# **TIF Awards Grant To Friona District**

The state's Telecom munications Infrastructure knowledge base by sharing Fund Board announced on and searching for information; January 9, 1998 that Friona I.S.D. will receive a T.I.F. Mail and pen pal initiatives; grant that will be used to provide Internet access to students.

Friona I.S.D. applied for \$100,000 with the understanding that the district would commit to \$10,000 in matching funds. This money will be used to purchase materials and equipment for the infrastructure at each campus. Additional plans have been made to network all of the campuses by April of 1999.

teachers to create their own \*communication through E-\*interactions with global cultures; and \*opportunities for students and teachers to participate in electronic communities as contributors and authors.



I really expected to be called during last fall's big football season, since the operation puts you "out of circulation" for awhile. Making it through that, my next expectation was to be notified just in time to miss the bus trip to Branson. But I must have been a good boy, since this didn't happen either.

When I did get my first call, it was a frustrating time, to say the least. I got the call on December 22. At this particular time, there was around 10 inches of snow on the ground, complete with ice, road hazards, etc.

# FOR SECOND YEAR **County's Cotton Crop** Tops 100,000 Bales

Prior to the 1996 growing season, Parmer County had never produced as many as 100,000 bales of cotton. But the county farmers did in '96, setting an all-time record by harvesting 105,055 bales.

Figures compiled by the Friona Star and Bovina Blade's weekly survey revealed this week that cotton farmers once again did themselves proud. Although they won't set a new record, farmers had ginned 101,169 bales as of Thursday, January 22--topping the 100,000 mark for the second said they were close. straight year.

"Most of our farmers were well satisfied," said Jerry Butman, manager of the Friona Farmers' Co-op Gin. "September was a really good month for the cotton, allowing the crop to mature," he added.

Butman said that the Coop Gin had processed about 50 bales more than they had in 1996, which had set the all-time record. Four of the county's gins said they topped the 1996 crop, and the others

The price for cotton has dropped somewhat since the first of the year. On Thursday, the average price was 56.24 cents per pound. Earlier in the season, the price was 62-63 cents per pound.

"This drop in price is somewhat aggravating, as some farmers need to sell their crop and need to get as much as possible to cover their obligations," Butman stated.



We all gained when Landon was forced to shoot those two shots because it added to his experience. He has two more years to play basketball and football for the Chieftains and I predict he will be really good.


With 51 seconds left, the score was favor of Dimmitt by 54-53. Hope was in the hearts of all Chieftains fans. who had done their share of noise-making this night.

That same ultraviolet light that ages and damages skin and that has been shown to cause certain cancers can damage the eyes, too. Too much sunlight permanently

damages the retina, the light-sensing layer at the back of the eye, and can damage the lens, too, making it less elastic (so we need glasses to focus clearly) and cloudy (what we know as cataracts).

The best protection, short of staying out of the sun altogether, is to wear quality sunglasses which block both ultraviolet A and B rays. Nonprescription sunglasses come in three grades: "cosmetic," which blocks only 70 per cent of UVB and 40 per cent of UVA; "general purpose," which blocks at least 95 per cent of UVB and 60 per cent of UVA; and "special purpose," blocking at least 99 per cent of UVB and 92 per cent of UVA. Large glasses with wide side shields offer the most protection.


