The Pecos Commercial Club held its October meeting Monday night. The attendance was large, and the program a most interesting one. There were several visitors, among Springs, northwest of here; L. H. Davis, the well known mining journalist of the Southwest, now connected with the El Paso Morning Times; H. H. Jones, who is this year developing a pump-irrigated farm near Hoban; Chas. Weinacht, one of the pioneer farmers of the Davis Mountains beyond Balmorhea; and a number of others.

Mayor Canon opened the program with a discussion of the municipal improvements that have been made. and the plans of the City Council for extensions of this work. He stated that, to date, about nine and a half miles of sewer pipe have been laid, with seven flush-tanks, one hundred twenty-eight manholes, and six hundred wves for house connections. Thus far the work as completed has cost the city \$3,158 a mile. The last step in the work will be the erection of a sewage disposal plant, at a minimum cost of \$2,500.

Judge Canon stated that a test was being made of the new water tank and tower which was completed by the contractors Saturday afternoon. The city fire engine hitched to an artesian well was used to pump the tank full, and a number of small leaks were located. The distance from the surface of the ground to the bottom of the bowl of the tank, the mayor stated, is 90 feet. This bowl is ten feet deep, and holds 3,332 gallons. The tank holds 100,000 gallons above this point, or 100 feet from the ground. Tower and tank cost \$6,485, and



From the west and from the east German reverses are reported. Germans acknowledged a check in Russian Poland, but concerning the great battle in Flanders she preserves silence. The only official word received today was from the French, who again made indefinite claims to further progress.

Not since the struggle along the North Sea began a fortnight ago has Germany made a statement upon which may be based judgment as to the course of events. The best information available indicates that notwithstanding their desperate attacks and heavy sacrifices of life the Germans are further from the coast than when the battle began.

The one great factor upon which the allies build their hopes of an eventful triumph apparently is, according to their claims, beginning to tell. It is the almost inexhaustible supply of men that may be drawn from the vast reaches of the British and Russian empires, which are relied upon in time to crush the Germans by overwhelming numbers In the east this influence seemingly is already being feit and to it is ascribed the German reverse in Russian Poland. The secret of the Russian victory, writes a British correspondent at Petrograd, lies in the vastness of the Russian emperor's army, which he estimates at eight million men. 

#### WHY THE WAR SHOULD IN-CREASE OUR BUSINESS.

(Dallas News.) There are some reasons why the war may be expected to increase rather than diminish our trade. If the grain fields of other countries are converted into battlefields and their factories changed into ruins or must supply them with food and clothing and other things necessary for human existence. According to the statement of our secretary of state, "Commercial transactions between the belligerent governments of Europe and private citizens of the United States in no way affect if arms and ammunition are in-

The state department has been led to make the statement by numerous inquiries indicating a widespread impression that American business men can not sell war supplies to the belligerants without

"In the first place," the statement adds. "it should be understood that, generally speaking, a citizen of the United States can sell to a belligerent government or its agent any article of commerce which he pleases. It makes no difference whether the articles sold are exclusively for war purposes, such as firearms, explosives, etc., or are foodstuffs, clothing, horses, etc., for the use of the army or navy of the belligerent.

"Furthermore, a neutral government is not compelled by international law, by treaty or by statute to prevent those sales to a belliger ent. Such sales, therefore. American citizens do not affect the

neutrality of the United States. "It is true such articles as those mentioned are, outside the territorial jurisdiction of a neutral nation. subject to seizure by an enemy of be purchasing government, but the enemy's duty to prevent the articles reaching their destination. not the duty of the Nation whose citizens have sold them. If the enemy of the purchasing nation happens to be unable to do this. that is for him one of the misfortunes of war: the inability, however, imposes on the neutral government no obligation to prevent

"Neither the President nor any executive department of the government possesses the legal authority to interfere in any way in trade between people of this country and the territory of a belligerent, although in the case of neighboring American republics congress has given the President power to proclaim an embargo on arms and ammunition when in his judgment it would tend to prevent civil strife.

"For the government of the United States itself to sell to a belligerent nation would be an unneutral act, but for a private individual to sell to a belligerent any produce of the United States is neither unlawful nor unneutral, nor within


