





One kind, for instance, forms the base of cordite, while another variety is used in the manufacture of calluloid, which is the principal ingredient in the incendiary shells used by the Germans to set fire to towns and villages, and in the little "firebug" disks carried by their infantrymen for a like pur-

Thousands of tons of candles are issued to the troops in the field, where, of course, hardly any other kind of illuminant is usually available. The wicks of these are made of waste; no other material will do.

Aviators use it to clean their machines; so, too, do motor mechanics and engineers. A plentiful supply of oiled waste is almost as necessary to a gun's crew as is ammunition, as no other substance will swah

Washington, Dec. 19 .-- A bill rawn by former president Taft, degned to enable the federal governnent to enforce treaty provisions or protection of aliens in the states as introduced today by Represenative Bartholdt and referred to he house judiciary commission. Lawyers in the house who saw he measure did not understand that it could apply to such situations as have arisen in California and Arizona, but would eover such cases as have arisen in other states. where aliens have been injured and the machinery of the state government gave no relief.

The bill would make such crimes punishable in the federal courts as well as in the state courts.



The French claim advances all along the line. the re-capture by the British troops of trenches previously lost and the repulse of the German attacks aimed at the retaking of trenches which have allen to the allies during the past day or two. To the south of Novon, also, the French claim t have gained a foothold in the first line of the German trenches. No mention is made by the French any repulse of the allied forces. The German official statement tells of the dislodgment in the neighborhood of the canal of Isa Bassee of the Anglo-Indian troops
