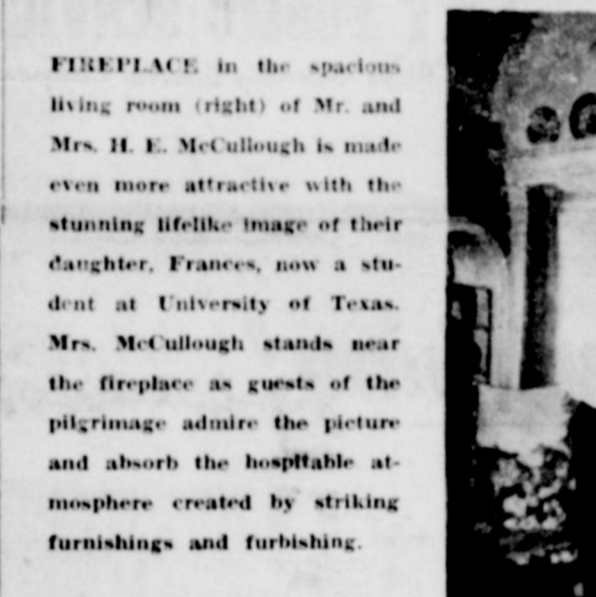

Most of the schools in Hico and surrounding communities are planning closing exercises next week, with Baccalaureate services this Sunday. Announcements of programs in other schools of this area will be found elsewhere in this issue or will be carried next week. An announcement from the Iredell school is expected later, since their Baccalaureate service is scheduled a week from Sunday, with commencement the first of June.

### Hico Elementary Graduation to Be Thursday, May 24

Graduation exercises for members of the eighth grade class of Hico Elementary School will be held Thursday night, May 24, according to a report from L. S. Chandler, principal, who will present the appropriate diplomas to 30 graduates. Rev. L. H. Davis, Baptist pastor, will make the graduation address.

### Fairy School to Close May 25, 8th Grade Graduation Tonight

Graduation exercises for the closing of schools in Fairy have been announced from the office of Supt. Irvin T. Jones. School will continue through next week, with Fairy High School Commencement Thursday night, May 24, at 8 o'clock. School officially closes Friday, May 25. Tonight, Friday, has been set for the eighth grade graduation, to begin at 8:00 p. m. The class, composed of 16 members, and their parents and friends will hear an address by Sam Harelik of Hamilton. On Sunday evening, May 20, Dawman Newton, minister of the Fairy Church of Christ, will deliver the Senior Baccalaureate Sermon. Truman E. Roberts, county attorney from Hico, will be guest speaker for high school exercises. The senior class of Fairy High School is composed of three members, namely: Virginia Anderson, James L. Arrant and Delbert Brooks. The public is cordially invited to attend these programs, the superintendent stated.

News on the front and back pages furnished with national and state news and patent medicine ads. At that time, the subscribers depended almost entirely on the paper for news now provided by radio and daily newspapers of wide circulation.

...page news was entirely new to the community, and in a proclamation by Grover Washington, D. C., as well as news from London, Canada, and several northern cities. The date line revealed that news had been gathered at the end of the week, and readers most likely have to wait the following Saturday to see the later developments.

...no pictures, the front page was a "sea of reading matter" columns. A column on the right was entitled Texas News and furnished lots of human interest. Excerpts are as follows:  
The bodies of Clem Strawther and Bob Chappel, the two men who were recently at Belville were turned over to a physician in accordance with the agreement between him and them. A number of doctors practiced surgery on the dead men to their hearts' content.

...Painview, Hale county, reported John Spiller cut his throat while doing a good job he will never forget.

...girl in man's attire rode through Waco recently on a bicycle and her hat being blown off. She was discovered by two mounted men that she was not a man. They gave chase. After four hours she was so far ahead the men gave up the chase and she was free. (No one knows where she is now.)

...patient medicine ads were prevalent in the 1896 newspaper. Many of them were "readers" who began the same as the regular news stories.

...Almost Crazy. Thought Her husband was going to Die. The Terrible Ordinal of a Mother—Her Little Almost Faded Away—Saved the Nick of Time—A Story Will Touch the Heart of Every Mother. The use of a certain type of pills is thus heralded in one advertisement. And so we learn that old soldiers are not the only ones who just fade away.

...advertisers included Dr. T. Hawes, Dentist; E. F. ... owner of a general store; ... and Co., proprietors of Hico ... store; E. L. Petty and ... also selling dry goods; J. P. ... and Bro. Fire and Life ... Agents and others.

...to the old reliable Midland ... shop when you want a good ... hair cut or bath. The boys ... are first class workmen. ... was an ad printed among the ... items.

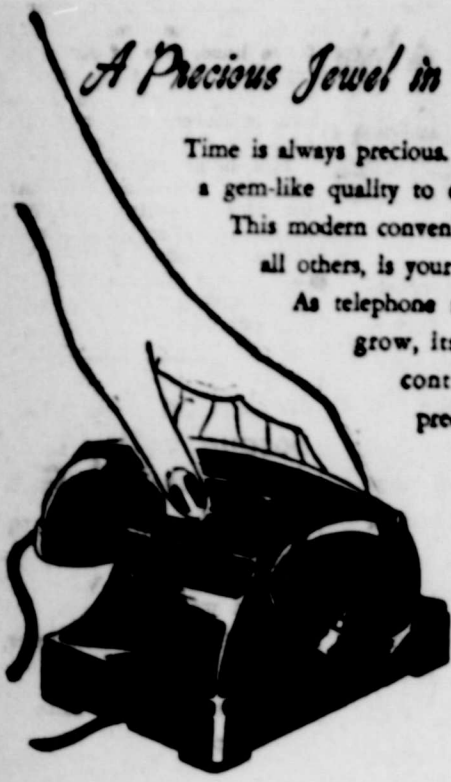

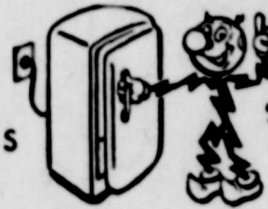

would reveal other changes in

The present owners, Mr. and  
Mrs. Roland L. Holford, have  
striven to present a picture of the  
local happenings primarily for  
current interest, as all their  
predecessors have done, but perhaps  
in 20, 30 or even 50 more years,  
this sheet will have the same  
quaint antiquity that the 1896  
issue does now.

Enjoying the dubious distinc-  
tion of having "sweated out"  
a sometimes weary existence longer  
than any of their forerunners,  
the Holfords arrived on the local  
scene the first day of 1930, with  
little more than a knee-high red-  
headed daughter, a desire to run  
a decent paper, and the good will  
and assistance of a tolerant pub-  
lic to carry them through a de-  
pression, a World War, and the  
existing Korean conflict. They  
are "happy if their efforts, cur-  
rently fortified with that now-  
grown red-headed daughter's  
lend-lease assistance during an  
emergency labor situation, have  
met with the public's approval."

In case there are complaints—  
as there always are in any business  
—the attitude of the skippers is  
that they are sorry, but not neces-  
sarily concerned unless there is  
foundation for the dissatisfaction  
other than the fact that the paper  
is not run by any particular pat-  
tern set by somebody else. It is  
only through the fact that they  
have been fortunate in having a  
close-knit family, willing to bend  
their backs a little more than ac-  
tually necessary to earn their daily  
bread, that Hico has been provided  
with a paper every week when at  
times it seemed almost impossible.  
At any rate, during the Holfords'  
21 years as editors and publishers  
of The News Review, they have  
produced an accurate-as-possible  
record, with a view toward leaving  
a basis for other publishers or  
"for posterity."
