





Marine Corps Eases Rules On Enlistment With Several Changes

The Vaco Marine Recruiting Ofice announced today that men may now enlist in the regular Marine Corps for periods of three or four years. Prior to this announcement the Marines have been accepting men for four years

The change is in line with the Marine Corps expansion program announced a few weeks back which resulted in the call for first the Organized Marine Corps Reserve, and then the call for 80,000 Voluneer reservists.

M-Sgt. M. D. Free announced also, that ex-marines may now enist for three, four, or six years. The previous policy authorized enlistment of ex-marines for periods of four or six years only. In addition ex-marines may also calist with dependents, this program was announced from Head-quarters U. S. Marine Corps, in Washington about two weeks ago, and has resulted in a steady stream

of men re-entering the Corps.

In addition to the above mentioned policies, the Marine Corps has announced that men be-tween the ages of 17 and 29 may enlist in the Volunteer Reserve for the duration of the Emergency. Personnel enlisted under this policy would be ordered to immediate active duty, and be sent to San Diego for basic training.







"With twice as many older people as a generation ago, the usefulness of our older citizensespecially in troubled times like the present-is both a great concern and a great opportunity for every community in this part of the country. During the war, older workers proved that they can elp to man the production line of defense industry. No less important in peacetime, they represent a community resource; and they are certainly entitled to community help in living an active and useful life. Fifty years ago," he pointed out, "the proportion older people in our national population was 1 out of 25. Today it is 1 out of 13. And by 1975 it may well be 1 out of 9."

Mr. Bond explained that the Conference on Aging, called by Federal Security Administrator Oscar R. Ewing following a request from the President for a thorough study of the problem, the first national meeting of its kind. Organized as an exploratory forum, it brings together son 800 leaders from all parts of the country to discuss jobs for older workers, as well as such questions as health, old age security, education and retraining, leisure, religious interests, family and community activities.
