OPEN LETTER TO BLANTON

Col. S. E. Waskom Justly Expects to Phases of Judge Blanton's "Platform."

Saragosa, Tex., July 1.
Hon. Thomas L. Blanton,
Abilene, Texas.

Dear Sir:—
I take this method of addressing you as the matter to which I call your attention is contained in your "Platform" of principles, etc.

Immediately after the Civil War the Federal Government passed a law levying a tax on the cotton raised by the South, of 3 cents a pound, aggregating about \$15 a bale, more or less, amounting to something like \$76,000,000.00. After collecting this tax from two crops, the law was repealed, for the reason that the law was illegal and discriminatory. At the time this tax was imposed, as the history of that period will disclose, a punitive hatred was measuring out to our South many afflictions, this one of them. I call your attention to this matter for the reason that a few days ago I received from you, literature setting out principles upon which you claimed the support of the voters of this congressional district to elect you to congress. Your ambition is laudable, and I regret that a duty I owe to the men who paid that infamous tax, many of whom are long since dead, but whose children and grandchildren are still living, and for these I protest at the course you propose to take in the disposal of this money, if collected.

As I construe the moral law one sin will close the gate of glory against a man. I see that a cloud of WITNESSES from your home town testify to your many virtues and ability. This is flattering and will augment public favor. There is no kind of GRAFT that you have failed to arraign in your platform. The damnable pork barrel system has almost assumed the character of a common law asset and congressmen do not hesitate to seek appropriations many times larger than should be granted. You have given this a merited rebuke and, as I ambled along your platform, I felt like Blanton had been taught in the school of virtue and justice, and that if Smith had to be beaten, a kind Providence had sent not only a defender of us poor, common people, but a messenger to take up the burden of an outraged nation. It would be strange that, if in 78 years, I had not been the subject of a too credulous disposition and this frailty was working to your credit when you said: "If elected to Congress I shall support the Tillman Bill to secure the return of the Southern Cotton Tax and apply the same to the support of the Confederate Veterans and their widows." This "plank" let the black cat out of the bag. You disavow being a politician. More than a score of men aspiring to Congress have used this same old rabbit foot to fool the people in the last 40 years, and that 76 millions of dollars still lies in the treasury of our Government, which long since should have been in the pockets of those from whom it was unjustly extorted. When you said this I felt rebuked for my growing faith in your aspirations. Black crepe hid your virtues and the Mephistophelian hand was revealed to rob innocent men and children of their rights. Your ambition had taken the place of righteousness when you conceived this usurpation that leads to the confiscation of the property of others, to those who are already provided for by the loving generosity of every Southern State.

Did you think when you conceived the idea of inserting this

ALL IN ORDER FOR PRIMARY

At Meeting of Democratic Executive Committee All Details are Arranged.

Pursuant to adjournment the Democratic Executive Committee of Reeves County met at the court house Monday, at 10 o'clock, a. m. with Chas. Tudor as chairman. Other members present were: M. M. Leeman, of Loving county, Tom Roberts of Toyah, W. W. Stewart of Balmorhea, T. J. McIlvain, of Crystal Water, W. R. Black of Saragosa, and R. N. Sewell from up the river.

The following judges of the election were appointed: Pecos, J. B. Davis at the court house; A. S. McChesney, at the fire house; Toyah, W. B. Collins; Balmorhea, V. E. Pruet; Saragosa, W. C. Holbert; Crystal Water, A. T. Bell; Porterville, Floyd Goodrich; Arno, Bird Henson.

The boxes at Orla and Barillo were cancelled. It was decided that delegates to the county convention should be selected by caucus or convention.

The committeemen are to be elected from each precinct by ballot at the primary election, blank space being on the tickets for this purpose.

It was decided to have a white man's primary strictly. All winning candidates must receive a majority vote; those not receiving it will be on the ticket in the second primary.

It was decided to leave off from the ticket all candidates who had not paid the dollar.

There was quite a number of outsiders present as well as nearly all of the candidates, and a most harmonious gathering was had.

(Continued From Page One)

plank that it was the best way of securing favor of congressmen coming from Northern states? If you did, you took counsel of your estimate of their honesty rather than of their conception of justice too long delayed. Your proposal would be negative. The men who must make restitution are the sons of the men we met on every battle field of the Civil War. The man who will plead our cause before the great American people must go to them armed with the facts of history. No kind of political ledgermain will ever secure our rights. Every court in this world today wants facts. Sentimentalism and rhetoric can win no fight when confronted with cold logic.

You belong to a great profession. Did you ever take appraisal of its growing appreciation of the truth, as well as the ethical standard it is cultivating for the ennobling of its character. When you introduced this Trojan horse to capture the innocent? In what school of jurisprudence did you learn it was right to take other folks' goods and give them to others without a just consideration? I love my old comrades and am glad that those of them who need care are so richly provided for; but, sir, I am not willing to divert a cent of other peoples' money without compensation.

Henry Clay said: "I would rather be right than president of the United States." Randolph, under solicitation, said: "We have millions for defense, but not a cent for tribute," and France had her answer.

When General Lee surrendered at Appomatox, he asked nothing for himself. His great heart was only moved for the ragged, footsore and hungry men who had followed him to the last. Grant, the victor, gave a token of his generosity in the permission to those brave Confederates to take their horses and go home and commence anew the battle to feed and clothe their families. There were the men all over the South that had waiting for them in the halls of our National Legislature the vindictive resources that were more cruel than war. Who will ever write a history of the reconstruction, so called? Every amendment to our Constitution, approved by the carpet-bag and negro legislators, had their birth in

this cotton tax? Do you propose to compromise just claims for the hope of securing a seat in Congress? Please refresh your memory by reverting to those gloomy days we suffered in our Southland—when Federal soldiers were quartered in every county town in the South. When the men who paid this tax were hailed before military satraps on charges preferred by ex-slaves or carpet-baggers, and which had little foundation except hatred.

At that time men took counsel of hate rather than discretion. War makes barbarians, and the vandals were making terms for our lives. It would have been no better were the South victorious.

I cannot see any difference in your proposal than that pursued by the National Government. Their act was nothing more than confiscation actuated by what their leaders claimed was punishment for the treason, and your purpose a cool, deliberate one to confiscate our property without a just respect for justice. The highwayman robs me with impunity because he defies all laws to gratify his passion for blood and avarice. He who professes friendship and then, under its cover, robs me, adds hypocrisy to the base motives of the highwayman. I see the names of men among those giving you their endorsement who are qualified to determine your qualifications for Congress. Having served with acceptiveness the position of District Judge should convince a layman that you could with easy discrimination mark out a conclusion that would determine the right and the wrong of this question, and I am forced to the conclusion, as set out in your position, that you were not the Judge Blanton vouched for by your neighbors, but the Hon. Mr. Blanton whose ambition was stirring him to secure a seat in Congress. It is no uncommon thing for such metaphors to transpire even among men. Great is the pity!

Should this protest awaken in your sensibilities a merited sense of justice I shall feel that I have contributed to rectify a contemplated outrage upon innocent victims who endured enough in their day without adding its continuance to their children.

Federal Inquiry on Railroad Strike? Faced by demands from the conductors, engineers, firemen and brakemen that would impose on the country an additional burden in transportation costs of \$100,000,000 a year, the railroads propose that this wage problem be settled by reference to an impartial Federal tribunal. With these employees, whose efficient service is acknowledged, the railroad have no differences that could not be considered fairly and decided justly by such a public body. Railroads Urge Public Inquiry and Arbitration. The formal proposal of the railroads to the employes for the settlement of the controversy is as follows: 'Our conferences have demonstrated that we cannot harmonize our differences of opinion and that eventually the matters in controversy must be passed upon by a fair and disinterested agency. Therefore, we propose that your proposals and the proposition of the railroads be disposed of by one or the other of the following methods: 1. Preferably by submission to the Interstate Commerce Commission, the only tribunal which, by reason of its accumulated information bearing on railway conditions and its control of the revenue of the railroads, is in a position to consider and protect the rights and equities of all the interests affected, and to provide additional revenue necessary to meet the added cost of operation in case your proposals are found by the Commission to be just and reasonable; or, in the event the Interstate Commerce Commission cannot, under existing laws, act in the premises, that we jointly request Congress to take such action as may be necessary to enable the Commission to consider and promptly dispose of the questions involved; 2. By arbitration in accordance with the provisions of the Federal law' (The Newlands Act). Leaders Refuse Offer and Take Strike Vote. Leaders of the train service brotherhoods, at the joint conference held in New York, June 1-15, refused the offer of the railroads to submit the issue to arbitration or Federal review, and the employes are now voting on the question whether authority shall be given these leaders to declare a nation-wide strike. The Interstate Commerce Commission is proposed by the railroads as the public body to which this issue ought to be referred for these reasons: No other body with such an intimate knowledge of railroad conditions has such an unquestioned position in the public confidence. The rates the railroads may charge the public for transportation are now largely fixed by the Government board. Out of every dollar received by the railroads from the public nearly one-half is paid directly to the employes as wages; and the money to pay increased wages can come from no other source than the rates paid by the public. The Interstate Commerce Commission, with its control over rates, is in a position to make a complete investigation and render such decision as would protect the interests of the railroad employes, the owners of the railroads, and the public. A Question For the Public to Decide. The railroads feel that they have no right to grant a wage preferment of \$100,000,000 a year to these employes, now highly paid and constituting only one-fifth of all the employes, without a clear mandate from a public tribunal that shall determine the merits of the case after a review of all the facts. The single issue before the country is whether this controversy is to be settled by an impartial Government inquiry or by industrial warfare. National Conference Committee of the Railways.
