## MOURNING DOVE - WHITE-WINGED DOVE OPEN SEASONS 1949

### MOURNING DOVES

OPEN SEASON -- NORTH ZONE: Sept. 1 to Oct. 15, both days inclusive. Shooting hours, one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

SOUTH ZONE: Oct. 1 to Nov. 14, both days inclusive, except in Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Zapata, Webb, Maverick, Dimmit, LaSalle, Jim Wells, Brooks, Kenedy and Wilbacy counties where mourning doves may be hunted only on Sept. 16, 18, and 20, from 4 p.m. until sunset, and from Oct. 1 to Nov. 11, from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

BAG LIMIT: Not more than 10 per day and not more than 10 in possession.

McMULLEN COUNTY: State law Nov. 1 to Dec. 15. Federal law, Oct. 1 to Nov. 14.



Unlawful to take white-wings or Chachalaca South of U. S. Highway 83, formerly State Highway 4, in southern tip of Texas marked on the map as "GAME SANCTUARY."

No hunting permitted in game refuges and game preserves.

A hunter may not have more than 10 a day of either or both species (White-wings or mourning doves) in the aggregate.

### WHITE-WINGED DOVES

OPEN SEASON: Sept. 16, 18, and 20, inclusive.

SHOOTING HOURS: 4 p.m. to sunset.

BAG LIMIT: Not more than 10 per day and not more than 10 in possession.

McMULLEN COUNTY: State law, Nov. 1 to Dec. 15. Federal law, season closed.

Shotguns must be permanently plugged to three shell capacity.

Shotguns may not be larger than 10 gauge.

Pieterje, pure-bred Holstein cow, product of the Neale Farms near Waco, was loaded into a C-46 freighter Saturday morning, August 13, on a non-stop flight to Havana, Cuba.

Pieterje, an expectant mother, was consigned to the large new Burrus Feed Mills in Havana, Cuba, construction of which was recently announced by the well known Fort Worth milling concern.

The shipment of Pieterje to Havana by air is a part of the Burrus Feed Mills' livestock and feeding program for our Cuban neighbors.

Dr. K. R. Hamorsky, Waco veterinarian who accompanied Pieterje to Havana, cabled an arrival later Saturday that Pieterje, in the unusual trip nicely, and the expected calf would be in Cuba.

### More Teachers With High Qualifications Point to Good Year

The Hico Public School will open Monday, September 5, for the term of 1949-50 with the brightest prospects in many years, according to a statement released by Supt. J. E. Lincoln.

"We have more teachers and they are all well qualified," said Superintendent Lincoln. "Four teachers have their masters degree, and twelve have their bachelors degree, most of these having done work on their masters. In fact it is doubtful if there is a school in the county that has a better qualified faculty."

Two of the teachers elected for this school year will not be able to teach. Mrs. Odie Patsick has resigned to take over the management of their insurance agency recently purchased from W. W. Caron. The School Board has elected Mrs. W. D. Bradley, wife of the band director, to fill this vacancy. Mrs. Bradley has her degree in public school music and elementary education.

The Homemaking teacher recently elected did not accept the position in Hico, but the school board hopes to announce a replacement by the time school starts.

The band director will be a full time teacher this year, and Mr. Lincoln expressed the hope that as many pupils as possible would take band or some form of public school music. There will be no extra fee for this subject this year.

The first day of school, the buses will run according to the former schedule in the morning over the same routes. Books will be issued and assignments made while running through the schedule. Pupils will be out by noon, and buses will return in time for lunch. The lunch room will be in operation Tuesday.

## OFFICIAL REPORT ON WEEKLY SWING OF FARM MARKETS OVER THE SOUTHWEST

Many southwest farm products moved to lower price levels during the past week, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Cotton fell \$1.50 to \$2.50 a bale under pressure of new crop offerings. Middling 15-16 ranged from 30.25 cents a pound at Dallas to 30.75 at New Orleans.

All grains declined except oats which gained only a fraction for the week. Yellow corn lost 7 to 9 cents a bushel, and Texas new crop white corn sold around 25 cents below last week's price on the northern grain. Wheat fell 1 cent a bushel, barley 1 to 3 cents, and sorghums 3 cents a hundred pounds.

Rice harvest made good progress last week. Sales averaged \$2 to \$3 a barrel lower than a year ago. Most feedstuffs lost \$2 to \$4 for the week, but soybean meal and alfalfa meal moved higher. Alfalfa hay sold firm and prairie hay higher on lighter marketings.

Peanut harvest became active in south Texas. Heavier receipts of cattle and calves last week than the week before brought generally lower prices. Most classes lost around 50 cents at Houston, and \$1 to \$2 or more at Fort Worth and Oklahoma City. However, Monday's trade found many kinds unchanged from a week before at San Antonio, and some higher at Denver.

Hog prices rebounded after early sharp losses as receipts fell off and the weather cooled. Monday's trade still left butcher hogs and feeder pigs mostly \$1 to \$2 lower

than a week before, but Oklahoma City showed net gains of around 25 cents on butchers. Sows lost 50 cents to \$1 at Texas markets but gained \$1 elsewhere. Spring lambs evidenced less weakness at Texas and Oklahoma markets than in the Midwest, as receipts showed less increase. Ewes made up a large part of receipts and prices eased slightly. Goats advanced mostly 25 cents at San Antonio. Texas wools sold stronger at 50 to 52 cents a pound in heavy contracting last week. Mohair rose to mostly 40 to 41 cents a pound for adult and 61 to 65 for kid.

Dressed beef and spring lamb sold steady to higher at eastern wholesale markets Monday compared to a week earlier. Mutton lost \$2, and pork mostly \$1 to \$3. Potatoes and cauliflower sold lower at Colorado shipping points, but peas recovered from early declines. Sweet potato prices in southern Louisiana dropped to mostly \$3 per 50 pound crate of U. S. No. 1 Porto Ricans. New Orleans reported good trading last week on heavy receipts of fruits and vegetables. However, Denver, Fort Worth, and most other terminals had slow trade with most prices lower.

Hens sold slightly higher in north Texas as demand improved for very light receipts. Fryers strengthened at Fort Worth but weakened in Northwest Arkansas, as other southwest markets changed little if any. Eggs held steady with top grades scarce and firm. Whites advanced a cent or two at Denver to 50 to 54 cents on large.

### Opening of Schools Brings Added Traffic Danger to Children

Chicago—Parents, do you have a teen-ager son or daughter? Well, if you worried about them when they started to school, they are facing even greater dangers today, according to the National Safety Council.

The 1949 edition of "Accident Facts," statistical yearbook of the council, shows that 10 years ago 6.8 out of 100,000 of the children in the 5-14 age group were killed as pedestrians, and four out of 100,000 were killed in autos as non-pedestrians.

But in 1948, when they were 15-24 years of age, 3.1 out of 100,000 were killed as pedestrians—less than half the rate in 1938. But 28.1 out of 100,000 were killed in traffic as non-pedestrians—seven times the earlier rate!

The Council concludes that in 1948 they were operating their own cars, or were riding in cars frequently driven by their friends, and that these cars were not being operated as safely as by older persons.

Opportunity Open to Reserve Officers to Join 'Operation Miki'

Austin, Texas, Aug. 20.—Organized Reserve Corps officers are given an opportunity to accept 90 days active duty with the Army to participate with the Invasion Forces and Umpire Group of "Operation Miki." Colonel Oscar B. Abbott, Executive for the Texas Military District, announced here today.

"Operation Miki" will be a Joint Armed Forces Exercise near Fort Lewis, Washington, and will be conducted beginning September 1.

Quotas for Texas Reserve Officers exists for company grade of the Armored, Medical Service, Chemical, and Ordnance, and for field grade Reservists of the Infantry and Artillery.

"The Army considers this exercise of utmost value and places it in priority one of all training activities of Reserve Officers," Colonel Abbott said. 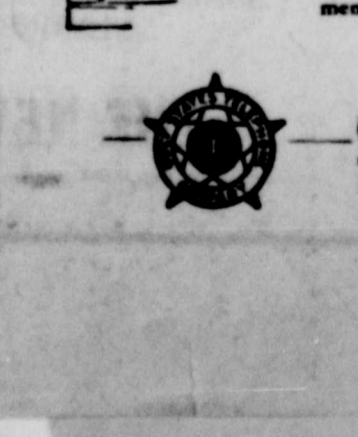

Texas Farmers Raised One Billion, 347 Million Pounds of Meat in 1948

With an estimated meat output of more than one billion, 347 million pounds on its farm and ranches last year, Texas ranked 3rd among all states in the production of this food product, according to a statement just issued by the National Live Stock and Meat Board. The importance of Texas as meat-producing state also was shown by the fact that the cash sales of cattle, hogs and sheep exceeded 584 million dollars, or an average of 1.6 million dollars per day.

Texas cattle ranked first among meat animals in the state's farm revenue, total cattle sales being \$473,412,000. The sale of cattle in 1948 accounted for about 81 cents of every Texas meat animal dollar. The nation's production of meat last year totaled 21 billion, 541 million pounds, according to the board. The average American ate 146.1 pounds of meat in 1948, including 63.4 pounds of beef, 9.4 pounds of veal, 68.3 pounds of pork and 5.9 pounds of lamb. About 20 pounds more meat was consumed per person in 1948 than in the average year of the pre-war period, 1935-39.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units, and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended, by adding a new Section to Article III of said Constitution to be designated Section 48-b, reading as follows: "Section 48-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and the operation thereof and to authorize counties and cities to provide a tax of not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall apply. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuations."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have election or printed thereon: "FOR THE Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof" and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

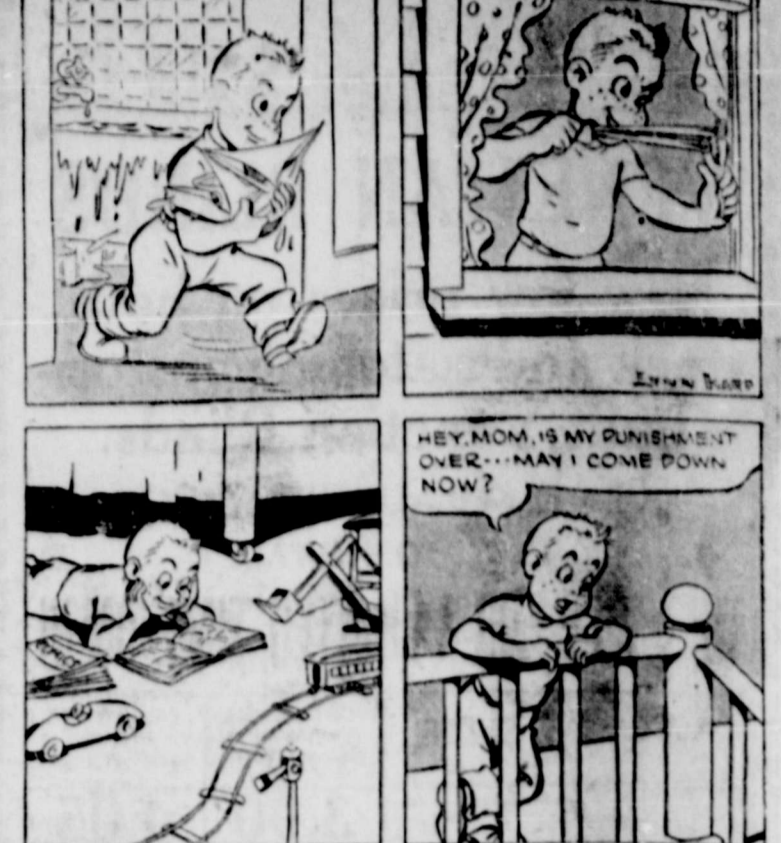



### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 of Article 16, so as to provide that the qualification of no person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing for the submission of this amendment to a vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof; and making an appropriation for such purpose.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand and petit jurors; provided that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex, and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this Resolution and the Constitutional Laws of this State, and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by Law; and if said amendment is adopted by the vote of the qualified electors of this State the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

Proposing an Amendment to Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution relating to sessions of the Legislature and what may be considered thereat and an Amendment to Section 24 of Article III relating to compensation of Members of the Legislature; specifying the time when the Amendment shall take effect if ratified; and providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3600), to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month.

"They shall also be entitled to mileage in going to the seat of government for each session of the Legislature and returning therefrom, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50), for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel from a table of distances to each county seat prepared by the State Comptroller."

Sec. 2. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held; and until otherwise provided by law, the time of the convening of the first regular session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even-numbered year.

"At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special session.

"Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months.

"At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations to pay monthly recurring expenses and salaries and such other measures only as four-fifths (4-5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered.

Sec. 3. The Amendments proposed herein, if ratified by the people, shall become effective January first, A. D. 1950.

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, same being November 8, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

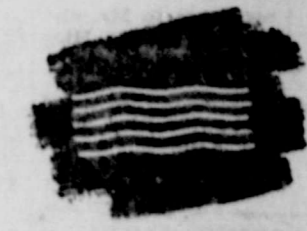
"FOR the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

Each voter shall express his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 5. The Governor of this State shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

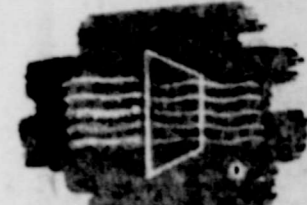

### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

Proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provision making the payment of a poll tax a qualification of an elector; repealing the Legislature to pass a general registration law for voters; providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is amended hereby so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district, or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have registered as an elector before the first day of February next preceding such election. This provision shall be self-enacting. The Legislature shall pass a general registration law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for each election to be held for that calendar year, and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

Proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new section, to be known and designated as Section 48-d, reading as follows:

"Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Three (3) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the state at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts;" and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

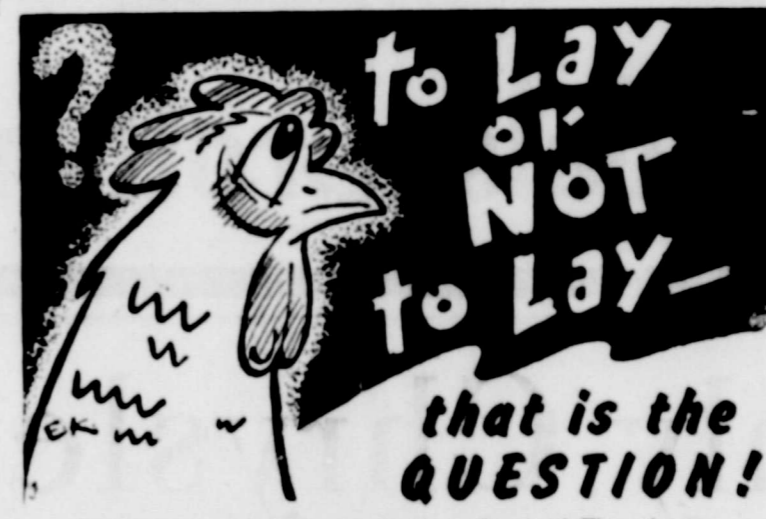
