In these beautiful trees Pecos has a possibility of embellishing the city with bowers and arcades of ornamental trees unexcelled anywhere. Their rapid growth, arriving at maturity in five years, their graceful foliage and lovely blooms, are things of joy and beauty seldom seen elsewhere. By planting preferably salt cedars, on each side of each of the cemented walks from main street (on streets running east and west) to the corporate limits a mile distant, about sixteen miles of the loveliest promenades in the west could be secured.

The shade and verdure would do a great deal in mitigation of the intense heat of midsummer.

Speaking of cedars, the one known as cypress cedar was first brought here by Mr. Geo. E. Briggs from California. This sprout, a mere twig, was the progenitor of the innumerable millions now common from El Paso to Abilene.

The first salt cedar was brought here by Mr. B. K. Erant about the year 1890, and planted in the yard of Mr. R. S. Johnson at the home now owned by Mr. L. W. Anderson.

Building By Friendship.

May Come To This

Joseph was the first conservator of food. He was also the first exponent of government control of food and supplies and prices. He was the Hoover of Egypt. He was Pharaoh's secretary of Agriculture. He foresaw the famine. He urged and enforced food conservation. He also kicked out the food speculators and established government storage plants. Then when famine came he supplied the people under a system of government distribution and at government prices. It saved the nation and protected the people from the robbery by food shysters. It may be that we will have to come to this in modern times. Government storage plant, and of storage plants under government control. Prices regulated by the cost of production, so that the producer and the distributor would be held to a margin of reasonable profits and the consumer saved from graft and extortion. Why not? Here are some suggestive facts: The people are paying from \$5 to \$10 a ton for coal. The government gets it at \$3. The newspapers are paying from 3 to 7 cents a pound for print paper. The government is getting it at 2 1-2 cents. The people are paying from \$7.50 to \$15 per pair for shoes. The government is getting the best army shoes made at \$4.73 a pair. The greed and graft of those controlling commodities of necessity may yet force a policy of general government control by which the government will become the purchasing and buying agent for the people.—The Texarkanian.
