Junior League's Growth

Made in Thirty Years The nucleus of the present Association of Junior Leagues of America was the Junior league of the New York college settlement, organized by Miss Mary Harriman in 1900. This was followed in 1906 by the founding of a second league in Boston, Baltimore, Brooklyn and Philadelphia having meanwhile joined the ranks, the first general conference was held in 1911. In 1920 the 39 leagues then existing were organized by Mrs. Willard Straight (Dorothy Whitney) into the present association, and six years later a national headquarters was established in New York city, and in the following year an anthology of Junior league poetry was published. In the same year the Bulletin, since 1912 the official organ, was converted into the Junior League Magazine. There were 101 league in the United States, representing 39 states, and three additional leagues in Canada in 1928. The same year a national club, with offices and exhibition rooms, was established in New York city.

The Alaskan Flag

Alaska has recently adopted an official flag. It has a blue field, bordered on three sides with a narrow band of gold. In the upper righthand corner appears Polaris and below it the constellation Ursa Major, with its two "pointers" indicating the North star. The field of blue is held to symbolize the evening sky, the sea, mountain lakes and the wild flowers of Alaska; and the gold border, the wealth in Alaskan hills and streams. Polaris is the ever-constant guide of the explorer, woodsman, prospector and surveyor. And Alaskans hope that the northernmost star may some day take its place as the forty-ninth in our national em-

Earthquake's Vagaries

An earthquake irrigated a cantaloupe field at Brawley, Calif., recently when a tremblor caused small geysers to spout five inches high over the 160-acre field owned by the S. A. Gerrard company. The water frrigated the entire field and then flooded adjacent areas before subsiding. Small sand piles were left in the wake of unusual inundation, and a beet field nearby was completely covered by new sand.



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

B. Short PARTS AND TILLAGE LINE By ELMO SCOTT WATSON.

O ONE can say for certain dea of Memorial day originated. A recent hisorian, Lloyd Lewis, attributes it to the grief which swept the nation at the death of Abraham Lincoln. Writing in Liberty magazine two years ago under the title of "Memorial Day is Born"

he says: "Always there will be a dispute over where the day began, because the day itself came from nowhere andeverywhere. The greater the number of claimants for its birthplace, the plainer the proof that the Republic was aching vaguely with eagerness to speak its grief after four years of killing. Seven hundred thousand men, Blue and Gray, were dead. "The funeral of the war's greatest

figure pointed the way. "Each little fugitive decoration of graves across the land was a seed springing from ground that had been harrowed into fertility by the Lincoln funeral spectacle. Sentiment crystallized as that burial drama, with its pomp and storms of flowers, fitted into the mood of the moment."

As for the various claimants, there can only be regarded the facts of their observances, each of which contained the germ of the idea, in their chronological order without attempting to assign any priority to any one. On June 1, 1861, Warrentown, Va., held memorial services over the grave of a Confederate hero, John Quincy Marr. On May 1, 1865, a memorial service was held in Charleston, S. C., which had been organized by James Redpath (war correspondent and later founder of the Redpath Lyceum Bureau) who was then superintendent of the freedmen's schools in that city.

That same year, some time in the spring of 1865, the women of Columbus, Ga., had decorated the graves of their war dead and the following January the members of the Ladies' Aid society there decided to perpetuate the custom. They picked upon April 26, 1866, the anniversary of the surrender of Gen. Joseph Johnston, the last formal act of the Civil war, as the date for their Memorial day celebration. Montgomery, Ala., observed the same day, April 26, 1866: Fredericksburg, Va., decided upon May 10, 1866, and Camden, Ark., decorated graves in November, 1866. Up North at least one memorial service was held in 1866. Gen. John J. Murray of Waterloo, N. Y., and some of his comrades in the Union army are said to have decorated graves in their home cemetery on May 22, 1866.

But even though it is impossible to establish definitely any exact priority in the matter of the origin of this day, it is possible to trace a succession of events which led to the observance of what, perhaps, may be characterized as the "first Memorial day" in its close resemblance to the event as it is now celebrated. On April, 1866, the women of Columbus, Miss., held memorial services in the cemetery of that town and decorated not only the graves of the Confederate war dead but also those of

some Union soldiers buried there. The next spring there appeared in · New York newspaper a brief paragraph which stated that "the women of Columbus, Miss., have shown themselves impartial in their offerings made to the memory of the dead. They strewed flowers alike on the graves of the Confederate and of the National diers." Among those who read that item was a young lawyer named Francis Miles Finch who was living in Ithaca, N. Y. It inspired him to write the following verses:

THE BLUE AND THE GRAY

By the flow of the inland river, Whence the fleets of iron have fled, Where the blades of the grave-grass

Asleep are the ranks of the dead: Under the sod and the dew, Waiting the judgment-day; Inder the one, the Blue, Under the other, the Gray

These in the robings of glory,
Those in the gloom of defeat,
All with the battle-blood gory, in the dusk of eternity meet

From the silence of sorrowful hours The desolate mourners go,
Lovingly laden with flowers

So with an equal splendor, The morning sun-rays fall, With a touch impartially tender, On the blossoms blooming for all: Under the sod and the dew Waiting the judgment-day; Broidered with gold, the Blue, Mellowed with gold, the Gray.

So, when the summer calleth. On forest and field of grain,
With an equal murmur falleth
The cooling drip of the rain:
Under the sod and the dew, Waiting the judgment-day; Vet with the rain, the Blue, Wet the rain, the Gray.

Sadly, but not with upbraiding. The generous deed was done, In the storm of the years that are fading
No braver battle was won:
Under the sod and the dew,

Waiting the judgment-day; Under the blossoms, the Blue, Under the garlands, the Gray.

No more shall the war-cry sever, Or the winding rivers be red; They banish our anger forever When they laurel the graves of our

Under the sod and the dew, Waiting the judgment-day; Love and tears for the Blue, Tears and love for the Gray.

When this poem was published it achieved instant popularity, it was widely reprinted and later set to music so that its message of reconciliation was carried to all points of

Meanwhile on April 6, 1866, there had been organized at Decatur, Ill., a group of Union veterans who took the name of the Grand Army of the Republic and within a short time thousands of men who had worn the blue were members of the G. A. R., as it became familiarly known. In 1868 the national commander of the G. A. R. was Gen. John A. Logan of Illinois. On a cold, raw day in March of that year a party from Washington set out to visit the battlefields around Richmond. The leader of the group was Col. Charles L. Wilson, a Chicago editor of that time, and with him were his niece, flancee and Mrs. John A. Logan. They rode from one scene of desolation to another, touched by the poverty of the region, once the proud capital of the Confederacy. And above all they noticed the numberless Confederate graves, most of them decorated with faded flowers and bunting, with here and there an improvised gravestone.

Returning to Washington, the Richmond pilgrims went to the rooms of General Logan, who had been unable to accompany his wife on the trip because of the pressure of congressional business. The war-torn country about Richmond was described to him; the rows of graves, each marked by some loving hand, now covered by a gentle snow that, nevertheless, could not dim the tokens of devotion left upon them.

"The Greeks and Romans," said General Logan, "in the day of their glory, were wont to honor their hero dead by chaplets of laurel and flowers, as well as bronze and stone" And he added that this thought should be carried over to the United States. It could be done, he believed, by the issuance of an order from him. as commander in chief of the G. A. R. to the posts established throughout the North.

General Logan immediately set about writing the order and the following night called a meeting of the G. A. R. staff officers in his rooms at the old Willard hotel, Washington, where the order he had written was submitted for their approval. The staff was unanimous in agreement and not long thereafter "Order No. 11" was broadcast from G. A. R. headquarters all over the country. In part that famous order reads as fol-

I. The 30th day of May, 1865, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating, the graves of comrades who died in defence of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village, hamlet and churchyard in the land. In this observance, no form of ceremony is prescribed, but posts and comrades will, in their own way, arrange such fitting services and testimonials of respect, as circumstances may permit.

we are organized, comrades, as our regulations tell us, for the purpose among other things, "of preserving and strengthening those kind and fraternal feelings which have bound together the soldiers, sailors and marines, who united together to suppress the late rebellion." What can aid more to assure this result than by cherishing tenderly this result than by cherishing tenderly the memory of our heroic dead, who made their breasts a barricade between made their breasts a barricade between our country and its foes. Their soldier lives were the reveille of freedom to a race in chains, and their deaths the tattoo of rebellious tyranny in arms. We should guard their graves with eacred vigilance. All that the consecrated wealth and taste of the nation can add to their advantage that security is add to their adornment and security, is add to their adornment and security, is but a fitting tribute to the memory of her slain defenders. Let no wanton foot tread rudely on such hallowed grounds. Let pleasant paths invite the coming and going of reverent visitors and fond mourners. Let no vandalism of avarice or neglect, no ravages of time, testify to the present or to the coming generations that we have forgotten, as a peo-ple, the cost of a free and undivided

If other eyes grow dull, and other hands slack, and other hearts grow cold in the solemn trust, ours shall keep it well, as long as the light and warmth of life remain to us.

Let us, then, at the time appointed, gather around their sacred remains, and garland the passionless mounds above them with the choicest flowers of springtime; let us raise above them the dear old flag they saved from dishonor; let us, in this solemn presence, renew our pledges to aid and assist those whom they have left among us a sacred charge upon a nation's grati-tude—the soldier's widow and orphan.

II. It is the purpose of the com-mander-in-chief to inaugurate this ob-servance, with the hope that it will be kept up from year to year, while a survivor of the war remains to honor the memory of his departed comrades. Dead," a memorial that had been erected to the memory of 2,111 unidentified dead found on the fields of Bull Run and the route to Rappahannock. The principal address was delivered by James A. Garfield, twelve years later elected President of the United States. As yet the term Memorial day, or Decoration day, had not been linked with the observance, and his address, afterward printed in pamphlet form in Cleveland, Ohio, was simply entitled: "Oration of Hon, James A. Garfield, delivered at Arlington, Va., May 30, 1868, on the Occasion of Strewing Flowers on the Graves of Union Soldiers."

The idea spread rapidly and at the ceremonies held by the G. A. R. in Monument remetery in Philadelphia on May 29, 1875, it was recorded that "the annual floral decoration of the graves of our dead soldiers has become a national custom." For it was doing much to heat the wounds of the war and, in uniting to honor their dead, the North and the South were forgetting the bitterness of a few short years before. One of the most significant bits of evidence of this occurred in Brooklyn when on the eve of May 30, 1877, a great throng assembled in the Academy of Music to hear the chief orator of the day-Judge Roger A. Pryor, formerly brigadler general in the Confederate army.

HIGHER QUALITY IN LAMBS NEEDED

Campaign Being Launched in Ohio for Improvement.

With prospects of lower prices for fat lambs this summer, quality in the lambs marketed will become increasingly important, says L. A. Kauffman, extension specialist in sheep husbandry for the Ohio State university. "Many lambs are now being contracted for on a basis of 8 or 9 cents a pound for fall delivery," says Kauffman. "The best lambs will be none too high from the producer's stand-

In the effort to improve the quality of the lamb crop, by reducing the number of bucky and undocked lambs marketed for from \$1 to \$3 below the top of the market, a statewide native lamb improvement campaign is being launched in Ohio, backed by the Institute of American Meat Packers, the National Live Stock and Meat board. the agricultural departments of the railroads, the United States Department of Agriculture and the National

Live Stock Producers' association. Prizes are offered by these agencies for the counties which show the greatest improvement in the quality of their lambs. The extension agricultural agents in each of the 88 counties of the state are being asked by Kauffman to enroll their counties in the lamb improvement project.

Importance of the sheep industry in Ohlo is indicated by the fact which Kauffman cites, that this state has more sheep than any other state east of the Mississippi river.

as Protein Supplement Corn gluten feed is a good protein supplement for fattening steers if it is mixed with some other protein feed such as ilnseed or cottonseed meal. It is not advisable to use corn gluten feed alone to supplement corn grain. Mix the corn gluten feed in equal parts with linseed or cottonseed meal or both and you will have a good supplement whether you are feeding shell corn or ground barley.

Feed Grain in Creeps

Yearling steers need about two

pounds of this supplement per head

daily when on full feed,

Early spring lambs to be fattened for market should be given grain when three or four weeks old. A creep should be built where the lambs may go to get their grain at any time. If the ewes are giving plenty of milk, the lambs will not eat much grain at first, but as they become larger they will eat enough grain to make considerable difference in their gains and finish. By following the plan of creep feeding, lambs may be marketed ear-Her at a higher price.

Fine Structure Dedicated at City Airport.

Detroit.-Situated within 20 minutes of the Detroit city hall, at Connors and Gratiot avenues, the new milliondollar exposition building and bangar of the Detroit city airport approaches the specifications for an "A" rating by the Department of Commerce, according to William J. Wallace, engineer-manager of the airport.

The hangar, dedicated at the All-American Aircraft show, was built under the direct supervision of Perry

The hangar has two doors with a clear span of 80 feet, 20 feet high; ten doors with a clear span of 100 feet, 20 feet high, and two doors with a clear span of 150 feet, 25 feet and 30 feet high, providing for efficient entrance and exit for airplanes. The 150-foot doors are motor operated.

The filling of the creek bed which traversed the field of the airport has been in progress during the past two years, and together with the grading operations, has provided a smooth surface with no slope more than 2 per cent in any direction. The tills in some instances have exceeded 30 feet. In general the field is level and the elevation is 618 feet above sea tevel.

nautic association announced. The University of Detroit was second, Yale third, and New York university fourth. Other entrants were Ohio State, University of Michigan, and Dartmouth university.

Harvard received \$1,000, together with the trophy to be kept until it is awarded again. Detroit received \$500, Yale \$300, and New York university \$200.

COSTE TO ATTEMPT OCEAN JUMP AGAIN

Frenchman Plans to Flight This Spring

New York,-Defeated once in his attempt to fly the north Atlantic from east to west, Capt. Dieudonne Coste will attempt this spring to fulfill a promise made in America in 1928.

Reversing Lindbergh's route, the daring French aviator proposes to fly from Paris to New York in a tri-motored Brequet plane, modeled after his famous ship of last year, the Question

Last July he started with Maurice Bellonte in the craft, powered with a single motor, to span the ocean, but faced with headwinds, landed back in France after a flight of more than 3,100 miles over water.

Undaunted by the failure and still tempted by the Atlantic, they refitted the plane, but headed toward China and landed in Tsitsihar, Manchuria, with a new world's airline distance record to their credit. They had flown 4,948.59 miles nonstop in 51 hours and 39 minutes.

Later they piloted the plane anew world's distance record over a closed circuit, flying 4,987 miles in 52 hours and 30 minutes.

The promise to fly the Atlantic was made by Coste, then a lieutenant, when here in 1928 with Joseph Lebrix in the midst of a round-the-world tour in which they carried the tricolor of France 35,000 miles.

"We do not want to go back to Paris by plane," the aviator said, "because Lindbergh has already done that; it would be useless repetition to follow him. After we get back to France we shall plan the east-to-west flight of the north Atlantic."

Overshoes for Planes Keep Ice Off the Wings

Ithaca, N. Y .- Overshoes for airplanes-a new method of keeping wings free of deadly ice-are announced at Cornell university, after successful tests in the Midwest, They were developed by Dr. William G. Geer, research chemist, with the cooperation of others.

The overshoes lace over the forward edge of the wing. They are a thin layer of specially vulcanized rubber exuding continually a colorless oil. It is announced that the ice does not stick nor the oil "scrub off."

This slipperiness alone is insufficient and so the overshoes have a small hose underneath their striking edge. a slight pulsation of pump driven air in this hose breaks the ice as it forms on the wing edge.




