Cable Plans Cause Ripple From City

Classic Cable Company's announced plans to close its Friona office and put all services on an "800 number" basis has drawn fire from the City of Friona, which issues the franchise agreement for the cable business.

"We have turned this matter over to our legal department. The franchise agreement definitely states that by having the franchise, the cable operator promises to keep an

office here," stated Friona City Manager Paula Wilson.

"We are not particularly pleased with the present service they (the cable company) are giving, and can only imagine what it would be without an office open here," the City Manager said.

The City of Friona, among other things, gives the cable operator access to the city's alleys for installation of their wires.

Friona FHA Team Is First In State!

Friona High School's Future Homemakers of America/Hero chapter won first place in a state leadership conference in Austin April 11-13, and won the right to enter the national competition in St. Louis.

Blackout Sideswipes Friona Area Tuesday

If you tried to call the kids in Lubbock this past Tuesday, you got a big surprise. No phones, no power.

From Amarillo to Big Spring and Clovis to Shamrock, the Panhandle was without power. Parts of three other states were also affected--Eastern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas.

Parmer County was almost skipped for total power loss, as Farwell was the only city to be without power. Friona, Bovina and the rural areas surrounding were spared.

Ironically, the residents of Muleshoe were not affected either, even though an electrical fault at the Tolk Plant near Muleshoe

caused the outage.

Parmer County Community Hospital reported their computers went down when the power surge hit, dimming and flickering lights in the county.

There were no medical emergencies reported during the time the hospital's computer was down, and as far as we know, no Parmer County residents were stuck in an elevator like some were in Amarillo and Lubbock.

Kindergarten Registration

A pre-registration for children who will be kindergarten students in 1996-97 will be conducted Monday through Friday, April 22-26.

A child must be five years of age on or before September 1, 1996, to qualify for the school year.

The information should be brought to the primary school office on Euclid Street. Parents need to bring the child's birth certificate, their Social Security number, and immunization records. Copies of these records will be made while the parents are present, so they may take the originals back home with them.

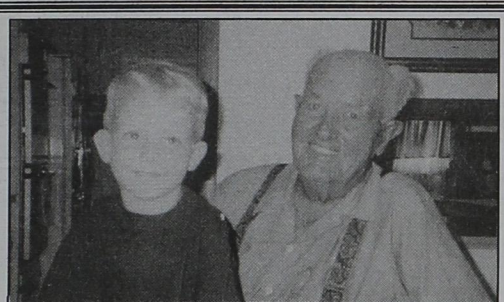

Out Here

Of all the good old boys I have met in my life, Ralph and Ruben are two of them.

In December, we went to the Fire Department Christmas party where they honored volunteer firemen for their years of service.

My camera ran out of film at about 20 years. So I just had to sit there when they called Ralph and Ruben up and gave them their 50 YEAR AWARD for volunteer fire fighting.

I couldn't believe that anybody could have been fire volunteers for 50 years. So I called Ralph and Ruben, got them together for an hour or so at Ralph's house, and it was one of the most interesting hours I have spent out here in Parmer County.

Ralph Shirley was born March 18, 1927, in Ponotoc County, Oklahoma.

Ruben Taylor followed on August 3, 1928, in Hereford.

At the age of "about" 12, Ralph's family moved to Hereford.

When you talk to Ralph and Ruben, who will both be 70 years old in the next couple of years (and don't look like it), their remembrances of exact dates and facts get a little cloudy. But their storytelling is real accurate.

They met in "about" the 5th or 6th grade in Hereford, which would have been in "about" 1939 or 1940. There will be a lot of "abouts" in this story.

Ralph Shirley quit school after the 7th grade to work on the farm and help his family. Ruben "got ten years" he says, before he had to quit school too.

Ruben's dad, J. L. Taylor, had a blacksmith and welding business which he started in "about" 1945. Ruben learned the business and Ralph says Ruben is the best welder that ever lived in Parmer County. No argument from me.

Ruben Taylor bought his dad's business in "about" 1957 or 58, and retired from it in 1991. It is still there on the corner of 8th and Euclid, Taylor and Son, just across from the primary school.

Ruben says in "about" 1957, he and his dad and brothers had three new cars which they consolidated into one loan for all three and the payment, for all three, was \$210.

When you sit with Ralph and Ruben, you need to sit in the middle so you can watch the stories go back and forth. And do they ever.

In 1951 Ralph Shirley moved from Hereford to Friona and got a \$17 a month raise. He was working for West Texas Gas Co. which became Pioneer Gas Co., which sooner or later became Energas.

He was the general plant operator, a one-man operation, that covered the territory from Black to the New Mexico line, which he covered in one old pickup. He was the only employee.

At the time, there was one paved street in Friona, Main Street. In 1949 he married Stella. In 1952 he built a house on Woodland. They had three kids, now have two grandkids, and have lived at the Woodland address since 1952.

Son Gary is an architect, son Richard is a mechanical engineer.

Stella and Ralph's daughter, Jan, died tragically in a swimming pool accident at the age of 16.

Ruben married Ollie Pearl in 1948. They have one boy and two girls. Steve, Paula Beth, and Renee. And get this; they have 16 grandchildren and 5 great grandchildren.

When these two started fighting fires, they had a 1928 open cab fire truck and hauled the firehouse on a trailer.

"Back then", says Ruben, "when you heard the siren, you just went to the fire."

The volunteer fire department had one set of a coat, helmet, and boots. In 1954-55, the women's auxiliary, led by ladies like Stella Shirley and Ollie Pearl Taylor, went up and down the streets of Friona collecting money for the fire department.

Back then, the fire siren could be heard for a block and one-half. "if the wind wasn't blowing", says Ralph.

Ruben Taylor was Fire Chief from 1959-61. Ralph Shirley was Fire Chief from 1961-1988, twenty-seven years.

When they start remembering things, just sit back and listen.

The meat locker fire up around the city square, "what, Ralph, twenty or more years ago?"

"That thing burned for three days and nights because the walls were two-foot thick, with redwood sawdust in between. When that stuff caught fire, you couldn't put it out".

It was in January and Ralph said that they couldn't put the firehoses up because as soon as they stopped using them, they froze straight out. Couldn't roll them up.

Then there was the lumber yard fire in the summer. Burned hot for two days and nights. Caught on fire two different times.

A feedyard had a dreaded "burr-fire" that burned for two days and nights too. They couldn't put it out, especially when the hay caught on fire too.

How about the Knox Variety Store fire, or the "cafe". Ralph and Ruben can't remember all the details, they just remember the fires.

And the rescues. See, the volunteer fire department doesn't just squirt water at flames. They get calls for rescue.

Like the time that Ralph and Ruben had to dig a body out of an elevator cave-in. "We must have shoveled 200,000 pounds of "hominy", Ralph said, trying to get that guy out."

Another time, a guy was buried in loads of corn, and they couldn't pull him out, so they managed to put a barrel over him and wedge him to safety.

Still another time, a man was buried to his waist in the corn. Ruben grabbed his belt, another guy grabbed Ruben's arm, someone else grabbed his arm, and so on until they got enough people to pull the man free.

"Everybody was shoveling corn and pulling people", says Ruben as he leaned back in the chair, looked at Ralph for approval, and Stella

brought him another cup of coffee.

Over all these years, they both admit, they have had their differences. "We've just flat argued. But we never argued at the fire house. If we had a problem, we talked about it and settled it".

"That's the way life should be, shouldn't it". Ralph and Ruben asked the question at the same time. Like they often do.

They told stories that pretty soon I didn't even write down anymore. It was too much fun to listen.

Today, fifty fire-fighting years later, they both still carry papers tuned to the fire department.

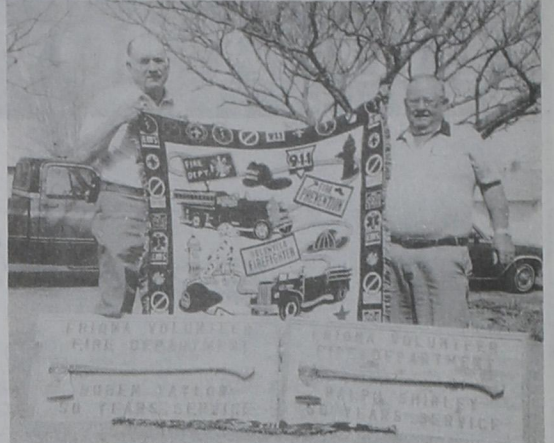
Ruben's pager was on his belt. Ralph's was in the other room. But you knew by sitting there, that if the fire siren went off, my interview would be over.

"Oh, we don't fight fires much anymore", they choursed. "We mostly just go and help the fighters with advice now."

I hope I get a chance to sit around with these "good old boys" again and listen to their stories. The next time I won't ask any questions.

Ralph and Ruben? Well, they got a lot of stories to tell. Mostly to each other. After all, they have been good friends for more than fifty years.

Just go to the fire, boys. You don't mind if I call you boys, do you?

Spray Garlic-Not Poison

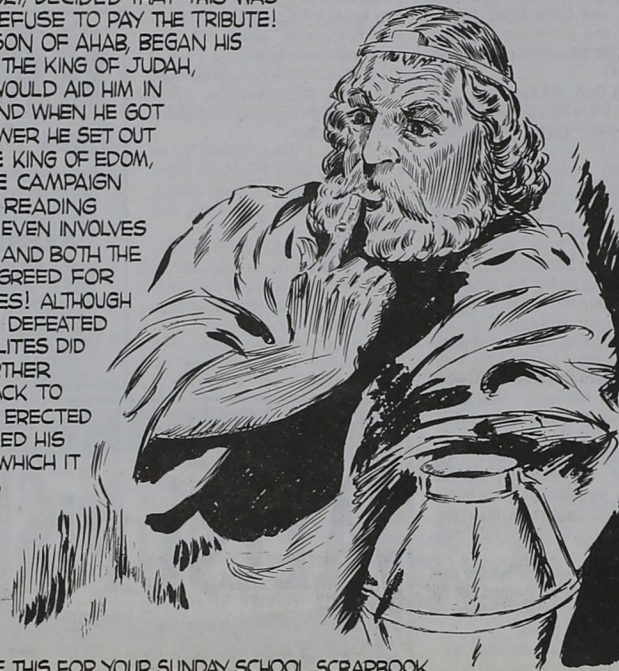

Kendrick's Record PV Paces FHS Track Effort

Vaulter Andy Kendrick set a new school and district pole vaulting record to pace the Chieftain track team's excellent showing in the district meet that Friona hosted last Friday and Saturday.

The Chiefs pressed Dimmitt down to the final race before dropping the team title by a scant five points, 135-130.

While the first day's preliminaries were unfolding on the track, Kendrick and the other two FHS vaulters, Steve Arias and Jeff Hamilton, drew their own circle of fans and family members at the pole vault area just west of the stands.

Kendrick was the defending champ in the vault, and was highly favored to repeat. He didn't disappoint his "fans," winning with a record 15 feet, three-inch effort.

Adding icing to the cake, teammates Arias and Hamilton placed second and third respectively, giving Friona a clean sweep of the three medals up for grabs. The talented trio gave the Chiefs 18 points, and paced Friona's first-day lead in the team race.

Kendrick passed his first few vaults, then unexpectedly missed at 12-6. But he came back to clear that height on his second try, and didn't miss again, clearing all of the heights up to 15 feet on his first try each.

He cleared 15-3 for a new record, then asked for the bar to be set at 16 feet. He was clearly over the bar on one attempt, but brushed it off with an elbow on his way down.

Arias and Hamilton each scored their own personal bests, clearing 12-6. Arias claimed the silver medal and regional spot on fewer misses.

Hamilton gets the regional alternate spot with his bronze.

Hurdler Quint Ellis gained a regional berth by placing second in the 100 meter high hurdles with a 15.28 time.

Tony Mejia likewise qualified in the 300-meter hurdles race, placing second with an effort of 41.09.

Friona's mile relay team qualified with their clocking of 3:32.58, finishing second. Team members are Raymon Flores, Mario Pina, Arias and Mejia.

Pina placed third in the 400-meter dash with a time of 53.31, but will get to compete at regional since Dimmitt's Albert Ewing, the second-place finisher, withdrew due to a conflict. That's why an alternate's spot is designated!

Ellis and Mejia both cleared six feet in the high jump, the same as the event winner. Unfortunately, four boys all cleared the 6-0 mark, and Ellis had to settle for third and Mejia fourth on the basis of misses, which is the tie-breaker system, as in the pole vault. Ellis will be the regional alternate.

Friona placed third in the 400-meter relay in 44.9. Team members were Kendrick, Ellis, Arias and David Shelby.

Mejia jumped 20-8-1/2 in the long jump for third place, and was third in the 110-meter hurdles, 15.58, for two other alternate spots.

Pina also placed third in the 800-meter run with a time of 2:02.75.

Otherwise, Flores placed fourth in the 100-meter dash with a time of 11.26 and also was fourth in the 200 meters at 22.59. Sheon Polk was fourth in the 300 hurdles at 43.18. Polk also was fourth in the 110-meter hurdles, 16.22 and

Kendrick was fourth in the triple jump with a mark of 40-5-3/4. Landon Wiseman hurled the shot put 43-6-1/2 for fifth place.

Also scoring were Jesus Lugo, sixth in the discus with a 127-0 mark, Kendrick, sixth in the 200 meters, 23.28; Jesus Mata, sixth in the 300 hurdles at 46.03 and also sixth in the triple jump with a 40-2 mark.

Friona led in the point totals, 114-105 with two events to go. But the Chiefs failed to scratch in the mile run, an event Dimmitt won, then the Bobcats won the mile relay for the title. Muleshoe placed third.

Squaws Sizzle As District Champions

Friona High School's girls track team won three of the five field events concluded on Friday afternoon, grabbing the lead with 38 early points. The team was never headed enroute to racking up the District 2-AAA championship.

Friona amassed 167 points to second-place Dimmitt's 135-1/2. Muleshoe was third with 115 points, Shallowater fourth with 90, Littlefield fifth with 39 and Floydada sixth with 32-1/2.

The Squaws were led by senior Courtney Carthel and her two gold-medal performance. Friona won seven of the 16 meet events, and qualified for the regional meet in nine events. Friona is regional alternate in four other events.

Miss Carthel came up with her best shot put effort of the season, 33-8, to win her first gold medal Friday. Although a consistent high placer, Courtney saved it 'till the district meet to score her first win in this event.

Then on Saturday, the FHS two-sport star annexed the discus title with a throw of 108-11. Miss Carthel got off her winning throw as the very first throw of the event, and it stood up for the gold medal. She had two or three other throws over the 100-foot mark.

Also on Friday, Ruby Aronce won the high jump event with a jump of 5-0. Freshman Whitney Ellis cleared 4-8 for second place. Two other jumpers also went 4-8, but Miss Ellis claimed the regional berth on fewer misses.

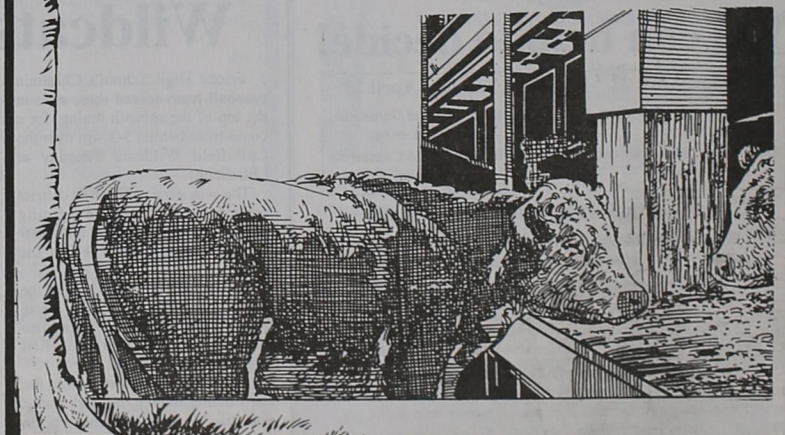

One can wear eye makeup with contacts as long as special precautions are taken. Notice: the cleaner the lenses, the more comfortable they will be.

*Choose a water-base, hypoallergenic liquid makeup. Cream makeup may cause a film to form on lenses, and powder may scratch them. Eye liners and shadow should be water-base, too.

*Avoid lash-lengthening mascaras. They contain fibers that are often irritating to the eyes and damaging to contact lenses.

*Remove lenses before using makeup remover. The best choice of remover is one with a mineral oil base.

*Use hair spray or nail polish remover before inserting lenses. Wash hands thoroughly before inserting the lenses; these chemicals can damage the contacts.
