MANY OF OUR readers no doubt MANY OF OUR readers no doubt remember my old friend Nelson Lewis, who for many years wrote a column, "Pause and Reflect," which we published weekly, Lewis also served as editor of the first Parmer County History book, and was a member of the Parmer County Historical Assn.

Lewis now lives in South Carolina and has reached the age of

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

### **Precipitation Totals Vary Across HP Water District**

Knowing the amount of precipitation that enters the soil is an important aspect of the High Plains Water District's soil moisture monitoring program.

Rain gauges have been installed at each of the 293 soil

instance at each of the 295 soil moisture monitoring sites within the District's 15-county service area. District personnel read the rain gauges as part of the data collection for the soil moisture

monitoring program.

This map is designed to show general rainfall patterns. There are some very small localized areas not depicted which have either higher or lower precipitation totals.


The majority of the District received from 12 to 20 inches of precipitation in 1995.

Recent investigations by Blakeslee, assisted by students, volunteers and local residents, have indentified a scatter of material strewn over about three miles of the floor of Blanco Canyon in Floyd County that probably derives from one of the two major camps of Coronado's army.

The material includes copper

points from crossbow arrows, a chain mail glove, at least five different varieties of iron nails, the tip of a sword scabbard, and pieces of iron knife blades

The copper arrow points are the best evidence of Coronado's camp. No other Spanish expedition to the Southwest is known to have carried crossbows, which were becoming obsolete in 1541; and similar points have been found in the pueblos known to have been

attacked by Coronado.

The site in Blanco Canyon has now yielded more of these distinctive artifacts than are known from the entire rest of the United

The Square House Museum has arranged to borrow some of the Coronado artifacts from the Floyd Museum. They will be on display for one day only, March 10, during Dr. Blakeslee's lecture.

Dr. Donald Blakeslee is an archaeologist specializing in the Great Plains of North America. He Great Plains of North America. He has B.A. and M.A. degrees in Anthropology from the University of Nebraska and a Ph.D. in Anthropology from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. He is currently an Associate Professor of Anthropology at Wichita State University in Kansas, where he has taught for 19 years.

Spicer died Friday, February 23 at the Hereford Care Center following a lengthy illness. He was born November 26,





Quint Ellis, a sophomore starter on the 1995-96 Friona Chieftain basketball team, was chosen on the all-district team announced this week by district coaches.


Named honorable mention to the all-district team were Charlie Milner and Aaron







when it comes to children. For example, if you name your new son, Johnny, Jr., as beneficiary, any future children would not be included (unless you remember to add them). You could circumvent this by designating "all children born of the union of John and Mary Lones." But this too could present

from another marriage.

The potential problems are endless, because we can't predict how our situations may change. Therefore, careful consideration should be given to naming beneficiaries. Explain to your attorney as completely as possible how. Your wast. Your assets.

how you want your assets distributed after your death. Ask him or her for help with the proper

wording. Anticipate as many different situations as you can, and

try to consider them in your choice of beneficiaries.
Finally, be sure to make the assets that include beneficiaries part of a regular financial review. An

annual check is the only way to ensure your wishes will be carried out. If necessary, most beneficiaries can be changed. When the need arises, do it.

**Choosing And Updating** Beneficiaries

Beneficiaries

Have you reviewed the beneficiaries listed on your life insurance policy lately? If you set up the policy years ago, odds are that circumstances have changed, and the person you named then may no longer be the beneficiary you would choose today.

Life insurance plans, annuities, retirement plans and other accounts require that you name beneficiaries. Choosing the proper beneficiaries when you set up these plans, and keeping them current, ensures that whoever you wish to receive the whoever you wish to receive the proceeds will in fact get them.

As with any financial decision, the proper naming of a beneficiary is a serious consideration that

is a serious consideration that should be discussed with your attorney and financial representative. But the following guidelines can help.

If possible, avoid making your estate the beneficiary. An estate beneficiary requires the proceeds be paid to your estate at your death, meaning they will be subject to probate. Naming a special beneficiary, on the other hand, will allow the assets to transfer immediately to the designated party without the cost, delay or publicity without the cost, delay or publicity of probate.

In most cases, you're not limited to a single beneficiary.

Often, it's advisable to name a contingent beneficiary in case the primary beneficiary dies before you. Of course, if you are the owner of the contract, you can change beneficiaries as often as you like, provided the beneficiary designation is not irrevocable. (Some contracts require irrevocable beneficiaries,

which cannot be changed.)

cause any problems, long hours working at a video display terminal can result in eyestrain and headaches. To avoid discomfort, adjust your work station and your work schedule.

The top edge of the screen should be no higher than eye level as you sit, the bottom no lower than 40 degrees below eye level. Cut down on glare by shading nearby windows and directing lamps away from the screen. Some users find anti-glare filters and screen hoods helpful. Adjust brightness for comfort.

Take regular rest breaks before you're tired. Look at something else for 10 to 15 minutes, once an hour after strenuous work sessions, every two hours otherwise.
