Since then, they have traveled 48,180 miles carrying he message of the sacredness of all species, and of the need to maintain the delicate balance that exists between humankind and our Mother the Earth.
The runners carry a Sacred Staff and pray for all living species "every mile of the run. ircle for ceremonies of prayer and purification.
According to Banks, "It is a run for our young generations, a
time to respect our elders, and to prepare the direction for the Seventh presence of alcohol or drugs."
At each stop, also in the
evening, a cultural exchange program is presented during which the runners perform their different
tribal songs and dances for the local ribal songs and dances for the local share their heritage and culture in returm. In 1984, the group held its first cross country run from New
York City to Los Angeles, York City to Los Angeles, a
distance of 3.600 miles. The effort distance of 3.600 miles. The effort
was repeated in 1988, when the group flew to Japan and ran the ending on the northemmost island of Hokkaido.
In 1990, the Sacred Run
raversed Europe, traversed Europe, through thirteen countries covering a total of 7,130
miles, 88 days, from London to Moscow. The group will stop in Alay day and are invited to be among those who do the traditional ceremoni n into the Olympic Stadium.

The increasing cost of postage is an excellent illustration of the small ways that inflation affects our
lives. Yet too many people do not lives. Yet too many people do not inflation can have on the "big" things in life. Retirement,

term financial commitments are too often budgeted in terms of today's adjusted for inflation, future assets may fall short of the need. From the years 1925 to inflation in the United States averaged 3.1 per cent per year.
