

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#### SENATE REPRIMANDS PECOS AND EL PASO.

The following message from Austin appeared in the El Paso Times of the 20th, in which Senator Hudspeth scores Congressman Smith:

Austin, Texas, March 19 .- The arrival of Congressman W. R. Smith, supplementing the force of Texas congressmen already on the ground while an effort is being made to obtain redistricting, brought forth severest condemnation for the western congressman from Senator Claud B. Hudspeth to the effect that his congressman has misrepresented him; while Senator Carter offered a resolution that the action of the El Paso chamber of commerce and Pecos chamber of commerce are resented, that the senate expressed its confidence in every member of the congressional districts free conference committee, that the senate does not appreciate the efforts of congressmen to interfere with its deliberations and that the action of certain congressmen to disrupt the free conference committee is deplored and the senate believes the committee will re-district the state without regard to the congressmen, but in behalf of the people. This resolution was sent to the committeeon federal relations after the row.

#### Marked Improvement Shown in Tubercular Cases Treated Ten Days Ago.

New York, Mar. 18 .- Marked improvement in the patients inoculated district and of the state. He asserted with his anti-tuberculosis vaccine about ten days ago was noted by Dr. Friederich Friedmann when he examined them today, according to Dr. Friedmann and his assistants tonight. Sixteen of the seventeen persons inoculated appeared for the examination. The tubercular joints treated longer. He practically passed the lie were examined and tests applied.

#### Patients Say They Feel Better.

"The patients all declared they felt better," said Dr. M. A. Sturm, one of the assistants. "There was absolute improvement in every respect. In one knee case the swelling was found, by actual measurement, to have been reduced fully half an inch. The two kidney cases also showed improvement."

Dr. Friedmann said the physicians present at the examination have been very enthusiastic regarding the results achieved. The doctor took occasion to deny that he had treated patients for gain.

"Large sums of money have been offered to me," he declared, "but I have not accepted any money for treatment. I came here to cure tuberculosis and not for money."
