

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Chieftains Flex 'D'', Beat Tulia

The Chieftains turned in their most impressive defensive performance of the season last Friday, limiting the visiting Tulia Hornets to just 47 yards offense, and toppled the Hornets, 27-7 to open District 1-3A play with

a win. Having started their first three games by getting behind at halftime and then having to come from behind (which they did twice for wins), the Chieftains played a new flawless first half, and went to the intermission with a 21-0 lead. "It was our best defensive game, and our best game overall," said coach James Morton. "Kyle executed the offense perfectly, allowing us to hold onto the ball and keep Tulia's offense off the field," he said. Tulia managed one first down on their opening series, but Friona forced a punt and took over on their own 30. On Friona's second possession quarterback Kyle Grimsley engineered a 54-yard scoring drive to give the Chieftains the early lead. Quint Ellis gained nine yards for a first down. David Shelby raced 36 yards for what would have been a touchdown, but a holding penalty against the Chiefs brought the play back. Grimsley rambled nine yards on a counter-option play to give Friona a first down at the Tulia 20. Daniel Cuevas reeled off a nine-yard gain, moving the ball to the Hornet 11-yard line. Grinsley lotted a pass to Andy Kendrick who caught the ball just outside the goal, and raced into the end zone for the touchdown. A running try for two points was stopped short, but Friona had a 6-0 lead with only 2:08 left in the opening quarter. Tulia started off in a hole after the kickoff, and fumbled the ball back to their own seven yard line, where they

the ball back to their own seven yard line, where they had to punt. The Chieftains charged in an attempt to block the punt, and partially succeeded. They took over on the Tulia 36. Taking advantage of the shortened field, it only took Friona nine plays to again light up the scoreboard. Shane Blackburn gave Friona a first down with a three-yard gain. Grimsley, on the option keeper, raced seven yards to get to the Tulia 15, where it was again first down. Friona faced third and three at the Tulia eight, and Kendrick got the three on a big play, setting up a first and goal at the five. Grimsley faked a handoff and raced across the goal-line for a 12-0 Friona lead. The Chieftain quarterback then tossed a pass to Kendrick for the two-point conversion, and Friona da a 14-0 lead with 7:24 left before halftime. Tulia put together a pair

Tulia put together a pair of first downs--the only time they did that all night--and moved the ball to their 44-yard line. At that point, Kendrick sacked the Tulia quarterback on first down,

* * * * and tipped his pass attempt on second down. On third down, the Chieftains shook the ball loose from the Hornet carrier, and Perry Hanes hopped on the pigskin at the Tulia 35. Grimsley whipped a pass to Steve Arias, who made a nice catch. Cuevas then had a timely six-yard gain for a first down at the Tulia 22. Grimsley tossed a pass to Kendrick on first down, then paced nine yards on the raced nine yards on the keeper play to set Friona up with a first and goal at the Tulia four. Kendrick blasted the four

Kendrick blasted the four yards for the third Friona touchdown. Mario Pina, who took over place-kicking duties for the injured Angel Vega, split the uprights and Friona had stretched its lead to 21-0. Only 36 seconds were left in the half.

Only 36 seconds were left in the half. An on-side kickoff backfired on Friona, and the Chiefs had to play some defense in the last minute of the half, but held the Hornets and took over on their own 40. On Friona's second possession of the third quarter, Grimsley ran 12 yards, and Cuevas 11, and the Chieftains seemed on their way to putting the game away. But the Hornets knocked the ball out of Grimsley's hands, and returned the fumble all the way to the Friona 15-yard line. Tulia took advantage of the break and scored on a fourth-down play when QB Jeremy Patton hit Austin Dunn with a five-yard scoring play. Friona's lead had been cut to 21-7 with 2:27 left in the quarter.

Coach Morton pointed out that linebacker Juan Santiago had a couple of big hits, and that middle linebacker Fidel Rodriquez also played well.



Texas Lottery Sets **New State Records**

For the fourth time in its four-year history, the Texas lottery has set new records for ticket sales, prizes paid to players and profits earned for the state and retailers, Nora Linares, executive director of the Texas Lottery Commission, has proceeded announced.

"I'm very proud," Linares said of the Lottery's record-breaking performance in fiscal year 1996. "We've been setting and breaking records since the very first day we sold Texas Lottery tickets.

"Our team here at the Lottery, along with more than 16,000 retail partners across the state, has been partners across the state, has been able to develop and sell a wide variety of games that our players find fun and entertaining. I hope I'm not sounding like a broken record when I say thanks for helping us break another record." Unaudited Texas Lottery sales for fiscal 1996, which ended August 31, totaled \$3.4 billion, up 13 per cent from the previous year.

cent from the previous year. Linares noted that the \$2.1 billion in Texas Lottery instant ticket sales and \$870 million in Lotto Texas and \$670 million in Lotto Texas sales ranked those two products No. 1 among all U.S. lotteries. (According to the September 1996 edition of LeFleu's Lottery World,

"Cash 5, our newest game, was a bit hit with nearly \$300 million in sales since it started in October of last year," Linares said. "And Pick 3, the daily game, showed a 3 per cent increase to \$145 million."

Estimated profils to the state jumped by about 10 per cent to \$1.1 billion, Linares said. That brings the total Lottery earnings for the General Revenue Fund to more than \$3.8 billion since the games began in May 1992.

Lottery players have ever received in a single year from any single U.S. lottery," Linares said.

U.S. lottery," Linares said. Fifty-three Lotto players won jackpot prizes totaling \$484 million during fiscal 1996. Other big prize winners included nine players who won \$1,000 a week for 20 years in the "Weekly Grand" scratch game and 470 who won top prizes of up to \$366,490 in Cash 5. Players and state coffers weren't the only ones to rake in record

the only ones to rake in record amounts of money from the Texas Lottery last year. Lottery retailers, who earn a five per cent commission on every sale and a one per cent bonus for selling certain top prize-winning tickets, earned more than \$175 million during fiscal 1996.

The year's top-selling Lottery retailers, by game were: total sales, Hester Oil Northside, Seminole, \$3,981,002; Scratch Games, Hester 53.981,002; Scratch Games, Hester Oil Northside, Seminole, \$1,958,500; Lotto Texas, Hester Oil Northside, Seminole, \$1,563,527; Pick 3, Hoai Huong Fabric, Port Arthur, \$602,182; Cash 5, Town and Country #1, McAllen, \$416,381. "I card: promise well break."

"I can't promise we'll break even more records next year," Linares said. "But I can guarantee that we will continue to do those things that made us the very best lottery in the United States.



Auxiliary Has Had A Busy Existence

The Parmer County Community Hospital Auxiliary is celebrating its 40th year as a club in 1996. Deke Kendrick has done some research on the club's history and we are nrinting it just as and we are printing it just as she submitted it to the Friona Star

Star. By DEKE KENDRICK RUMMAGE SALES The Hospital Auxiliary could write a book on "Our Rummage Sales." That first one was November 16, 1957. The proceeds made the down payment on the landscaping for Parmer County Community Hospital. To begin with, there was one gigantic fall sale. In 1982 a spring sale was added. Now the Hospital Thrift Shop is a monthly affair most of the year. During the past forty years, sales have netted thousands of dollars used by the Auxiliary for purchases and contributions to the hospital. Older members reminiscing about the fall years when many "Braceros" from Mexico were working in the area. With the help of interpreters, they were excellent customers, frequently outfitting their entire villages. The hours for the sale were extended into the night. Husbands of Auxiliary members were enlisted to help with the sales, as some could speak a little Spanish. There were fond memories of the fun both customers and clerks enjoyed. Martha Clements had a real knack for selling. Modeling the merchandise was a form of entertainment when business was slow. Finding an item for sale that had been a gift caused a bit of embarrassment to both parties. Sale articles range from excellent to "not-so-great." Tricks of shoplifters and price tag changers are well known. In 1974, the Auxiliary woted to ask the mayor to declare October "Hospital

sales during that time. No report is found concerning the outcome of the request. Locations for the Auxiliary Rummage Sales and Thrift Store have been numerous and interesting. Generous owners of vacant buildings donate their use. At least ten moves have been necessary in the past. One sale was held in the Kendricks' garage and driveway. At the present time, a new location is needed.

Times have changed over the four decades and rummage sales are not so profitable, yet they still add money for PCCH needs.

money for PCCH needs. BITS AND PIECES Forty years of "Minutes of the last meeting" yield interesting tidbits. The Auxiliary has been in the drapery business since its inception. There are many entries concerning buying drapes, cleaning drapes, putting pulleys back on drapes and eventually, switching to blinds. The TV rental program has also come in for much discussion-how to collect the fees, buying new stands, moving from portable sets to permanent installation and switching to color in 1977. There has been one

switching to color in 1977. There has been one mother-daughter president set-Irene McFarland and Dois Barnett, and one mother-in-law/daughter-in-law set, Katy and Ann Osborn. June Spring and Elizabeth McLellan are the two to serve two terms as president. Connie Neelley has the record for most offices held and Sandra Rainey has been treasurer for the last ten years. Connie is starting 1996 as president and Sandra is still treasurer. The hospital administrators have been very, grateful for the

Sandra is still treasurer. The hospital administrators have been very grateful for the Auxiliary's efforts. Numerous letters of gratitude and praise are recorded. Typical of earlier years is this report: "...Hospital manager gave a report at a regular Auxiliary meeting." Concerns and needs include several repairs and replace-ments. The nursery floor is cracked and needs repair. Some rooms need replastering and decorating. Kitchen stove needs to be replaced. Two automatic beds are on order. The Auxiliary voted to contribute \$1,000.00. "How to get the old-fashioned Coke machine out of the front lobby" was the topic for more than one discussion. In some minutes, a screen was proposed to hide the unsightly culprit. In 1968 the plans for "An Old Folks Rest Home" were presented by the hospital. The Auxiliary voted to help when more details were available. At a later meeting the forming of an Auxiliary for Prairie Acress was discussed with the discouraged the idea, so no further action was taken. The Auxiliary has always been interested in

discouraged the idea, so no further action was taken. The Auxiliary has always been interested in landscaping and plant care-even to watering the plants in the lobby. There was great rejoicing when the treasurer reported, "the last installment has been paid on our landscaping bill." Although officers were elected for one-year terms in the beginning, everyone served two years, so it became official in 1978. The office of secretary-treasurer grew too big for one person and in 1982, that office became two. Nursery and labor room furnishings are reminders of bygone days when babies were delivered here. The Girl Scouts' offer to make bibs was readily accepted. The Auxiliary contributed \$3 500.00 to equip the two

Auxiliary contributed \$3,500.00 to equip the two labor rooms.

The first Auxiliary float entered in the Maize Days parade was in the fall of 1957. One of the strangest entries is in the December 5, 1968 minutes. It was reported that the hospital declined our \$1,000.00 donation toward building costs, with their thanks, since they did not need it at that time.

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



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
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
