

KEEP UP FIGHT ON WEEDS

Means Money in Farmer's Pocket if These Pests Are Not Allowed Chance to Spread.

Getting rid of grass, weeds and undergrowth about the farm is one of the best protective measures the farmer can use against crop-damaging insects the following year, says the department of agriculture. Weeds, matted grass, dead vegetation and brambles along fences, roadsides, margins of fields, banks of little streams or ditches, especially in irrigated territories, are the natural hibernating and breeding places of many destructive insects. This vegetation gives grasshoppers, chinch bugs and other insects most favorable conditions for reappearance in the spring and summer. Similarly, voluntary growths of wheat harbor the Hessian fly; while stray alfalfa plants in the fields and around them may be the source of the incursion of grasshoppers. The Hessian fly in the absence of volunteer wheat at a new use for the busy submarine in | times lays its eggs on the young crab grass which may spring up in the fall after a tract has been burned over. Late sowing cannot be expected to protect winter wheat from attack in spring if volunteer wheat has been permitted to grow up either in nearby fields or among the late-sown grass. Grasshoppers lay millions of eggs along the banks of canals and ditches in the western country. Chinch bugs hibernate in bunches of broom sedge, with many other destructive pests.



5. In cases where there is only one exhibition and no competition, the Judge shall only award one premium, which may be either first or second, in accordance with the merits of the animal exhibited.

6. The judge is required to pass not only on the merits of the animals in competition, but also on the age and soundness.

7. Judging will begin Thursday, September 21, at 10 a.m.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. All entries under this department will be subject to the rules and regulations printed under head of Poultry Department.

2. Entries must be on regular blanks furnished by the Secretary and accompanied by the amount of

entrance fee. 3. An entrance fee of 15c per bird will be charged on each entry whether entered for premium or for sale; an additional fee of 25c will be charged for each pen entry. Birds entered in the breeding pens can also be entered in the pair classes.

4. Entries will close Tuesday, September 19th. Exhibitors are requested to make entries as early as possible so that they may be sure of securing space.

5. All entries must be in place not later than 9 a. m., Tuesday, September 19. Coops for exhibition will be furnished by the Association.

6. All birds will be under the direct care of the Superintendent of this department and he shall have full authority in arranging and placing the coops.

7. Any poultry showing symptoms of disease will be excluded from exhibition and removed from the grounds.

8. The Superintendent in charge will be an experienced poultryman and will give the entries every care possible, but the Association will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur.

9. All entries must be properly banded and the band number entered on the entry blanks. All birds entered for exhibition found not banded will be banded by the Superintendent and a charge of 5c per bird assessed against the entry, to be paid by the exhibitor.

10. Ribbons will be placed in all classes, but pre-

miums will not be awarded where there are less than two entries in the class and the judge will be empowered to withhold a prize, where, in his opinion, the specimens are not of a sufficient merit.

11. The regular ribbons, Blue, Red, White, will denote first, second, third.

12. The term chick is defined as a male or female hatched during 1916. The term fowl is defined as a male or female hatched prior to 1916.

13. Awards for the best display shall be based on the following scale of points: Each first prize, 4 points; each second, 4 points; each third, 2 points; a display shall consist of not less than 8 birds; each bird shal count one point additional.

14. The premiums in this department are open to the competitors of the world. Judging will be governed by the American Standard of Perfection, and an experienced poultry judge will be secured to place the awards.
