What are dollars? would not give him wisdom, or state. virtue, or innocence, but these qualities do not belong to eco-

The experiences of mankind have produced dollars of two kinds. They are dollars that are paid, and dollars that are promised to be paid. Both are indispensible in conducting the business of the world. Credit is as important as cash. Banks deal with both cash dollars and credit dollars in the same way that everybody deals with cash and NEWSPAPER MEN OF credit. The entire process comes from the experiences of mankind.

In practical life everybody deals with wealth in the same There is no trouble with any of it until it is critically discussed, when the great majority of men go wild.

It is often said that labor makes wealth, but the history which will be held in San Antoof the world does not produce a single example. We say that labor made the grindstone, that the grindstone is wealth, therefore labor makes wealth. But want, and desires, make the quality of wealth that is in the grindstone. Wealth is on the chain of causation with wants and necessities, and not with labor.

Labor is done to enable the individual to get for himself the bounty of nature, and in no instance does it make the bounty. Successive phenomena are not always cause and effect, however much they may appear to be so.

The infant labors to supply its wants. It does not make its food. It does not make the vital air it breathes, and from the cradle to the grave the child, the youth and the man are the economic products that subsist upon the bounty of nature.







Suggestions to Patrons.

Boror R F. D. Deparment: Asa carrier I would like to make some suggestions to the patron of rural routes that I blev world be beneficial to the patrons, carriers and the service

When mailing a package aiways state to which class it be longs. Printed matter, pictures and photos unsealed, are thirdclass matter and will go for one hafcent per ounce. Any mat ter sealed securely with paste or muchage is first-class, which requires two cents per ounce or fraction thereof.

Never mail a written letter in an open envelope, thinking that one cent will carry it, for it will ot. Two cents will be required.

There is no such thing as a one-cent drop letter on a rural route. When sending valuables through the mail do so by money rder or registration. When you fan to hear from a money order or a registered letter write to the person or firm to whom you sent it before having the postmaster take it up.

Have your box fixed right. Let it be not three feet from the road. Let the bottom of the box be four and a half teet from the ground, so that the rear wheel can pass under. Put your letters, when mailing, in the rack. If your box has no rack set them up endways. Never lay them flat in the box.

Buy your stamps in quantities. If you are compelled to use pennies rap them and pen them to your letters. Pennies are difficult to pick from a box with cold

Put your return address on your letters so they will be returned if not delivered.

Have your mail ready when the carrier comes.

When buying stamps and money orders try to get up the correct or exact change if possible. Success to the carriers and

Allow me to say I indorse all The law or instructions as we 1908. will call it, says boxes should be erected so carriers can put mail son in or take it out without dismounting from his conveyance. Many boxes are in a handy place but are too low, or turned wrong, or possibly a stump, log r gully between the read and box, which compells carriers to dismount The carrier feels a delicacy in speaking to patrons about ill situated boxes. It is the duty of patrons to see that the roads are kept in good fix. Infact the instructions say a failure to keep up the roads or to erect approved boxes at an easy acces-ible place, is sufficient rea son to withdraw service from such patrons. J. A. Bean.
