Dr. Robertson Again.

Pearsall, Mar. 8.—Dear Kid:—I wrote you some days ago in regard to my change of location that you might correct your mailing list, but guess you didn't since we haven't received a copy of the Messenger at our new address. We (especially the girls) look forward with a great deal of pleasure to the weekly visits of the Messenger and are sorely disappointed when it fails to show up. Hope you'll take the hint. (It's no fault of ours, Dr., if your paper fails to show up, for it leaves this office each week addressed to you at Pearsall.—Kid.)

The weather conditions down here now are absolutely ideal, such as can be found nowhere except Southwest Texas and Southern California—not too hot nor too cold, warm, balmy and invigorating.

Crop prospects are all that could be desired—a good season in the ground, corn is mostly up and growing nicely and cotton planting is progressing rapidly. I am too loyal to my old love to attempt to persuade anybody to leave Houston county, and my advice to those who are satisfied is to stay with it, but if any of them good folks up that way become dissatisfied and determine to leave I'd like to pull 'em off down this way for in so doing I would be doing them the greatest possible service. This is a country of wonderful possibilities and its advantages are actually too numerous to mention. It's in its infancy yet, but the eyes of the world are just turn-

ing this way and mark the prediction: ten years will behold a marvelous development in this country. It seems to us inevitably. I was talking yesterday to a Mr. McKinley who came here a very poor man from Ellis county just a few years ago. I don't know just what he raised last year, but he told me that he sold 532 bales of cotton and 36 cars of melons and made ample feed stuff to run his farm. He has worked up to this from a small beginning and in proof of his faith will enlarge his crop again this year. I didn't inquire as to other items but he will plant this year 1500 acres in cotton and 100 acres in melons; and expects to make 1000 bales of cotton and melons to throw at the dogs. Mr. McKinley is a level-headed Irishman and knows what he is talking about and after several years experience says farming here is twice as profitable as in North Central Texas and you know that's considered a fine country. This is by no means an isolated case; in fact everybody who farms in this country makes money. Lots of renters here have bank accounts of \$4000 and \$5000. An ordinary negro farmer just out of town sold 127 bales of cotton the past season and last year was by no means a banner year. There is still lots of game here such as turkeys, deer, wild hogs and game birds of all kinds. Fishing is also good on the river.

Guess I had better close. In conclusion, however, if any of the good people up there who are going to move feel interested in this country I shall be glad to

answer any questions they see fit to ask, as best I can and will gladly help them see the country if they come over. Homeseekers are coming in on every train.

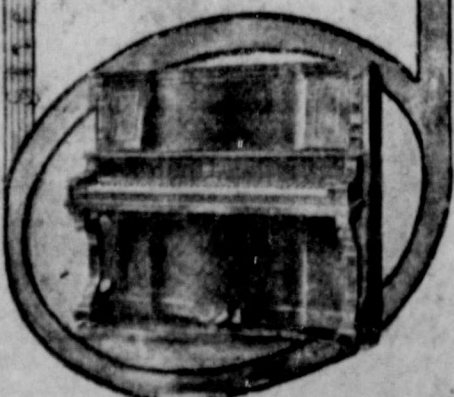
