Church Plans Revival Services

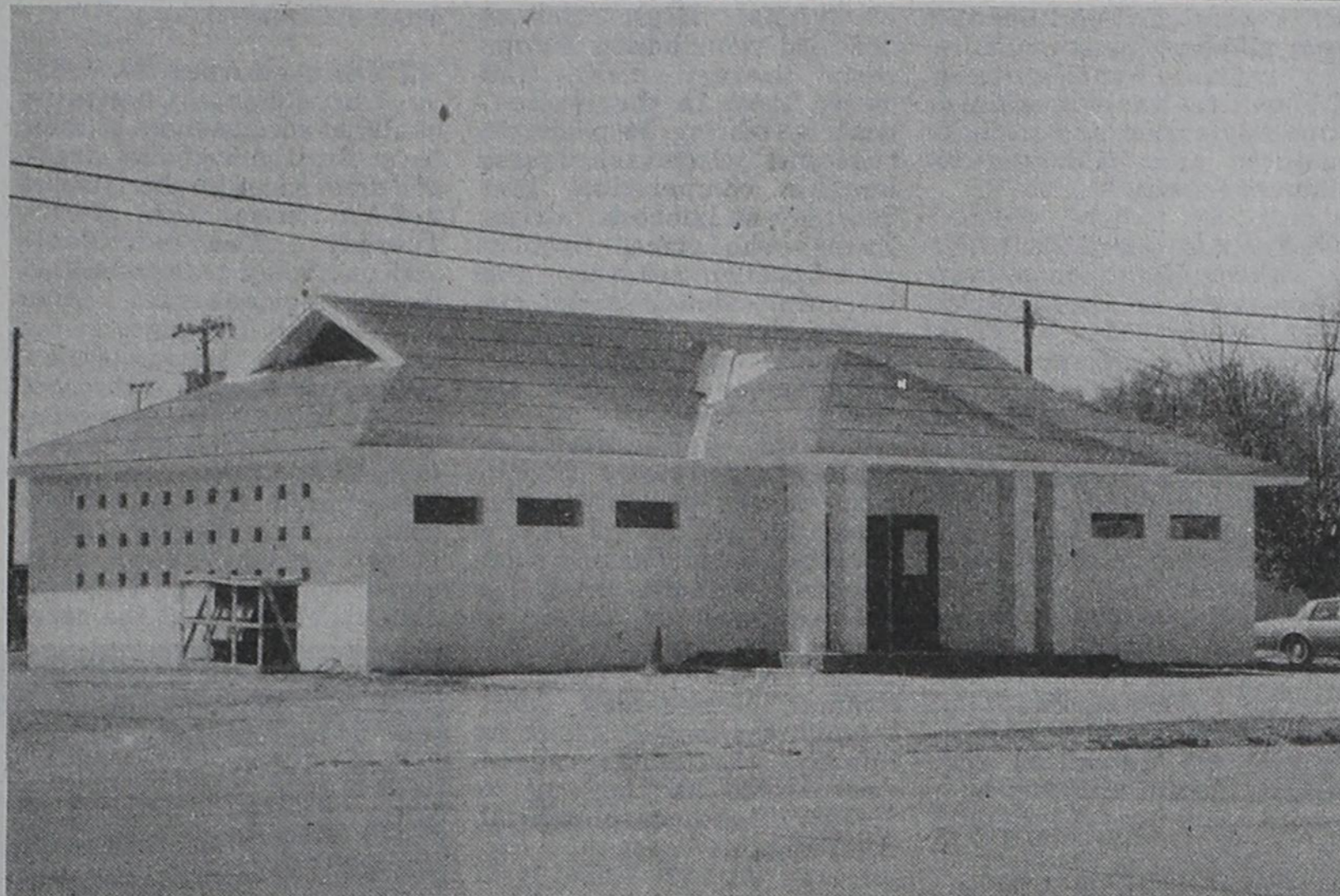
Calvary Baptist Church is planning revival services beginning this Saturday, April 25 through next Tuesday, April 28 at 7:30 each evening.

New Head Coach Hired For FHS

The Friona I.S.D. Board of Trustees named Mike Scott as new head football coach and Athletic Director at Friona High School, at a called meeting Wednesday night.

Scott replaces James Morton, who was named head coach at Lubbock Monterey two weeks earlier.

Scott was currently serving as an assistant coach at South Garland High School.

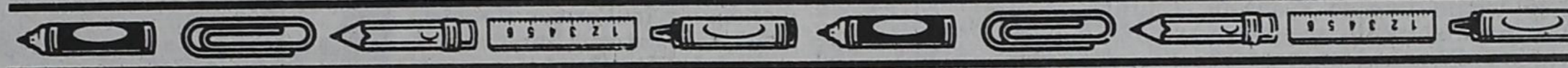
A native of Hereford, the new coach graduated from Hereford High School in 1985. At Hereford he participated in football, basketball and baseball. He was selected as District 3-5A's Most Valuable Player for offense following the 1984 season.

Scott played college football at Eastern New Mexico University, where he was a two-year starter at quarterback. He was named to the all-academic Lone Star Conference team in 1987-89. He was on the second team all-LSC in 1989, and was voted as "Greatest Greyhound" in 1989.

Scott served as a graduate assistant football coach at ENMU, 1990-92, and also received his master's degree while there. He became an assistant football and baseball coach at South Garland in 1992.

Superintendent Hal Ratcliff told the Friona Star that the school received a number of applicants for the position, and felt that a qualified person had been hired for the job.

"We wanted to resolve this as quickly as possible, for the sake of the other coaches, players, and everyone involved," he said.



Friona School Board Candidates



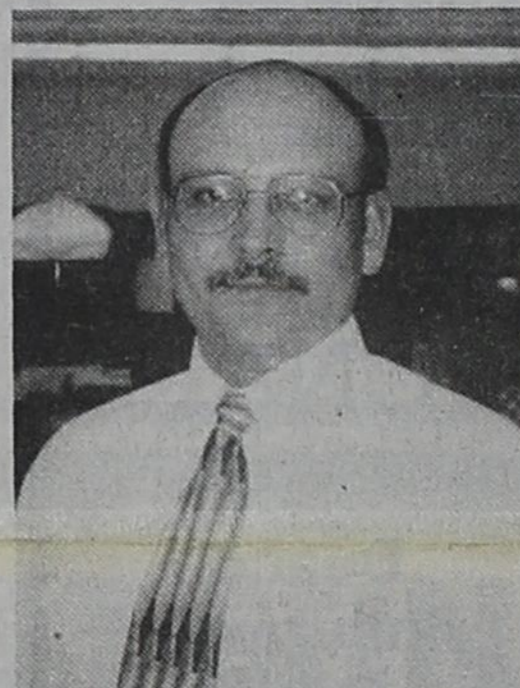

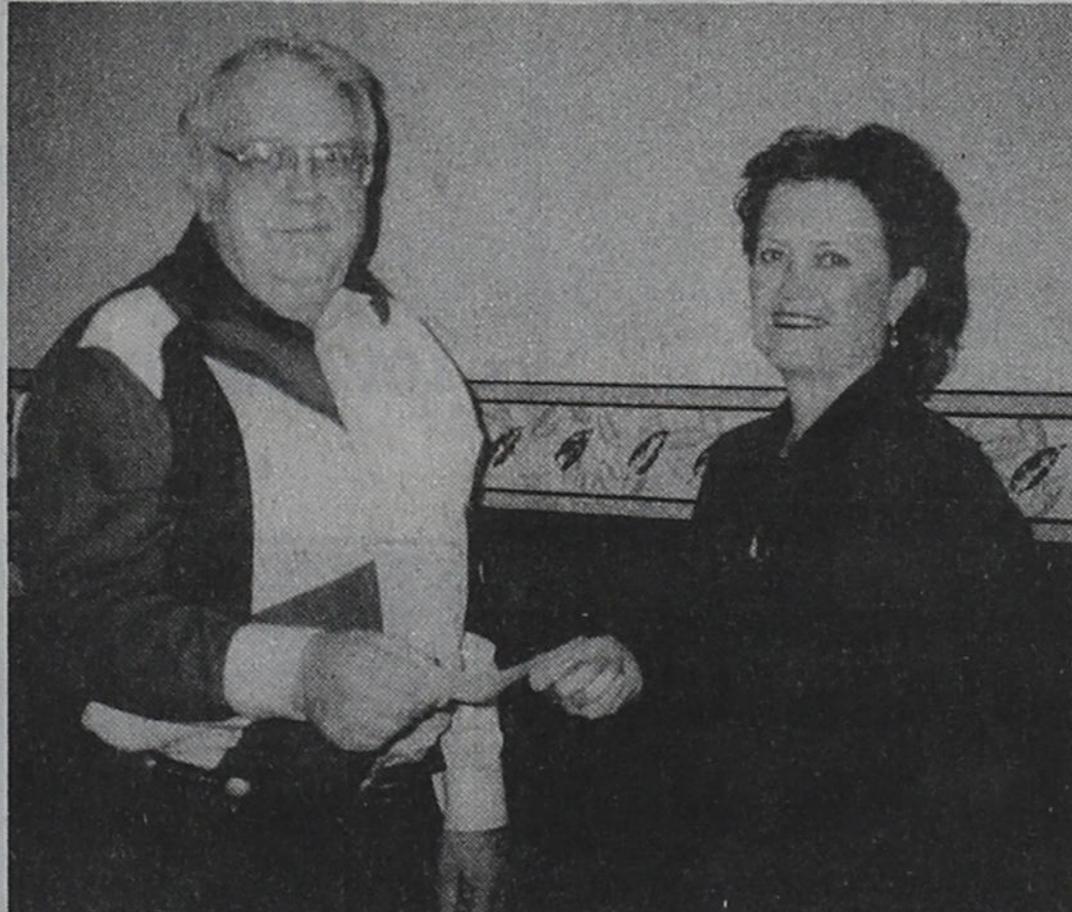

Cemetery Association Has Annual Meeting

The Friona Cemetery Association met for their annual meeting April 17 at City Hall.

Election results were canvassed and Jim Johnston was elected to serve along with holdover members, Mary Joyce Barnett and Martha Hamilton.

Officers for 1998 were re-elected. They include: John Fred White, president; Roy Miller, vice president; Mary Joyce Barnett, secretary; Gladys Day, treasurer; and Martha Hamilton, reporter. Other board members are Russell O'Brian, Judy Cummings and Marlene Drake.

It was announced that \$6455 in dues and donations have been received to date. Donations have been given for additional trees and several more red oak trees will be planted around the main drive in the cemetery.

The association will be adding to the existing water

system to provide drip irrigation for the new trees. A start on walkways within the cemetery is included in future plans.

In old business, it was announced that red Tempo climbing roses have been planted around the gazebo.

The association gave \$2500 to the City of Friona to help with summer upkeep and care for the cemetery.

Suggestions for any additional improvements or work are welcomed. Memorial gifts or other donations will be used as suggested by donors.

Pioneer Museum Windows Available For Sponsorship

According to board member Billie Tongate the sponsorship of windows for the Pioneer Museum is proceeding at a good pace. Members of the Museum announced this week that over 15% of the windows have already been reserved.

The Museum is having a window sponsorship drive where individuals or companies can sponsor new windows for the historic building located on Sixth Street in Friona.

Contributors will be able to sponsor a 3' x 6' window or a 3' x 4' window. Individual

plaques will be placed beneath the new windows that will identify the contributor's name and can also contain an "In Memory Of" or "In Honor Of" message.

The large 3' x 6' windows have a sponsor cost of \$450 and the small 3' x 4' windows have a sponsor cost of \$250.

45 Yrs. Ago-April 23, 1953

District 10-B Interscholastic League events were completed in Friona, Tuesday, with Friona winning 316 points to lead the slate of six schools entering. Vega took second honors with 220 points, followed by Farwell at 202. Bovina accounted for 134; Adrian 103 and Lazbuddie 72.

40 Yrs. Ago-April 24, 1958

Friona's bus barns took on a carnival look Friday as interested onlookers and boys from all over the country gathered for the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show. Jim Roy Wells of Friona was about the "proudest" youngster there Friday when Judge Nig Callihan picked his Hereford calf as the Grand Champion. Reserve Champion went to the Clements Bros., also of Friona.

35 Yrs. Ago-April 25, 1963

30 Yrs. Ago-April 25, 1968

Friona High School qualified two students for the state literary meet, and placed third in the regional meet by scoring 54 points in regional Interscholastic League competition last Saturday at Lubbock. Crista Evans, who placed first in girls poetry reading, and Norman Mohr, first in informative speaking, are the two who qualified for the state meet May 2-4 in Austin.

Nobody knows for sure exactly how many people came to the dedication and open house for Friona's Missouri Beef Packers last weekend-but one thing for sure--it was a mass of humanity. Undoubtedly the largest crowd ever to come to Friona in one day went through the modern plant on Sunday. Estimates ranged from 10,000 all the way to 20,000. There was no official head count.

25 Yrs. Ago-April 26, 1973

High wind, which blasted the area last Thursday, toppled a portion of the former Continental Grain Company elevator. A landmark in Parmer County, the elevator had been scheduled for demolition, as it has been leaning precariously since June 11, 1971, when a small twister bounced through Friona leaving scattered damage. The elevator is located at the south edge of Friona on Highway 214.

20 Yrs. Ago-April 23, 1978

Leslie White, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl White, was named delegate to the Boy's State Convention this week, while Priscilla Pruett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Pruett, was named the Girl's State delegate.

Officials of St. Teresa's Catholic Church have announced plans for a new

auditorium to be constructed on the church property. Cost of the new building is to be around \$160,000.

15 Yrs. Ago-April 24, 1983

The Friona Chieftains qualified six members of their team for the regional track and field meet at the District 2-AAA meet in Tulia Tuesday. Two individuals and one relay team qualified for the regional meet. Mike Chaney won first place in the discus event, setting a new district record with a throw of 159-4. Mike Neill, who came off the injured list less than a month ago, won the 110-meter high hurdles with a time of 15.2. Friona's 1600-meter relay team also qualified with a time of 3:28.8. Members of the relay

team are John Aguirre, Rich Malouf, Ricky Marquez and Alfredo Mata.

10 Yrs. Ago-April 23, 1988

The Chamber of Commerce held a ribbon-cutting ceremony at An Added Touch, located at 719 Main.

The Friona area received a good rain last Saturday, with .78 inches measured in the city gauge that day.

5 Yrs. Ago-April 24, 1993

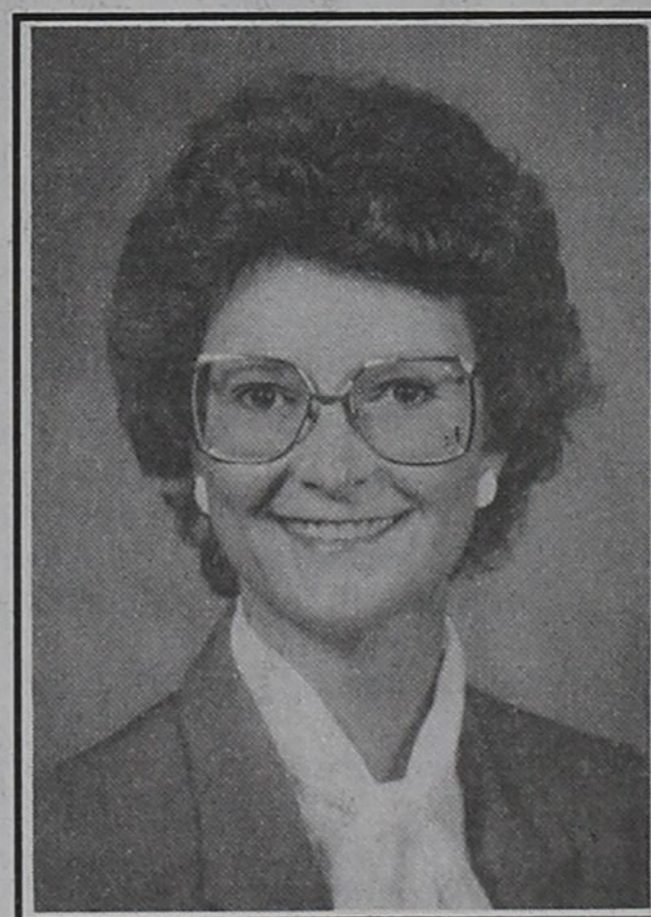

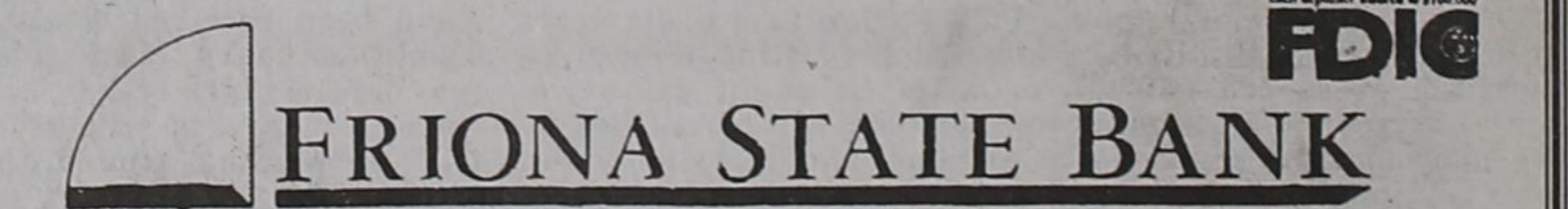

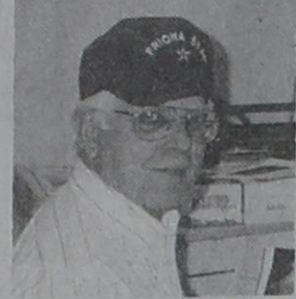

Out Here

Thirty-two years ago today, April 24, 1966, was a Sunday. I spent most of that day in a place called the "Dad's Den."

Sounds like a bar but it wasn't but I wished it was before the day was over.

Dad's Den was the cute name of a waiting room at Baylor Hospital in Dallas.

In 1966, dads had to have a place to wait while moms were "back there in the labor room", getting ready for the next stop, "the delivery room" which was off-limits to everyone except mom, the doctor and the nurse.

Nowadays you can hold a family reunion in the modern "berthing rooms" if you want to and bring in a small orchestra to serenade the baby on its journey along the birth canal.

In 1966, dads read magazines, watched TV and smoked in the "Dad's Den", waiting for the nurses to shuttle out with progress reports.

About the only thing you usually found out was the nurse's favorite medical description, "She's doin' jest fine."

"But she's been in there for eight hours."

"I know, but she's doin' jest fine. It shouldn't be long now."

"Is she still screaming?"

"Oh yeah. But she's doin' jest fine."

On that April Sunday 32-years-ago my firstborn daughter made her mother's life miserable for 36 hours and kept me waiting in Dad's Den so long I was reading the classifieds in the back of a two-year-old Field and Stream magazine.

I must have met at least a dozen other dads in Dad's Den. Most of them didn't have a chance to finish an entire bass fishing article before the nurse came out with the good news: "Congratulations Mr. Biffle, it's a boy. Sorry Mr. Carr, she's still doin' jest fine."

I remember one dad who was there in the morning and came back in the afternoon to visit his baby. He had a fresh shower and smelled like Old Spice. "You still here?" he said in amazement as I scratched my beard and unstuck my underwear for the umpteenth time.

In 1966, lamaze classes weren't invented. Daddies were not allowed near the delivery room, much less having your entire graduating class as spectators.

As a matter of fact, it was the next day or two before dad could even hold the baby. You graduated from Dad's Den to looking through a glass into the

nursery while attendants tried to match you with your little one.

Because of the fear of germs, even relatives were kept at a distance from the little bundle. And mothers were allowed to stay in the hospital several days, not sent home within 12 hours like new mothers today.

My firstborn finally made her earthly appearance at 4 p.m. Sunday. We brought her home Tuesday. Her mother would have stayed another week if they would have let her.

We named her Candace Caye Carr and called her Candee. We thought it would be neat if her initials were "C. C. C." Of course we spelled Kay "C-a-y-e" and Candy "C-a-n-d-e-e" so that no one else would ever know how to spell it.

In 1966 cloth diapers had not yet become a museum item. I washed out plenty of them before flinging them in the diaper pail. After a day or two, the diaper pail took on an aroma similar to road kill.

She drank out of glass baby bottles which we warmed in an electric bottle warmer with hot water in the bottom. At 2 a.m. in the morning, it seemed to take forever for the water to get hot enough to warm the bottle.

Car seats were not common, nor required by law. We held her in our lap when we went anywhere.

Her first pair of shoes were corrective ones. When they got too small for her feet, we cut the toes out so she could sleep in them. Today they are bronzed and take up a little shelf in the

corner of my bedroom.

She started walking, then talking, and became a daddy's girl. Yes, I was a pushover. All right! A marshmallow too.

Most places I went, Candee went. Hardware store or barber shop, didn't matter. She tagged along after daddy and daddy loved it.

When she was seven years old her mother and I divorced. Instead of tagging after daddy every day, she had to settle for weekends and a night at the Old Spaghetti Warehouse every now and then.

For the next few years we would spend a week every summer together in places like Acapulco, Hawaii, or on a Caribbean Cruise.

I tried to be as good as I could but life got complicated. By high school she had other things to do and I had a new wife and two more kids.

She went to college at Baylor University in Waco where she met her future husband. They have been married eleven years and have three kids. The oldest is five now.

Seems like just yesterday little Candee sat in my lap at night and fell asleep. Seems like last week when she would come crawl in bed with us at night. She always climbed in on my side because she knew I wouldn't take her back to her own bed.

It seems like a millenium since that day in the Dad's Den 32-years-ago. Somehow time and life have a way of getting out of sync.

Happy birthday C. C. C. Jones. I'm thinking about you today.

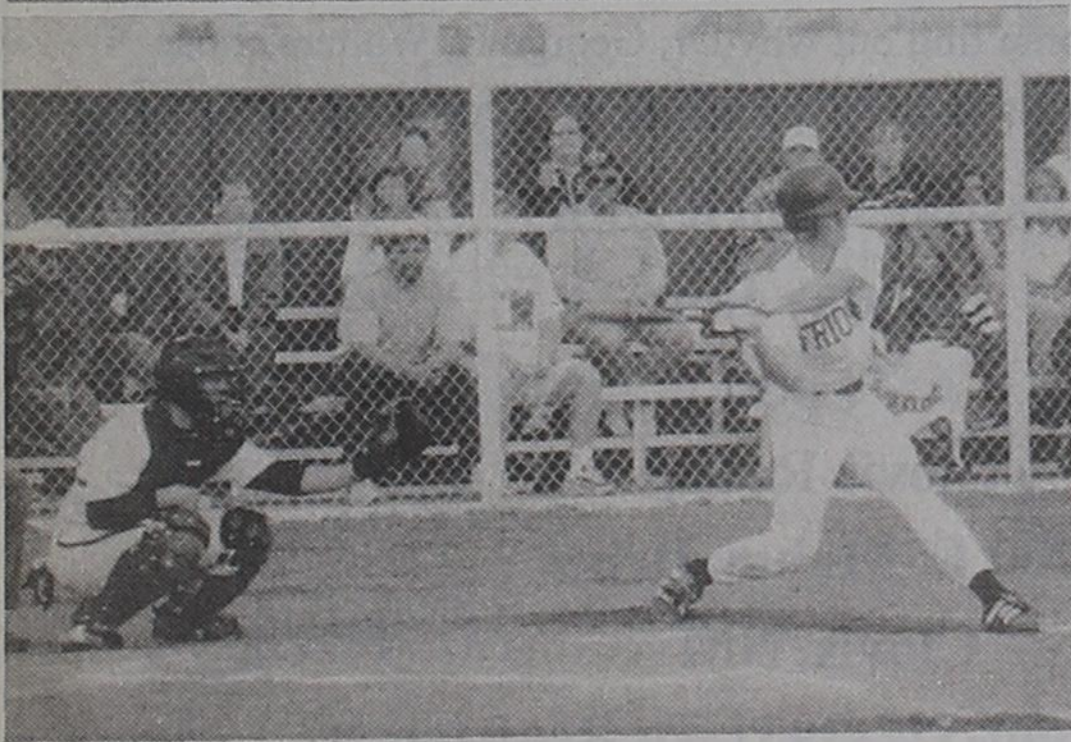

Blurred Vision

Is blurred vision serious? It's certainly inconvenient, and you should schedule an optometric examination. You may just need corrective glasses, and the eye doctor can prescribe them. But blurred vision may be a sign of infection or serious illness that calls for professional care.

If, for instance, central vision is blurred while peripheral vision remains clear, there may have been important changes in the central part of the retina, the macula. Immediate professional attention may be needed to preserve vision. On the other hand, if peripheral vision begins to blur while central vision remains clear, which may happen gradually, it may be an early sign of glaucoma. Immediate diagnosis and treatment are vital.

Blurred vision signals an immediate call to the eye doctor. But it's smarter to schedule regular examinations to catch problems early.

TENSION HEADACHE
