## ON NEW PARKS---

### PECOS NEEDS THEM

The Following Article Should Be Read By All Our Enterprising Citizens

It is with pleasure that I note the interest that is being developed relative to having a city park, but there seems to be no suitable place within the city limits for an extensive park, and while not conversant with the powers of the city charter, I surmise that the city cannot appropriate funds for the construction and maintenance of a park outside of its limits, nor police it if constructed. Of course the only way to handle a public utility is for the municipality to make yearly appropriations for its maintenance, these appropriations must be raised by taxation. These taxes will bear just as heavily on the property remote from the park and consequently receiving less benefit, as the highly benefited property immediately adjacent.

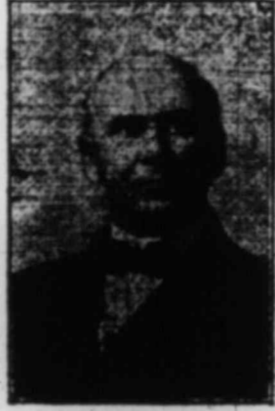
The solution of this problem has been solved by the most progressive and modern cities, by parking the resident streets, thus making miniature parks in front of each one's door, as El Paso is now doing on Rio Grande Street and proposing to do on other streets.

With the exception of the two streets running north and south between which the courthouse is located, all other streets are 80 feet wide, 16 feet for a roadway in the center of the street; 16 ft. for two 8 foot sidewalks, leaves 48 feet for two 24 foot parks. 16 feet for the central driveway is considered ample by El Paso, and many years may elapse before our little city gets as large as that city; 16 feet ought to be ample for us. Two vehicles can easily pass and the bithuletic roadway will be at minimum yardage, and consequently less expensive.

Each residence will have a little park in front, 50 feet long by 34 feet wide, with a row of trees on each side. These strips can be sodded in grass, covered with flowers or hardy shrubs as the taste of the residents may incline and they will be "spots of beauty and joy forever." The central bithuletic roadway will prevent dust and allay the rattle and the noise of passing vehicles.

odor of flowers, shade of trees, when it is impracticable to carry them to a distant park.

The parked streets of Savannah, Georgia, nearly two hundred years old, are as lovely as any in the world; however, the parks are in the center of the streets with a roadway on each side; this is not so desirable as the modern plan of the roadway being in the center with parks on the side, as it is twice as expensive and the children will have to cross a roadway to get to the park; besides it does not appeal to our individuality like the little parks coming up to our own property, being just like a continuation of our own yards.

Pennsylvania Avenue, Washington, D. C., said to be the most beautiful street in America, has a central parkway, and those of us who have been so fortunate as to have been a frequent promenader along its broad walks can never forget the pleasure it gave us, but that avenue is between two and three hundred feet wide.

Green Street, Augusta, Georgia, is also very wide, about 250 feet according to the best of my recollection. Euclid Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio, is another lovely street.

But why multiply instances. Every resident street in Pecos can be parked at less cost than the land for one large, general public park can be purchased and the park developed.

**A New Law**

Editor Times,

Dear Sir: Permit me, through the columns of The Times, to call the attention of the citizens of Reeves county to the following excerpt from the Sanitary Code of Texas, a law which was enacted by our recent legislature and which became operative March 23, 1911.

Without giving the matter proper thought one is in danger of regarding this measure as so much red tape. As a matter of fact, however, it is by such acts as this that Texas takes and maintains her position among the progressive states of the Union. Many of the states have, for some years, had similar laws on their statutes, and the remaining states are waking up to the immense importance of having them:

Rule 1. Every physician in the state of Texas shall report in writing or by an acknowledged telephone communica-

tion to the local health authority, immediately after his or her first professional visit, each patient he or she shall have or suspect of suffering with any contagious disease.

Rule 2. For the purpose of these regulations, the phrase "Local Health Authority" shall be held to designate the city or county health officer, or local board of health, within their respective jurisdictions.

Rule 3. The phrase "Contagious Disease" as used in these regulations shall be held to include the following diseases, whether contagious or infectious, and as such shall be reported to all local health authorities and by said authorities reported in turn to the president of the State Board of Health: Asiatic cholera, bubonic plague, typhus fever, yellow fever, smallpox, scarlet fever (scarlatina), diphtheria (membranous croup), epidemic cerebro-spinal meningitis, dengue, typhoid fever, epidemic dysentery, trachoma, tuberculosis and anthrax.

Rule 4. City and county health authorities shall keep a careful and accurate record of all cases of contagious diseases as reported to them with the date, name, age, sex, race, location and such other necessary data as may be prescribed by the State Board of Health. And they shall also make a monthly report of all contagious diseases of which they may be cognizant to the president of the State Board of Health before the fifth of the following month upon blank forms provided by the State Board of Health. The report on tuberculosis are to be privately kept and are to be considered in the light of a confidential communication not for the purpose of isolation, but with the object of education in sanitary precautions, and to supply literature of the State Board of Health.

Rule 22. Whenever any nurse, midwife or other person not a legally qualified practitioner of medicine shall notice inflammation of the eyes or redness of the lids in a newborn child under his or her care, it shall be the duty of such person to report the same to the local health authority, or in his absence any reputable physician, within twelve hours of the time the disease was noticed.

Rule 23. Every hotel proprietor, keeper of a boarding house or inn, and householder or head of family in a house wherein any case of reportable contagious disease (including tuberculosis) may occur shall report the same to the local health authority within twelve hours of the time of his or her first knowledge of the nature of such disease, unless previous notice has been given by the physician in attendance; and in cases of quarantinable diseases until instructions are received from the said local health authority, shall not permit any clothing or other article which may have been exposed to infection to be removed from the house; nor shall any occupant of said house change his residence elsewhere without the consent of the said local health authority.

Penalty.—Any person who shall violate any of the rules and regulations contained in the "Sanitary Code of Texas" shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than \$10 and not more than \$1000.

By reference to Rule 4 will be found some of the duties of local health authorities. And to the extent our people as a whole fail to comply with these rules just to that extent the State Board of Health will be hampered in its great work of assisting us in the control and prevention of disease.

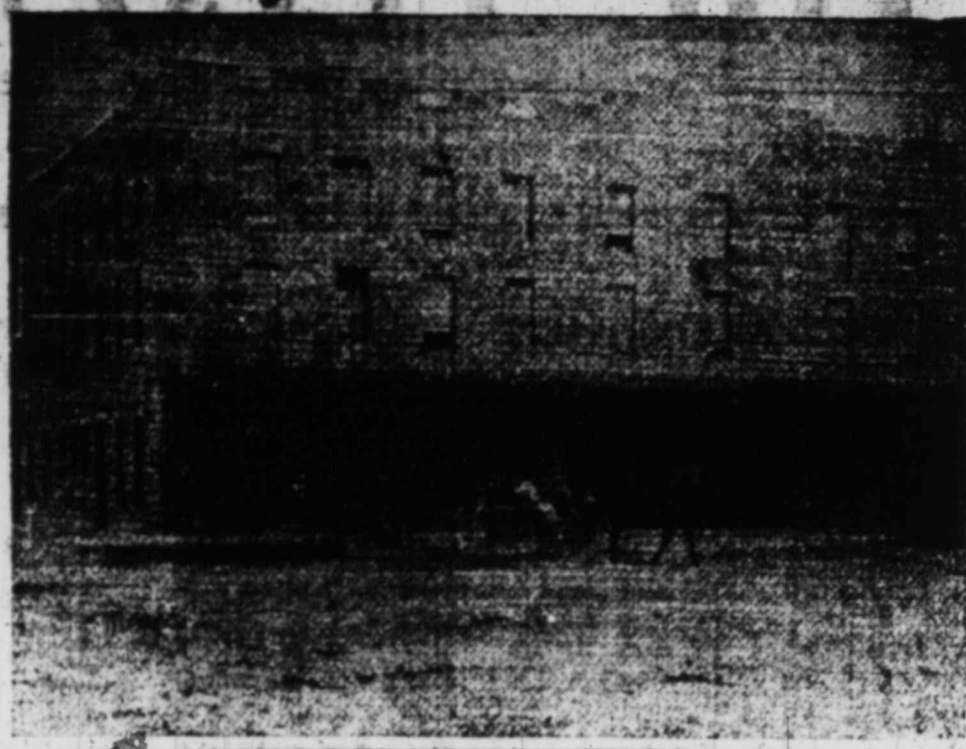
All necessary blanks for reporting cases may be obtained from the County Clerk or from the local health officer, but in the absence of blanks use telephone.

Realizing that very few are aware of the existence of the law and believing that our people are a people who have the best interests of humanity at heart the above is kindly offered.

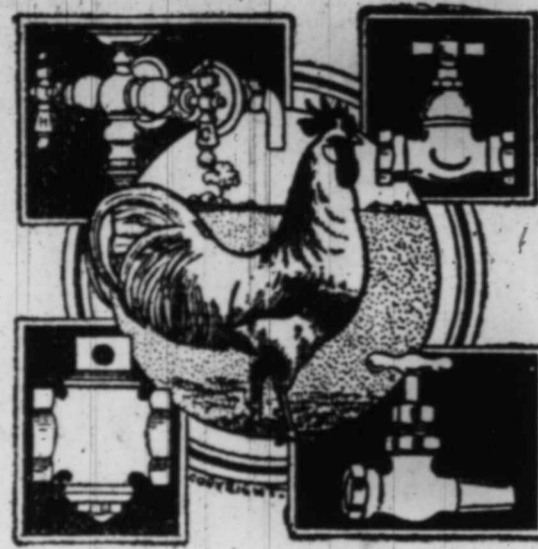
