## More Good News.

Balmorhea has received more good news than for many months. Among other improvements to be made in and around the town, it is given out that the Taylor-Land company of San Antonio and Los Angeles have purchased from W. D. Cowan the noted Cowan ranch and will begin developing the same immediately. The development of this splendid tract of irrigable land which is only few miles northwest of Balmorhea, will be of much interest to all of our citizens and property owners, being a great benefit to this town. The Cowan ranch, when more fully developed, will furnish water sufficient to irrigate very large body of land, and it is the opinion of the new company to sell to actual settlers. The work of bringing in settlers will be begun within the next ninety days, and it is hoped that not less than 100 families will be located upon these lands during the present year. Not long since this company placed 200 families on another tract of their land in West Texas. They are said to be genuine developers and financially able to fulfill their promises. Again we say, "Welcome to Balmorhea!"—Toyah Valley Messenger.

## Humor of Big Land Deal.

Mr. Sol Mayer, local manager of the Balmorhea Irrigation company, has returned from a business trip to Chicago where it is confidently believed a business practically closed, whereby the company has acquired control and fully entire ownership of the Toyah Valley Irrigation company's hold lands in this valley. If this rumor is true it actually places all of the unsold irrigated and irrigable lands, together with the water rights, in the hands of a strong, wide-awake company. This consummation devoutly to be wished for, at any rate, "hope deferred maketh the heart sick," and the citizens of Balmorhea and Toyah have waited long and patiently for the men who have had control of the beautiful and productive country some kind of development work, but their dreams are coming true as a result everybody is jubilant in a fine spirit. It is said that the possible contingency that might result from the closing of this gigantic deal in the fact that the Mountain people desire the land owned under their old water contracts to make new ones. The new contract it is said, will carry with it a higher rate but a much better water supply. This proposition we understand, will soon be presented to the land owners for their consideration, and if they acquiesce in the Mountain deal and assume charge of the irrigation system, they are reliably informed that many leading farmers have expressed themselves as being glad and anxious to have an opportunity to co-operate with the Mountain people and thus bring a condition of affairs as will insure permanent prosperity to the valley.

They have not had an opportunity to discuss the matter with Mr. Mayer on his return, and the foregoing reports are merely rumors, but they are well grounded. Toyah Herald.

Carpenter, who is general manager and buyer for Carpenter & Sons, wholesale dealers in alfalfa hay, at Kingfisher, Oklahoma, Mr. Carpenter stated that they had purchased alfalfa hay from practically every market in the United States, and shipped this hay to their local dealers in a number of states, both North and South, and it is beyond a doubt, you people in Pecos ship the only true pea green color alfalfa hay in the world today. This statement coming from an old agriculturist and a man of high standing in the town in which he lives, also an expert on the quality of alfalfa hay, should make every man in Pecos and the surrounding county "set up and take notice." The Colorado, Oklahoma and Kansas hay does not compare with the alfalfa hay shipped from Pecos, Harstow, Balmorhea and other points in the Pecos Valley of Texas.

We wish to thank Mr. Carpenter for this frank statement, as it came unsolicited on our part. His business in Pecos was to purchase some five or ten carloads of hay, but none was to be had, so forget the idea that two million alfalfa can be planted in our country, or the world at large is demanding the pea green alfalfa hay raised in the Pecos and Toyah valleys of Texas.

## LAST SAD RITES IMPRESSIVE.

Many Friends Attend the Funeral of R. C. Clarke Sunday Afternoon.

The funeral of R. C. Clarke, who passed away in this city last Saturday, was held Sunday afternoon at the late residence of the deceased. A large number of admiring friends attended the funeral, including friends from a distance.

The funeral was conducted jointly by Rev. J. F. Hodgketh and the Knights of Pythias, of which organization the deceased had been the head locally as Chancellor Commander. Rev. Hodgketh conducted impressive services at the home of the deceased, paying a deserved tribute to a gentleman who under very trying and difficult conditions made a hard fight for life for the sake more of his family than for himself. The services at the home concluded by the singing of "Nearer My God to Thee," after which the local order Cactus Lodge Knights of Pythias took charge of the ceremony. The lodge members, more than thirty in all, lined up in semi-military order in front of the residence, the pall bearers, all members of the lodge, then passed through the line, forming and proceeded into the home, there conveying the coffin, one of the most beautiful seen in Pecos in some time, back through the line of Knights and into the hearse, the main body of Knights then forming in military line in front of the hearse with the pall bearers in the rear. The service in the cemetery completed, Grand Past Chancellor Max Kruskopf opened the beautiful and impressive service of the order. Prayer was delivered by Hon. W. A. Hudson, president of the order, and R. M. Harkey read passages from the order sayings. The service was very impressive and concluded by prayer offered by Rev. Hodgketh.

The service over, a number of beautiful floral decorations were placed upon the earthly last of a good citizen, father, Christian and friend.

As a citizen of Pecos, R. C. Clarke has taken a prominent part in local affairs, has always been a consistent and ready donor to all causes for civic and religious betterment, often

doing more than his part. For many years he had been a prominent member of the order of Knights of Pythias, and at the last meeting for the election of officers for the local lodge he had been elected to the highest position within the gift of the local lodge, or as Chancellor Commander. Before coming to Pecos as a resident of the state of Florida, where for many years he lived, he had for a long time taken a prominent part in Knights of Pythias work and had held high and important offices in that order in the Peninsular State. Upon coming to Pecos his ardor did not diminish and he added lustre to all things with which he was connected. He was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church south and a native of Alabama.

## KOHLMEYER TAKES CHARGE OF NEW GOLD FIND.

## Prominent Capitalists to Visit Oil Field

(Toyah Enterprise.)

C. E. Morgan, of the Producers Oil Co., which spent more than two hundred thousand dollars in the development of the Toyah oil field, was in Toyah again this week—coming in Sunday morning. On Monday Messrs. J. L. McMahon, W. H. Line and T. P. Lee, all prominent capitalists and oil men of Houston, came in and they, with several Toyah citizens as guides, took a three days' tour to the oil fields, returning this afternoon.

Mr. Morgan stated to the Enterprise man that in so far as his visit is concerned it means nothing more than that he was on his way to the New Mexico oil fields and took advantage of this opportunity to come by Toyah and "shake" with his friends here, and while here he made the trip to the oil fields with these friends to show them and again view the country.

Of course, none of them have anything to give out for publication, yet Mr. Morgan states that the Producers Oil company would likely again do some developing in this field if the nature laws of Texas were so amended as to give them a square deal.

The Toyah oil field is as promising today, if not more so, than the Dayton field, and it is safe to say that these gentlemen are not here alone for their health and also that the day is not far distant when active operations in the Toyah oil fields will be begun, and by men with capital, energy and faith to prove conclusively if there is oil here in commercial quantities.

By writing at once to the Texas Industrial Congress at Dallas full particulars and blanks for entering the contest may be secured. Do it today, as after April 1 it will be too late.

Tarrant county now leads in the number of entries in the Texas Industrial Congress contest, having 241 farmers who will compete for \$10,000 in gold offered for the best crop yields. 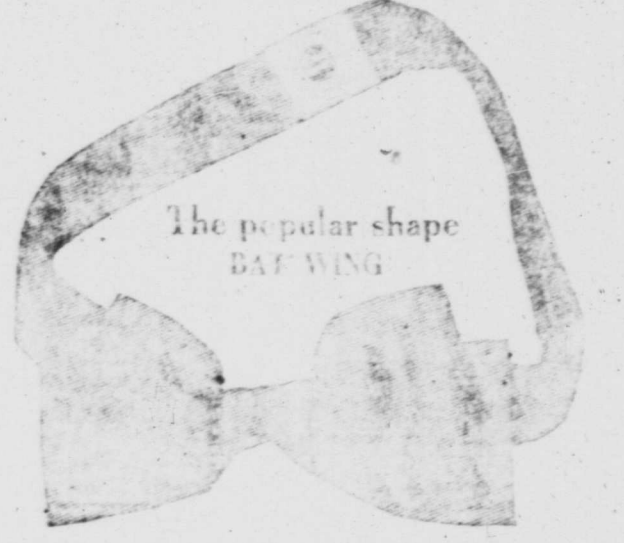
