In the meantime have the trash, brush and weeds removed from YOUR lot and show the other owners of such property how much it improves the looks of the entire block and he will get busy and have his cleared up also.

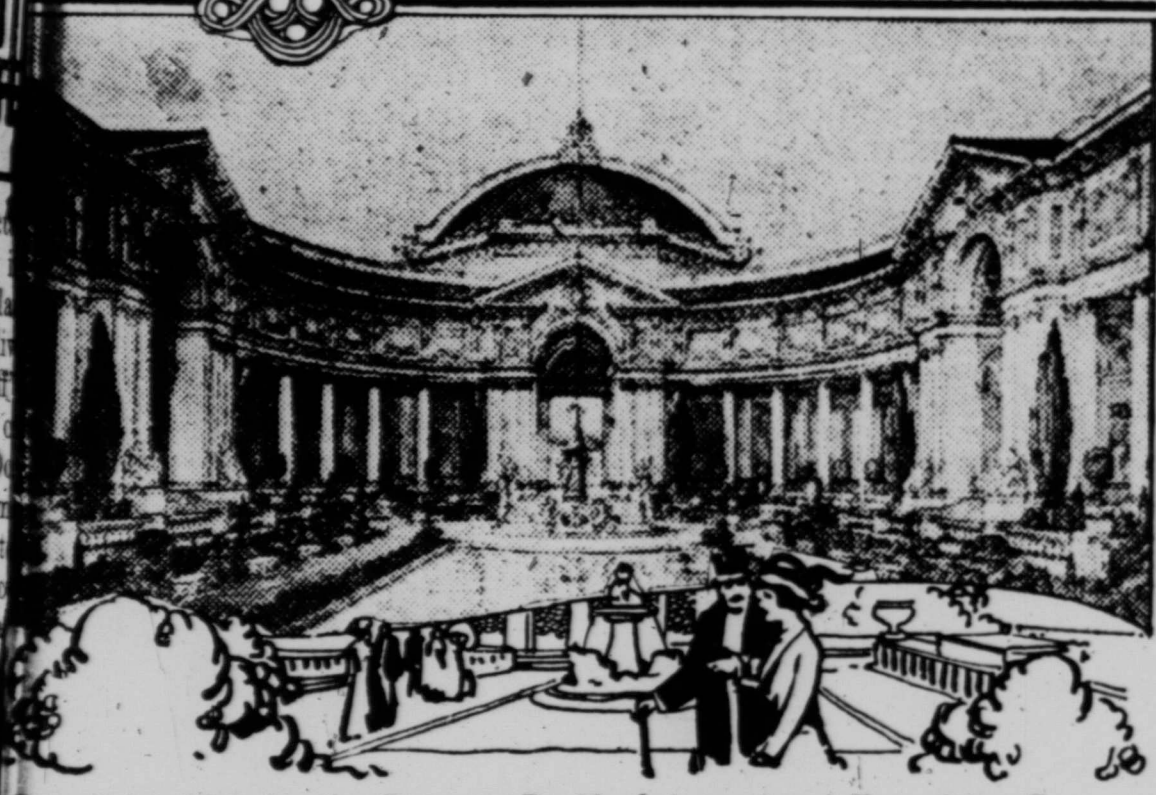

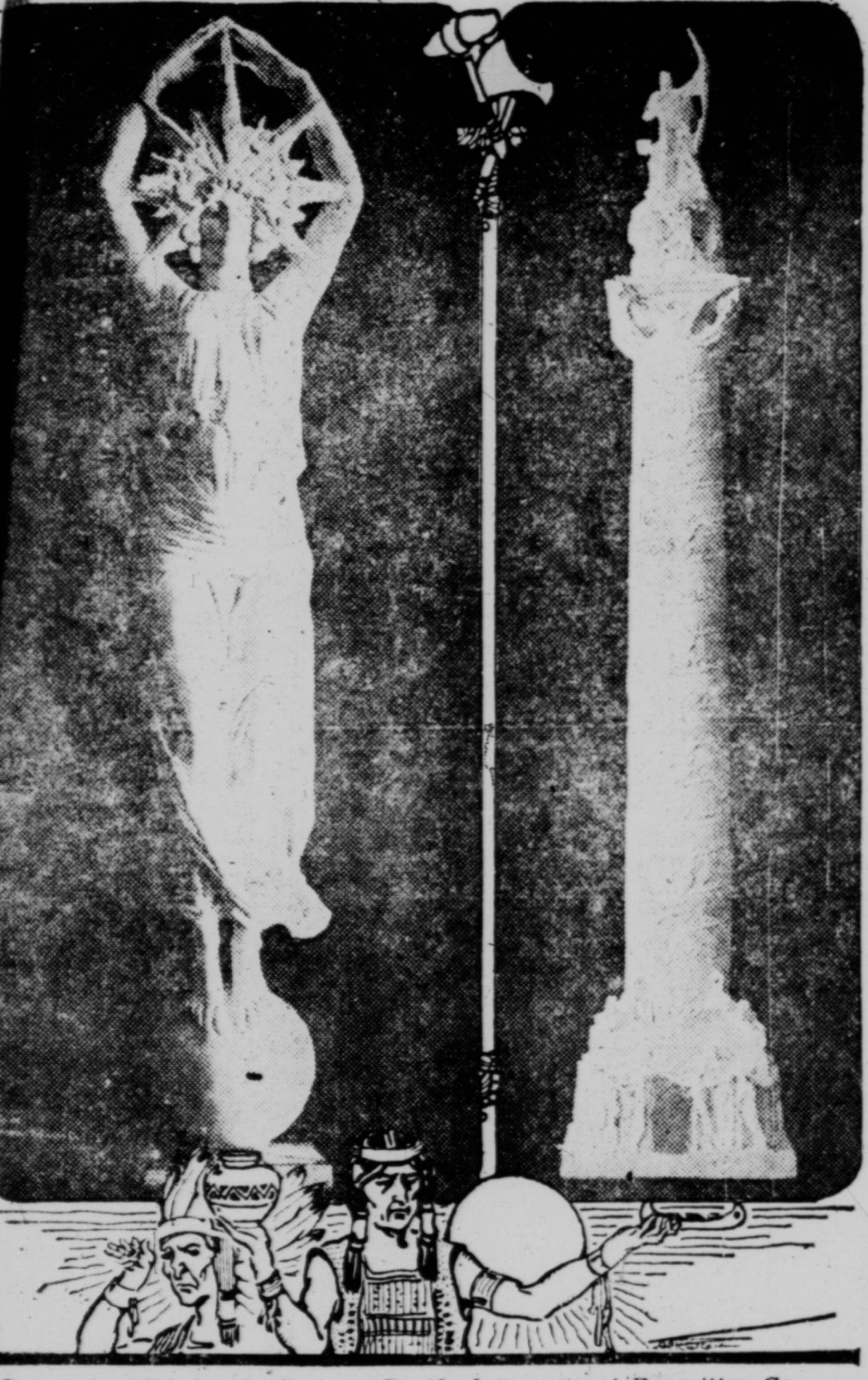

Rabbits Doing Great Damage

Jack and cotton tail rabbits by the thousands are doing much damage to alfalfa, cantaloupe and other crops in Reeves county and the destruction has reached such proportions that the farmers are seriously talking of organizing a rabbit drive to rid the county of the pests.

Several farmers were yesterday discussing with the Secretary of the Commercial Club, Harkey, the idea of a general battle with the rabbits it being declared that this year the cotton-tails have become more than ever close allies of the jack rabbits.

It was suggested that Reeves County should place a bounty on the scalps of rabbits, as is done in many other counties in Texas, but most of the farmers who have talked on the subject are not willing to delay action against the enemy.
