

Red Ribbon Week Here Oct. 20-26

"Choose To Be Drug Free!" is the theme for the "1996 Texas Red Ribbon Week." This campaign, symbolized by the red ribbon, began as a grassroots expression of concern and commitment to a drug-free, healthy lifestyle.

During the week of October 20-26, Friona Chamber of Commerce, Friona I.S.D., local businesses, community organizations and citizens will be participating in many activities to support the commitment toward creating a drug-free community.

The Friona Lions Club will display the American flags throughout the city. Friona State Bank and Friona Public Library will distribute ribbons proclaiming drug-free messages.

Friona I.S.D. students and faculty will be participating in many unique drug-free activities throughout the week.

A drug-free curriculum will be enhanced by films, posters, banners, speeches and announcements.

The high school campus "Red Ribbon" activities will include the following special activities:

Monday: "Grim Reaper Activity" and "Drug Awareness Day."

Tuesday: high school students will visit with elementary students about the danger of drugs.

Wednesday: assembly program/Scott Schultz.

Thursday: wear special caps, "Put a Cap on Drugs."

Friday: "Red Ribbon Day."

The Friona Junior High Student Council will sponsor the following day dress-up activities which include Hat/Cap Day, Sports Day, Tie Day, Hippie Day and Spirit Day.

Two assembly programs are planned. Scot Schultz's program on Wednesday at 3 p.m., will encourage today's youth to abstain from alcohol and drugs and an E.N.C.A.R.E. Program (Emergency Nurses Cancel Alcohol Related Emergencies), Thursday, at 2:45 p.m., will emphasize the dangers of alcohol and the importance of wearing seat belts.

The F.I.S.D. elementary campus will be participating in various instructional activities. In addition, the student body will participate in the following activities:

Monday: "Tie Day" (don't tie yourself down with drugs).

Tuesday: "Hippie Day" (it's hip to be drug-free).

Wednesday: "All-Star Day" (all-stars are drug-free). Students will dress in sweats or wear their favorite jersey.

High school students will visit elementary classes dressed in various uniforms such as cheerleaders, football players, band members, etc.


Thursday: "Mix and Match" (drugs and kids don't mix). The third grade will have a balloon launch at 12:30 p.m. at the west playground.

Friday: "Dress Red Day--The Friona elementary student body will have a drug awareness march down Main Street beginning at 1 p.m. The march will begin at Ninth Street and Main, down Main to Seventh Street, down Seventh Street to Euclid, then back up Euclid to the elementary campus.

There will be a drug awareness pep rally at the end of the march. Each homeroom class will have a Drug Awareness Party at the end of the day.

The Friona Primary School will participate in McGruff's drug prevention lessons and create hall displays pledging to be drug-free.

"Plan to be part of this initiative by wearing a red ribbon and make a commitment to make our community drug-free," said a spokesman for the school.


Established 16 years ago, the Meals on Wheels has been a God-send for local residents who are shut-ins, or someone recovering from surgery, or others with special needs.

During the past month, the meal program has been delivering meals to around 100 people each week.

The meals are prepared at the Parmer County Community Hospital kitchen. Those receiving the meals are asked to pay \$2.25 per meal. "They are always a good balanced meal, and most people are able to save enough on their tray to have at least a light supper," said "Wheels" spokesperson Ann Osborn.

The United Way money received by the M.O.W. organizations helps pay the cost of meals for those who cannot pay the full price.

65 Yrs Ago-Oct. 23, 1931
Little Hubert Max Magness, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. H.T. Magness, was fatally injured when the family car turned over four miles west of Friona Sunday afternoon.

After an absence of a few years, the Fire Fiend made his appearance in Friona Tuesday morning, destroying a building on Main Street occupied by Mrs. L.A. Martin's cafe and Jack Anderson's barber shop.

60 Yrs Ago-Oct. 23, 1936
T.E. Blackburn, who farms five miles southwest of Friona, was in town Tuesday afternoon and stated that he had some very good row crops this year. Other area farmers also reporting good crops of maize are T.H. Hughes and F.W. Reeve. It appears that the farmers of our area have some abundant crops this fall.

55 Yrs Ago-Oct. 24, 1941
R. T. Roden this week announced the sale of the Corner Drug Store, one of Hereford's oldest businesses. The drug and merchandise stock has been purchased by J.R. Roden, owner of the City Drug Store in Friona, and the stock was being moved to Friona this week.

Friona High School is listed as a four-year fully accredited school in a recent bulletin of the State Department of Education, according to Superintendent W.L. Edelman.

50 Yrs Ago-Oct. 18, 1946
It is reported on good authority that word from the State Highway engineer of this district, is to the effect that the work of surveying State Highway 214 (the north-south highway) has been under construction for sometime. The road extends through Cochran, Bailey and Parmer counties until it intersects U.S. Highway 66. The survey work could allow

paving contracts to be awarded early in 1947.

45 Yrs Ago-Oct. 18, 1951
Funds for construction of the rural telephone lines for the West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative are expected to be released soon, local officials have announced.

Orville Houser and brother Vondyl Houser have purchased the Cash Way Grocery Market here, taking over operations this week. Orville, who has been manager of the Cash Way Market, says a new name will be chosen for the store.

35 Yrs Ago-Oct. 19, 1961

25 Yrs Ago-Oct. 21, 1971
Direct Distance Dialing (DDD) for the Parmer exchange (295) of the West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative was completed during the past week, giving telephone patrons that additional service for the first time. Vernon Inmon, manager of the WTRTC, said that the system was completed on Thursday, October 14. Telephone

patrons on the Parmer exchange may now dial their own long distance calls by dialing "1" plus the area code, if it is different from their own, then the full number of the party being called.

Offense Tops 400 Yds. As Chiefs Top Mules

The Friona Chieftain offense, which currently ranks first--or second in area 3-A according to which list you're following, was clicking last Friday, as the Chieftains disposed of visiting Muleshoe, 34-14. For the second week in a row, FHS gained over 400 yards, getting 411.

And the offense did a creditable job, holding the Mules to just 73 yards. And it might have been virtually zero except for an untimely penalty early in the fourth quarter, which revved Muleshoe into its only touchdown drive. The Mules then returned a fumble for a score, to temporarily shake the Chiefs, who saw their halftime lead of 27-0 dwindle to 27-14.

But the team kept its cool, driving for a clinching score.

Friona wasted its first scoring chance, after QB Kyle Grimsley pitched out to Andy Kendrick at the last minute. Kendrick went 40 yards up the sideline, being literally tripped by the last Mule who had a shot at him.

The Chiefs fumbled on the next play at the Muleshoe 16, and the ball went over. Shane Blackburn had a nice defensive play, knocking down a third-down pass attempt by Muleshoe, and Friona took over in good position, at mid-field.

On the second play of the second quarter, Grimsley faked a handoff, the defense bit, and Grimsley outran the defense 46 yards for Friona's first TD.

The team had a slight problem with the snap on the PAT kick, which went wide. But Friona had taken a 6-0 lead 58 seconds into the quarter.

Angel Vega, who had another great game for the Chiefs, saved the day following the next Muleshoe punt. The ball hit a Chieftain, and Vega, who was the deep man, ran in to recover the live ball.

From the Mules' 43 yard line, it took Friona only three plays to score their second touchdown. Daniel Cuevas gained four, and Grimsley danced 14 yards for a first down.

At that point, the Chiefs got one of a very few timely penalties in their favor all season, when a Mule defender was called for roughing the passer. The 15-yard penalty moved the ball to the Muleshoe 12.

David Shelby took the pitchout and raced around the right end untouched to the end zone, for his third TD of the season.

A running try for points failed, and Friona led, 12-0 5:10 before halftime.

But the team wasn't through scoring in the quarter.

Shelby ran nine yards and Grimsley 12, both for first downs, and then the Chieftain offense ran its option play to perfection. Grimsley pitched out to Kendrick, who raced 44 yards for the touchdown. Andy then ran the two-point conversion, and Friona had hiked its lead to 20-0 with 2:10 remaining on the clock.

Cecil Cooper sacked the Mule quarterback on first down, and Hugo Santiago stopped the Mules for no gain at their 18. The visitors were forced to punt, and Friona took over with 50 seconds left in the period.

Chiefs-Wolves: It's District This Season

For the first time in many years, it counts as a district game, when the Chieftains visit Dalhart Friday (October 19).

Not since the early 1960s had the two schools been in the same district, although they have met several times as non-district opponents.

Dalhart has a 2-1 district record after a last-minute field goal gave the Wolves a 31-28 win over Dimmitt last week. Dalhart is 2-3-1 for the season.

Going into their seventh game of the season and fourth district tussle, the Friona Chieftains (5-1, 3-0) continue to rank at or near the top in all of the statistical departments, as compiled by the Amarillo Globe-News and the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

After trailing Dimmitt in the "team defense" department, Friona took over the lead after last week's games, having allowed 1119 total yards, or 186.5 yards

Freshmen, JV Win At Muleshoe

Friona's freshmen and junior varsity teams scored wins over Muleshoe last week.

The freshmen scored a 42-12 win, and the JV outran their age group, by an almost exact score of 42-8.

Leading the freshman attack was Joseph Bandy, who carried the ball 19 times for 165 yards and scored three touchdowns.

Adrian Cruz added sixty yards on seven attempts, and Jessie Allen gained 35 yards on nine carries.

Bandy also caught a pass for nine yards. Landon Martin had ten tackles, Adrian Cruz had six, and Bandy five. The team's record is now 4-2.

Hugo Rivera and Jeff Rando scored two touchdowns apiece for the junior varsity Chieftains. Mario Pina and Justin Daniel each scored a TD. The win gave the JV team a 5-1 record for the season.

per game. The Bobcats, who visit Friona next Friday, October 25, have allowed 1131 yards for a close second, at 188.5 yards per game.

Friona, having gained 2131 yards (355.2 per game), rank second to Dalhart (2193, 365.5 per game) in Amarillo's ratings. The Chiefs are second to Seminole (2273, 378.8 per game) in the Lubbock paper's compilation.

Various teams aren't ranked by both papers, due to circulation areas, but Friona is covered by both of these area daily papers.

Andy Kendrick leads the individual rushing (589 yards, 7.1) in Amarillo. He's fifth in the Lubbock area. Dalhart's QB Reynolds is the leading passer in Amarillo at 781 yards, to Kyle Grimsley's 494. In Lubbock, Grimsley's totals rank first.

Angel Vega tops the receiving candidates in Lubbock (343 yards), and is third in Amarillo. Vega and his teammate Quint Ellis will go head-to-head with Dalhart's Schriber and Gomez, who rank first and fifth in the Amarillo list.

Yearbook Sale Slated


The Friona Chieftain yearbooks will be sold the week of October 22-29. Annual staff members will visit each of the schools next week.



First Freeze Threatens Local Area

Having boasted ten days out of 11 where the temperature hit the 80s (through Wednesday), our area was primed for at least a light freeze on Friday morning.

Almost perfect weather during the past month has allowed one of the most orderly grain harvests ever seen. Corn yields also exceeded many early expectations, as did the ensilage.

Beet harvest was begun this week, and the cotton harvest is expected to begin very shortly. Some farmers have sprayed their cotton with "Prep," which will kill the leaves whether the freeze does or not. The warm dry weather of October should have aided the crop.

New Building Set For "Blackwater"

A new building is being constructed as part of a conservation project for Eastern New Mexico University's Blackwater Draw Site.

The funding and architectural designs for the project are being provided through ENMU, the El Llano Estacado RC&D area, the State Historic Preservation Office and the Highway and Transportation Environmental Division. The building will make it easier for visitors to view the site and will help archaeologists by protecting the excavation from nature's elements.

Blackwater Draw Site was discovered in 1932 and has been excavated off and on for the last 63 years. The site exhibits a bone bed that is important in classic Paleolithic stratigraphy and has been accepted as the earliest culture in North America, which makes this site known world-wide. The Blackwater Draw Clovis Type Site (oldest) is followed by Folsom, Portales and Archaic

cultures which date back from 11,300 to 5,000 years ago.

The Blackwater Draw Site was privately owned until 1978 when it was purchased by ENMU. In 1991 it was opened to the public and visitors can take a 1/4 mile self-guided tour through a trail with information signs.

Curator and archaeologist of the site, Joanne Dickenson, said, "Our hope for the site is that we can create a place that people can feel is a walk through that time period."

Many of the artifacts from the site are now housed in the Blackwater Draw Site Museum, but eventually they hope to move the museum out to the actual site. It will be valuable for visitors to see not only what has been found, but also the archaeological digging and a tour of the site in the same area.

The completion of the building on the Blackwater Draw Site is set for March of 1997.
