The thing that was mentioned most often by some of the fellows was this new idea of getting two lamb crops per year from ewes.

Experiments are being run in two or three places in the U.S. now, using a combination of hormones to see whether ewes can be made to produce lambs twice in one year with satisfactory results.

Actually, they have succeeded in getting the repeat performance on the lambing but so far something has been wrong. Either the lambs didn't stand

up to it, what with the need for lots of milk and constitutional tamina, or the second crop of lambs was weakly.

So, it appears that, like color elevision, some more work is go-ng to have to be done before we can say this thing has been a,

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has developed a new remedy for screw worms, known as EQ 335, which is supposed to be more effective than Smear 62, which has been in general use about eight years.

But laboratory men tell us now that they still sell about as much of the old time remedies as they ever did, in spite of the proved efficiency of the newer scientific

Not many people can remember when as much good grass was lost by fire as has been lost this year. It will mean less meat and higher costs of production. People who deliberately set fire to meadows are in effect burning just so many dollar bills.

About the most popular speaker to agricultural groups in Texas these days is C. E. Fisher, superintendent of the Spur experiment station. Not that Charley is any great shakes as a speaker, but the things he reports about using 2.4.5-T on mesquite constitute about the

hottest subject to livestock men. W. B. Swenson of Stamford, who rode up on the train with us, has considerable faith in the mechanical method of eradicating mesquite by using two tractors to drag heavy chain across the brush, knocking it down, but he admits that 2.4.5-T sounds like it has

#### Farmers Urged to Meet Here Monday With Department

Farmers in particular, as well as other property owners or individuals within a radius of 10 miles, are urged to get together Monday night, December 4, at 7:00 p. m., when the Hico Volunteer Fire Department is sponsoring a meeting for public benefit to discuss reduction of further fires in the area. The meeting will be in the Firemen's Hall in Hico.

Recent outbreaks of fire have been serious, and as is usually expected during the dry season of the year, there have been many pasture fires which the local department has been called upon to aid in controlling, in spite of the fact that their equipment for same is inadequate.

Although the firemen have been responsive to all calls, whether within or outside the city limits, still they are limited in facilities and water supply in fighting pasture fires or others outside the city. As a result of requests made by local farmers, the firemen at their regular meeting this week appointed Willard Leach to serve on a committee with Fire Chief Richmond Herrington to investigate the possibilities of improving methods of guarding against the heavy loss caused by rural fires.

There is necessarily an extra expense to maintenance and servicing of equipment during this period each year, and firemen's funds have been strained heavily. Therefore it is impossible to add new equipment through city funds. Suggestions of any kind in helping to prevent fire loss will be welcomed at the meeting Monday

#### Insect Damage to Runs Into Millions

Bryan, Texas, Nov. 27.-Insect damage to hte 1950 cotton crop in Texas amounted to approxi mately \$107,035,000, destroying 11 per cent of the total harvest, ac cording to an unofficial preliminary estimate compiled by the National Cotton Council, George unit of the Council, said here to-

"Insects kept approximately 456, 000 bales of cotton and an estimated 187,000 tons of cottonseed off the market this year. Based on average prices, this lint would have brought Texas farmers some \$91,119,000 and the seed would have meant an additional profit of the News Review went to press \$15,916,000," the Council spokesman said.

"Throughout the Cotton Belt," Mr. Chance added, "an estimated 16.5 per cent of the crop, valued at approximately \$598,565,000 was destroyed. In dollars and cents, losses in 1950 were second highest on record, exceeded only by 1949 when damage amounted to more than \$617 million."

Chairman Chance announced that the National Cotton Council will hold the fourth annual Cotton Insect Control Conference in Memphis, December 7-8, to discuss insect damage in Texas and other Cotton Belt states. This conference at the Hotel Peabody will bring together state and federal entomologists, representatives of the insecticide industry, agricultural education workers, and cotton industry leaders to plan an integrated program of cotton insect control for 1951.

#### Frequent Outbreaks Send Fireboys Out In All Directions

Firemen did a full day's work Saturday on their own voluntary efforts, when pasture fires became so prevalent that it was impossible to put one out before another had started. In recounting their calls, even the firemen themselves became confused, but a red-headed reporter took many steps herself trying to get a straight story. And this is the way it came out:

The Hico Volunteer Fire Department received its first call at 11:15 a. m. when a blaze on the Roy Adkison farm, six miles out on the highway toward Iredell, burned 30 or 40 acres of grassland. Roy and the family were away from home at the time, but returned to find the threat curbed.

Around noon, fire broke out in the opposite direction and blackened pastures of John Rainwater and Raymond Cole, on the road toward Carlton. Little damage was done, other than loss of grass, by the flames which started unaccountably in the middle of one of the pastures.

While firemen and neighbors were attempting to tame this blaze, the largest of the series of fires broke out east of town on the pasture of E. A. Jackson and spread over approximately 700 acres, embracing the property of Grady Mackey, Tullos Carpenter, and ending on the Frost Ranch, where Jack Baker is manager. The only building destroyed was on the place formerly known as the Wilbanks place, leased by Bob Ogle. The structure was a vacant house, owned by Tom McKandles.

After getting the flaming area pretty well under control, the firemen returned to town, only to be called upon to extinguish another fire in the Cox-Weaver Addition, which started as a result

Last Saturday afternoon about 2:30 we noticed what appeared to be a grass fire west of our home We watched it for a few minutes, thinking it was only about a mile away. Then there appeared to be a blacker smoke, and thinking it might be the Herman Sills home we drove over there, but saw that it was still a few more miles to the fire. We drove on, coming to the Claude Brunson home where we found Mr. and Mrs. Brunson almost exhausted from fighting a grass fire. We hurried back to Fairy and summoned help, and there were some ten or fifteen fighters on hand, and with wet sacks the fire was soon checked, but some twenty-five or thirty acres of grass burned off and much more damage would have been done had the blaze not een checked by a strip of farm and on the east. The blaze caught when Mr. and Mrs. Brunson at-tempted to burn some trash off their garden, which was across the road from their home and surrounded on three sides by the pasture land. There were also two small sheds in the pasture, but these were saved. J. D. 



BECAUSE of, and through, the "mercies of God" Paul called upon the Roman Christians to present their bodies a living sacrifice to God. Through the organs of sense we may serve others.
