Meet The Chieftains Monday



August Sales Tax Rebates Delivered

State Comptroller John Sharp has delivered a total of \$255.8 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,094 Texas cities and 118 counties. a 12.4 percent increase over the \$227.6 million allocated in August 1997.

The August payments include local sales taxes collected by monthly filers on June sales and by quarterly filers for April, May, and June and reported to the Comptroller in July.

Parmer County received \$28,848 compared to \$27,972 in the same period a year

The breakdown showed Bovina received \$3,511, Farwell, \$5,288, and Friona \$20,048. The amounts represented increases for Bovina (18.11%) and Farwell (61.8%), and a slight decrease for Friona (-7.74%).

The 1998 payments to date to the county total \$236,449, an 18.98% increase Just Missed!

IDLE HANDS ARE the devil's workshop. . .another one of those pithy maxims designed to make us feel guilty about ourselves. So we scurry about our leisure activities with the same frenzy that drives our working days, turning our favorite sports into weekend marathons of sun, sweat, and



strain, sore muscles and dirty laundry. It seems like we all feel that if we enjoy life too much, something must be wrong.

I am amazed at people who spend their spare time cycling, jet-skiing, para-sailing, four-wheeling, rock climbing, rapelling, mud bogging, hang gliding, bungee jumping, and just about anything else designed to cause bodily injury. I guess you could say that the Good Old Boy and I are not outdoorsy type people.

Once when we were younger, we let some friends talk us into going camping with them and it ranks as one of the worst experiences of my life. Sleeping on a skimpy one-inch foam "mattress" and sleeping bag, head pointing downhill, in a tent with lots of wildlife noises going on outside, is not my perception of a restful evening.

Badgers invaded our campground. You could hear them snapping and snarling at each other while they tried to gnaw their way into our food boxes. They have a horrible asthmatic breathing sound. On a previous occasion, I had seen the result of a badger vs boxer bull dog encounter at Bill's family farm home near Muleshoe. Not a pretty sight!

We heard them tip over the ice cream freezer and slurp up the melted cream left in the bottom. It was then that I realized there was just a thin layer of tent fabric between me and those bad-tempered, steel-clawed badgers just a few feet away. After the critters left to inspect and destroy other camps nearby, I laid awake listening to the coyotes howl for the rest of the night.

We Americans spend a lot of money getting our homes fixed up nice and comfortable with all the latest in expensive labor-saving devices, and then we try to "get away from it all" by going out into the wilderness to reside in the rough. The only purpose for this that I can figure out, is to make us appreciate what we have back at home.

The Good Old Boy and I sometimes try to get away in mid-August for a long weekend in the high country for a few days of R & R and S & S (rest and relax, snooze and snore), which we did last weekend. Folks here in the panhandle are fortunate to live just six hours or so from the mountain resort areas of New Mexico.

Our idea of roughing it is to rent or borrow someone's cabin up in the hills where we can sit on the front porch, watch the hummingbirds and spot an occasional deer. No phones, no newspapers, no television. Just the two of us, peace and quiet, a deck of cards, a couple of board games and plenty of food. Of course, about once each day we'd drive down to the settlement to check out the tourist traps, art galleries, antique shops, and try out the restaurants. Now that's my idea of some quality leisure time.

There are two old geezers down here at the newspaper office who think there is no way Friday night football games are going to happen unless they are out there with camera and note pad, snapping photos and keeping statistics. The problem is, these old guys have about two good eyes between the two of them and the highways of the Texas Panhandle will not be safe on Friday nights if either one of them is driving. 

allowing landowners to use a vertical purple stripe on a tree or post three to five feet above the ground was effective September 1, 1997. For the past year the stripes had to be accompanied by signs at every vehicular entry point explaining the significance of the purple paint.





Drip Irrigation Field Demonstration Is Set

Efficient water manage-ment is a necessity for the operation of a profitable irrigated farm in today's agricultural economy. Area producers interested in using drip irrigation to improve irrigation application efficiencies are invited to attend an August 27 field demonstration day sponsored by the High Plains Underground Water Con-servation District No. 1.

The field day will be from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the Ronnie Owens farm, located six miles east of Hereford on Highway 60 and one mile north on County Road E. Producers are invited to stop by at their convenience any time during the day for a one-on-one discussion of drip irrigation and other water conservation techniques.

The field demonstration day will focus on the installation and management of drip irrigation systems, according to High Plains Water District Assistant Manager Ken Carver.

"Drip irrigation is the slow, frequent application of small amounts of water to the soil area directly surrounding plant roots. Water losses caused by evaporation, deep percolation, and runoff are virtually eliminated. Using drip irrigation can improve water use efficiency by 30 to 40 percent when compared to conventional furrow irrigation," said Carver.



Every investor should understand and be willing to accept a certain level of risk, because history shows that the long-term direction of the stock market is up, even when we figure in the most serious periods of decline.

few facts that might help put market declines in perspective. Since 1900, the stock market has had 107 "moderate corrections" of 10 percent or more, 50 "severe corrections" of 15 percent or more and 29 "bear markets" of 20 percent or more.

It's clear that declines are part of being in the stock market. And, believe it or not, they actually can be beneficial by helping you see how solid your financial program is. They can reveal whether you have a financial plan that will stand the test of time and help you reach long-term goals.

Declines can cause unsettled investors to ask questions such as, "Should I hang in there or wait on the sidelines until it turns around?" But for people who have established a prudent, long-term financial program, market declines are of small concern. Seasoned investors even view them as an opportunity to add to sound invest-

ments at a bargain price.

The following chart illustrates the history of stock market declines. It may not alleviate your fear of risk, but remember what the pros say: Like the seasons, market declines are a natural part of the landscape.






