Death came unexpectedly and unavoidably Monday night at the local hospital, where she had been a patient for only a short time. An appendectomy was in progress. Margie was born July 15, 1932, and was a student in Hico High School. She filled in her spare time with employment in various local business establishments, and was always friendly with young and old. Margie probably had many friends that she didn't even know about, who will mourn her death and will miss her friendly smile and kind teasing.

Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at 5 o'clock in the First Baptist Church, with Rev. L. H. Davis, pastor of the church, officiating. Burial was in the Hico Cemetery, with Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

HICO TO BENEFIT BY GILMER-AIKIN SCHOOL CHANGES

Under the recently enacted Gilmer-Aikin School Bill, Hico will be entitled to more teachers and more money to pay these teachers. It will also mean more money for the Home Enrichment Program—that is, more money to spend for visual aids for pupils, library books, and playground equipment.

These new benefits were explained this week by Superintendent J. E. Lincoln who, incidentally, was the first school head in the State of Texas to have his application for State aid approved. The application was submitted and approved last week without any change.

"Hico will be entitled to 16 teachers, whereas last year we were entitled to only 13," the local superintendent said. "We used 14 teachers last year, but one of these had to be paid out of local money. The minimum salary for all teachers is set by the State and all schools operating under the Gilmer-Aikin program must pay at least that salary. All salaries are based on college training and experience. Generally speaking, all salaries are up about \$400.00 over last year."

"According to the new program, our complete budget will be \$83,529.00. Of this sum Hico will have to contribute \$6,724.52 from local funds. The balance will be furnished from State funds."

The Hico faculty is now complete with the exception of the band teacher. All teachers have not been assigned to their particular field of work, but the faculty as it now stands is as follows:

"Under the new school set-up we are anxiously looking forward to better school days," Superintendent Lincoln declared. The date for opening of school has been set for September 15.

Interesting Hobby Lends Charm to Armstrongs' Ranch Home Near Hico

Long before the current popularity of rug-hooking became widespread, Mrs. R. B. Armstrong of the A&R Ranch on Route 7, Hico, was making beautiful rugs of heirloom quality. She has made so many, in fact, that she has lost count of them, and in addition has helped any number of inexperienced rug-makers with their work.

Recently she drew her original design for a nine-by-six-foot rug on heavy burlap and is now ready to begin hooking it. She hopes it will be her masterpiece. Three or four years will be required for the completion of it, she thinks. It will feature her favorite color combinations, an antique red border, gold scrolls, and intricately shaded multi-colored floral designs.

Mrs. Armstrong creates many of her own patterns, sometimes combining parts of several patterns to get one suitable to her material and needs. She uses only the material from discarded woollens for

hooking and cuts it into very narrow strips. She does all of her own dyeing, and hooks with a steel needle made especially for her. Many of her friends and relatives, knowing of her hobby, save their old woolen materials for her, and she receives packages of it by mail regularly from as far away as California. She has been given four large wool blankets which will go into the border of the new rug.

"Winter is the best time for hooking rugs," Mrs. Armstrong said, "but I can't resist doing a little in the summer too." She is just finishing an unusual round rug.

In spite of the beauty and fine quality of her rugs, she made them for use and has ten of them on her floors at present.

Mr. and Mrs. Armstrong moved to their 700-acre ranch on Stephenville almost three years ago. They remodeled the house, and have used originality and individuality in its interior decoration. Its exterior is eye-catching with

flowers and gardens, for Mrs. Armstrong's second hobby is gardening. She entertains frequently outside, and has created a garden for this purpose. Buffet suppers are served from a large old wagon which has been painted white, and one table was made from a single large rock. A concrete lazy-daisy table was made by Mr. Armstrong to his wife's specifications and is ideally suited to the surroundings.

In their kitchen the Armstrongs enjoy a big, hospitable fireplace and a kitchen living room. Mrs. Armstrong is now planning a hearth rug, whose pattern will repeat the motif of the kitchen wallpaper.

The inevitable reaction of any woman seeing her rugs for the first time is a rush home to search through closets for any available woolen clothing which she can use to begin a rug of her own. Mrs. Armstrong has inspired so many Hico women with "rug-itis" fever that plans are being made for the organization of a rug-hooking club here.

Nonagenarians' Birthdays Bring Recollections of Early-Day Happenings

Hico's two oldest citizens celebrated birthdays within the past week. Mrs. Nannie Smith, mother of Frank Smith, who lives at the present site, was 97 years old Sunday. George W. Crist passed his 95th milestone last Tuesday.

Both are mentally alert, have excellent memories, and get around well with the aid of canes. Both well remember Hico's early days and Hico's first Reunion, an event begun as a Confederate gathering 67 years ago this summer and held annually since, except for the war years. The 63rd Reunion will be held Aug. 3, 4, 5, and 6.

For the dinner on the grounds at the first Reunion to be held at the present site, Hico City Park, cleared off for the occasion in 1888, Mrs. Smith and another Hico woman, Mrs. Mack Weaver, baked 500 loaves of bread each. They made their own yeast and cooked the bread in their own stoves, and it took three or four days to do it.

A Reunion was a big all-day gathering in those days, without carnivals and without parades. It was a huge barbecue dinner and speeches, and lemonade served in tin cups from barrels. You could have all you could drink for a nickel.

Mrs. Smith was born in Elkton, Todd County, Kentucky, July 24, 1852, and came to Texas when she was seven. She arrived in Hico in 1886, and she has been a widow seventy years. Her dark hair has only a sprinkling of gray, and her eyes are clear blue. Her hearing is good, but she regrets being unable to see well enough to read.

"Work," she answered quickly, when asked the secret of long living.

She had a birthday cake Sunday, baked by Mrs. B. E. Gambie, who also provided other good things to eat for the dinner which it has been her custom to provide for the past several years.

Crist, one of the more colorful characters of this section, was here before the town. An orphan, he came with an elder brother and sister to live with an uncle. The son of Jebedee Crist and grandson of Thomas Malone, who settled in Texas in the 1850s, he was seven at the time of the War Between the States.

When Old Hico was founded on Honey Creek, he lived there. When the Texas Central Railroad came through and the town was moved two miles to its present location on the railroad, he moved with it. He remembers when the present site was just cow country, and when it was laid off in lots in 1879.

He says the town was much livelier when it had five saloons. The children always breaded Christmas because the saloons did a big business and, inevitably, somebody was hurt or killed.

Comanche Indians kept things lively, too. They stole, killed, and molested constantly. One of Crist's most vivid memories is of a school-mistress being killed with arrows by Indians in her classroom. Several children were carried away at the time but were later allowed to return. Every moonlight night the settlers had to sit up all night to guard their horses from the Indians. Occasionally Indians stole

School Tax Election Scheduled for Fairy Saturday, August 6

Many schools over the State are finding it necessary to boost their local tax efforts slightly to maintain their desired standards under the new school laws. This statement was issued from the office of Forest O. Harper, County Superintendent.

Fairy is one of six districts in Hamilton County whose budget figures indicate need. This being the case, the Fairy School Board has been petitioned to call an election to present the proposition of a floating tax not to exceed \$1.25 on the one-hundred (\$100.00) valuation to the tax-paying voters of the district.

Such a proposition, if adopted, will permit the Board to levy a rate not to exceed \$1.25 on \$100.00 valuation of taxable property. An adjustable rate of this nature is desirable because district valuations rise and fall. Also, school needs, like business needs, vary from year to year.

The election is called for Saturday, August 6, 1949. It will be held in the Fairy School Building, Fairy, Texas.

Only qualified property tax-paying voters are permitted to vote at a tax election. A property tax-paying voter is anyone who has property, real or personal, rendered for taxation.

The recent consolidation of Latham with Fairy created the need of a Bond Assumption Election. This election has been called and will be held in conjunction with the above tax election. This is merely a matter of formality for the original Fairy District but is necessary before a uniform application of tax funds can be made toward the bonded indebtedness of the enlarged District.

Every voter of the District is urged to give earnest consideration to the above proposition and cast his vote August 6.

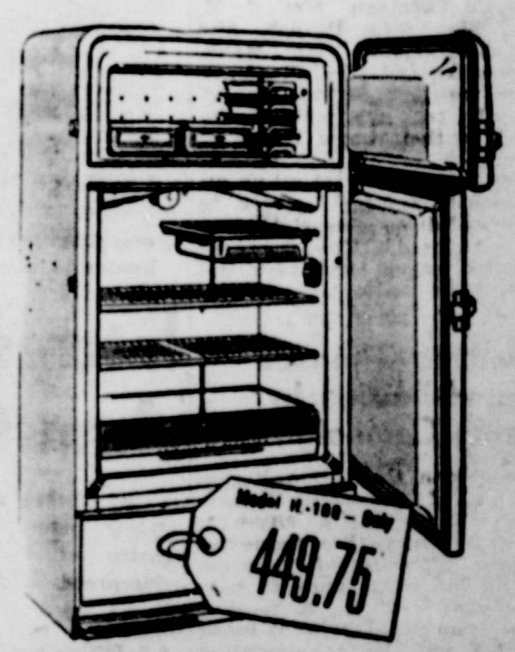

**OFFICIAL REPORT ON WEEKLY SWING OF
FARM MARKETS OVER THE SOUTHWEST**

Despite advances on some pro-
ducts the past week, most south-
west farm markets paid unchang-
ed to lower prices, according to
the Production and Marketing Ad-
ministration, U. S. Department of
Agriculture.

Many fruits and vegetables
found weaker markets. Arkansas
peaches sold \$1.25 per bushel lower
than a week ago, and Colorado
peas \$1 lower. Supplies of peppers,
squash, cucumbers and waterme-
lons were burdensome at New
Orleans. West Texas potatoes held
steady at Fort Worth, but toma-
toes, cantaloups and watermelons
lost.

Despite lighter receipts of all
kinds of livestock, most prices
turned downward last week. As
consumer demand shifted to hot
weather specials, dressed meat
found generally slow outlets, and
many cuts sold lower than a week
earlier.

Cattle markets continued to show
widespread weakness, with cows,
calves and stockers down at Texas
terminals. Odd lots of good stock-
er calves changed hands at \$21 to
\$22 at San Antonio Monday, and
medium Brahman, \$17.50 to \$18.50.
Medium and good stocker steer
calves turned at \$17 to \$23 at Fort
Worth.

Hog prices broke sharply about
the middle of last week after sev-
eral days' steady climb. Net changes
from a week ago varied by class
and market, but most were lower
for the week. Top butchers closed
Monday at \$21 at San Antonio,
\$21.25 at Fort Worth, \$21.75 at
Oklahoma City, and \$22.75 at Den-
ver.

Lambs and yearlings showed
further declines this week at most
markets, while ewes were uneven.
Medium and good spring lambs
brought \$20 at San Antonio, and
\$19 to \$21 at Fort Worth. Good
and choice spring lambs cashed at
\$22 at Oklahoma City. Denver paid
\$25 for choice 83 to 97 pound San
Luis Valley spring lambs.

Little trading took place in wool
or mohair this week.
Barley prices advanced 10 to 11
cents a bushel during the past
week, and wheat and oats around
4 cents. White corn declined al-
most 5 cents, but oats and sor-
ghums showed little change. No. 1
ordinary wheat closed Monday at
\$2.20 1/2 at Texas common points.
No. 2 yellow milo brought \$2.15
to \$2.25 a hundred pounds.

Rice showed little change in
price from last week although the
market was fairly active for this
time of year. Feed prices were
strong to higher this week, with
oiled meals, meat scraps and
tankage in the lead. Hay markets
took on a firmer tone. Peanuts
met with light demand, but prices
remained firm.

Very good demand for spring
chickens pushed prices up a cent or
two higher than a week ago. Ar-
kansas fryers delivered to Dallas
at 30 cents a pound Monday, and
Fort Worth paid mostly 27 to 28.
Hens held barely steady to weak.
Candled eggs moved in good de-
mand. North Texas markets paid
45 for mixed and 50 for whites.

Losses on cotton for the week
ranged from \$1 to mostly \$3.50 a
bale. Middling closed Monday at
30.55 a pound at Dallas and 31.05
at New Orleans.

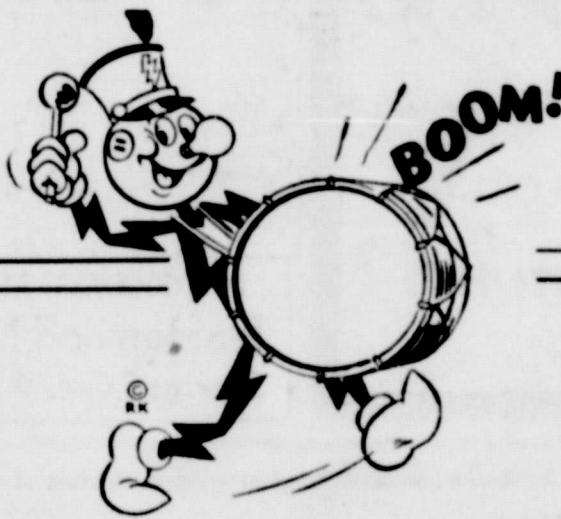

Motorists May Get Renewal Licenses Without Examination

Austin, July 25.—Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today a temporary relaxation in the policy of renewing expired drivers licenses. Pointing out that the action is being taken because of inadequate field and office personnel to handle the procedure in the normal manner, Colonel Garrison stated that the temporary measure, which becomes effective immediately, will preclude excuses on the part of motorists for not having obtained a renewal of their licenses.

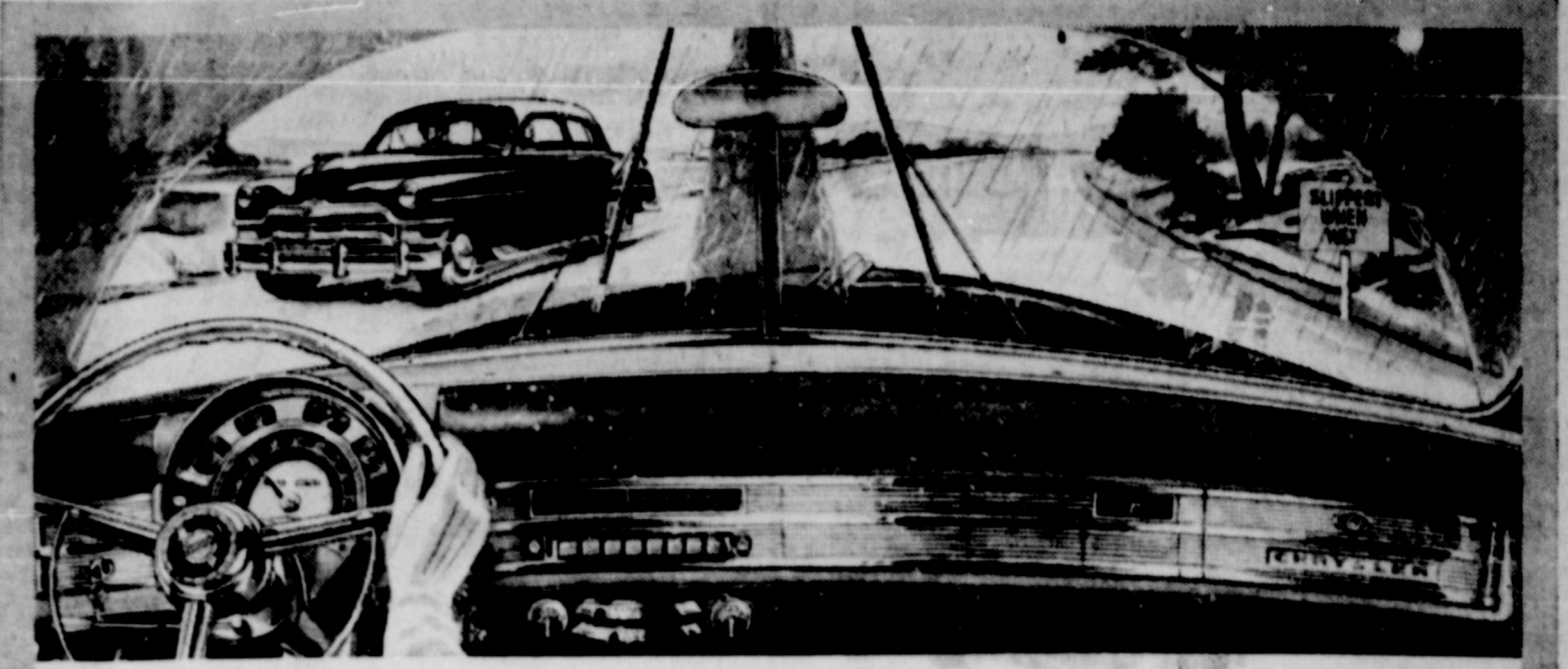
This should come as good news to a half million Texas motorists since the records indicate that there are three and one-half million drivers in the State and only two and one-half million current licenses are on file. Estimates show that of the one million drivers who do not hold presently valid drivers licenses about half have had one at some time but have failed to renew them. The other half million have either moved from the State, ceased driving or died since the records were compiled or have never possessed a license to drive.

Under the new program, Colonel Garrison outlines the following steps for obtaining a renewal of expired Texas drivers licenses. First: if you have a license that was issued since January 1, 1944, you may secure a renewal of same by mail from the Department of Public Safety without examination. Second: if you have a license that was issued prior to January 1, 1944, you may renew same by presenting the old license to a Drivers License Examiner in your locality and executing an original application. License in the latter case will also be issued without examination.

Formerly, those applicants for renewal who had allowed their license to expire were required to stand a re-examination. Now, under the temporary set-up, you may reinstate your permit to drive without taking the test, regardless of how long it has expired, provided it is not now suspended or revoked.

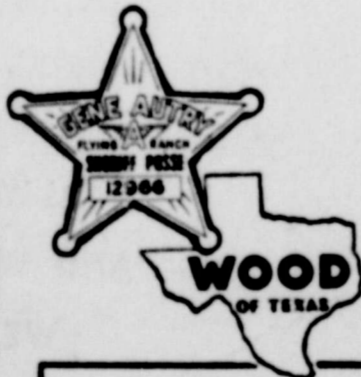
