsored 4-H activities-is well launched in Texas, according to the State Extension office, A. & M. College of Texas.

Introduced only last year, the program has already chalked up an unusually good record which in-cludes training 7,150 junior and 4,390 adult 4-H Club leaders in recreation. In addition 1,005 clubs in 44 states were awarded blue ribbons for outstanding perfor-mance; 350 counties won \$25 each in cash toward buying recreational equipment; 21 states received \$50 each for crafts premiums, while five boys and three girls were given educational trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago.

A total of \$25,280 will again be awarded in the same manner by United States Rubber company, sponsors of the program. Awards are based on well-rounded recreaton activities developed and car-ried out by local 4-H Clubs. The eight trips are provided for 4-H'ers who have excelled in recreational leaderships.

Among the events designed for club groups are indoor and outgames; dances, festivals, tours and plays. For members there are numerous types of recreation such as leather, metal or wood craft; stage and set design-ing; sports and hobbies; singing or dancing leader, and serving as committee member.

The following counties won the \$25 cash award in the 1948 recreational and rural arts activity; Bastrop, Bexar, Castro. Dallas. Frio, Guadalupe, Somerville, Nac-ogdoches, Calhoun, Astascosa, Tom Green, Parker, Terry, and Cooke. Gene Massey, Jr., of Moore, was named outstanding 4-H'er. The entire program is conducted under the supervision of the Cooperative Extension Service.



### Congressman Burleson Asks Speed In Aiding U. S. Prisoners of War

Washington, D. C., Congressman Omar Burleson today called upon President Truman to take immediate steps to put into effect the law recently passed by Congress which will give relief to those veterans who were prisoners of war, the payment of com pensation for which is to come from former enemy assets pounded by this Country on the Declaration of War.

Congressman Burleson told the President that he had a number of former prisoners of war veteans in his District who were entitled to receive such funds, and that he hoped the President would find it feasible to set up the machinery provided in the law to make payment to those veterans.

Congressman Burleson stated that under existing legislation, the compensation allowed to any veteran-or if deceased, to his next of kin-would be at the rate of \$1.00 for each day he was held as terms of the Geneva Convention of June 27, 1929.

phone Association. current fiscal year staring us in the face," said Bailey, "and an even higher deficit in prospect for the coming fiscal year, Congress ught to be trying to discover way and means to economize, instead of authorizing new methods for

draining the public treasury." The most indefensible part of this proposal to make REA finance farm telephone service, added Bailey, is that the telephone industry is quite capable of taking care of this situation and is in fact doing that very thing right without a penny expense to the Federal government or the taxpayer." He pointed out that over a million rural telephones have been added since the end of World War II and that service is now available to 85 per cent of the occupied farm area of the na-

"It is perfectly clear to me," said Bailey, "that this latest spendlend proposal does not spring from a spontaneous demand for some new form of farm relief, but is primarily inspired by Federal bureaucrats trying to think up new excuses for staying on the public payroll." He said that with the job of rural electrification nearing completion, "there is no excuse for the Federal government to try to promote local socialistic ventures into the telephone busi-
