SUMMER NORMAL ENROLLMENT LARGE.

University Station, July 27th.—Registrar E. J. Matthews, of the University of Texas, has just completed an analysis of the enrollment in the summer school and summer normal which close Thursday of this week. The total registration is 1336, of which there are 45 who are counted twice, having registered in both summer normal and the summer school, making the net enrollment 1291. There are about one hundred more women than men enrolled. Four hundred and sixty of the summer school students have previously attended some regular session of the University; 162 have previously attended some other college; 121 have attended one of the state normals; and 105 have never attended any normal or college before.

488 of the students enrolling in the summer schools are already engaged in teaching; 137 are preparing to teach; and 233 are neither teachers nor preparing to teach. Of the 452 students enrolled in the summer school, 141 took entirely or chiefly second grade work; 128 of them took entirely or chiefly first grade work; 52 were studying subjects leading to permanent certificates; while 70 were interested in miscellaneous reviewing. 158 counties were represented by students in the summer school, and 126 by students in the summer normal.

The summer course for health officers enrolled 26, and was of but three weeks duration. No account is made in the enrollment of these students attending chemistry week or of those attending rural school week. The total net enrollment of the summer school and summer normal in 1914 was 1205, 86 less than the enrolment of 1915.
