



Cotton yesterday was about \$5 per bale higher than it was this day last week, and when compared with the opening of the summer season, cotton has advanced from about 6.50c to 12c per pound, or just about doubled.

It is predicted on this exchange that the pledge of the Southern Cotton Growers' Association will be so completely obeyed by the farmers that cotton will yet tip the beam at 16c

The telegrams from New York on Sunday that Price had covered all his shorts created confusion here and after the feverish excitement of the day it is a serious question as to whether Price is a bear or a bull.


