Some important changes in election laws are as follows:

Election officials and voters are warned that since the last election there have been important changes end came. in election laws. The first is that ONLY AMERICAN CITIZENS CAN VOTE. Other provisions are:

Not more than one person at time shall be permitted to occupy a booth. the law. The penalty for violation of these provisions is fixed in Article 258, R S. Any person convicted under this Article shall be punished by a fine of not less than Two Hundred nor more than Five Hundred Dollars, or to hard labor on the roads of the county in which the offense was committed for not less than 60 days nor more penalties.

BETTER SHIP LOADING HELPS OUR ALLIES

Economies of approximately 20 per cent in shipping weight and 50 per cent in shipping space have resulted from improved methods of packing merchandise for overseas practiced by the Quartermaster Department of the Army. This is the equivalent of 2,500 tons of space For United States Senator per month.

For the shipment of clothing and For Governor of Texas equipage, including such items as blankets, barrack bags, towels, shelter tents halves, bedding and other dry goods, in addition to wearing apparel, baling has been substituted for boxing, and the weight of the lumber saved. The bales average. 30x15x15 inches and weigh 90 lbs. They are bound with not less than four cold rolled unannealed steel bands. Burlap over heavy waterproof paper is used to cover the bales of the bales for handling.

Women are stevedores on the docks of France. There is a law to the effect that they shall not be required to carry packages weighing more than 70 pounds. Packages that are shipped to the American Expeditionary Forces are standardized so that they will not weigh more 70 pounds for one woman carrier or more than 140 pounds by two woman carriers. Men handle the heavier packages and the boxes that are used instead of bales.

The Quartermaster Corps recommends to manufacturers supplying the Army many similar economies in packing and shipping which will result in even more pronounced space For Railroad Commissioner and weight saving. Round cans and containers are urged. It is estimated that every inch saved through



Jose Campos says that if he had not been born a Mexican he thinks he would like to see a baseball game every year on his birthday. This is not very enthusiastic, to be sure, but it is hardly to be expected that a devotee of the great Mexican national sports of pelota and bull-fighting should become a baseball fan with only one application. Campos is the editor of The Excelsior, a daily newspaper published in Mexico City, and he recently visited New York with the other Mexican journalists. They witnessed a professional baseball for the first time and Mr. Campos afterwards wrote his impressions thuswise for the New York Herald:

A large game of baseball was celebrated this afternoon in the Polo arena in the city of the Bronx, a long ride by train from New York City. As is the custom in the United States of North America, many of the business houses closed for the afamusement of the very highest class ternoon so that employees might attend the spectacle. At least three million civilians, soldiers, and many women and children were present.

The pitcher for the New York City troupe was very valiant and charming. The baseball clothing was not as pretty as that worn by the toreador, but the players carry themselves well. A letter under date of June 23 was received this week by his mother from Eddie Kraus, who is now with the American Expeditionary Forces "somewhere in France," and which, in part, reads as follows:

"Dear Mother: I have not heard from you in about three months. don't know what is the reason I can't get a letter. We are camped in a building about 125 years old. I have heard that-(depleted) used these buildings for his soldiers.

"Wine is sure cheap here. Butter is worth 80 cents per pound; seventyfive cents a dozen for eggs. You see little kids about six or seven years old begging cigarettes from the soldiers and smoking. We landed in France last Saturday."

Eddie goes on to say that the sun seems to rise in the west and that he does not know where he is except that he is in France, and he has other personal matters which is of no interest to the public.

Discontinue the use of all samples or free promotion copies.

Discontinue giving copies to anybody except for office-working copies or where required by statute law in the case of official advertising. Discontinue giving free copies to

advertisers, except not more than one copy for checking purposes. Discontinue the arbitrary forcing of copies on newsdealers (i. e., com-

pelling them to buy more copies than they can legitimately sell in order to hold certain territory). Discontinue the buying back of papers at either wholesale or retail

selling price from dealers or agents in order to secure preferential representation. Discontinue the payment of salaries or commissions to agents, dealers or newsboys for the purpose of se-

curing the equivalent of return priv-Discontinue all free exchanges.

SPECIAL TAX FOR MAINTEN ANCE OF PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND FURNISHING FREE **TEXT BOOKS**

House Joint Resolution No. 27 Proposing and amendment to Art. 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by changing Sec. 3, providing for a thirtyfive cent tax levy for the maintenance of the public schools of Texas, and providing free text books in public schools of the State of Texas, and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 3, Arti cle 7, of the Constitution be so changed as to read as follows (creat- be as follows: ing a new Section 3):

Sec. 3. TAKING OF TESTIMONY IN CRIMINAL CASES

House Joint Resolution No. 2. To amend Section 10, Article 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for certain rights of accused persons in criminal posecutions, and the manner in which the case may be prosecuted, and providing for the procuring of the testimony of the witnesses for both defense and prosecu-

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section (10) of Article (1) of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended that the same will read and hereafter

Section 10. In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall have a speedy public trial by an impartial jury. He shall have the right to demand the nature and cause of the accusation against him and to have a copy thereof. He shall not be compelled to give evidence against himself and shall have the rifht of being heard by himself or counsel, or both, shall be confronted by the witnesses against him and shall have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, except that when the witness resides out of the State and the offense charged is a violation of any of the anti-trust laws of this State, the defendant and the State shall have the right to produce and have the evidence admitted by deposition, under such rules and laws as the Legislature may hereafter provide; and no person shall be held to answer for criminal offense, unless on an indictment of a grand jury, except in cases in which the punishment is by fine or imprisonment, otherwise than in the penitentiary, in cases of impeachment and in cases Office in First National Bank arising in the army or navy, or in the militia, when in actual service in time of war or public danger.

Cook the onion in the fat until tender, but not brown. Dissolve the soda in the milk and work into the cheese. Mix all other dry ingredients thoroughly with the bread crumbs. Blend peanut butter and onion with the cheese, and mix with them the bread crumb mixture. Form into flat cakes, dust with bread crumbs or cornmeal and fry a delicate brown in the fat in a hot frying pan.

COTTAGE CHEESE LOAF.

2 cups cottage cheese cup left-over cereal 1 cup wheatless bread crumbs tablespoons peanut butter cup chopped peanuts 1 teaspoon onion juice Pinch of sage Salt, cayenne and paprika

Cream the fat, sugar and egg yolks. Add the syrup, milk and vanilla and mix well. Add alternately the liquid and the dry ingredients sifted together. Add the flavoring and fold in the well-beaten egg whites. Lastly, add the raisins. Bake for one hour in a moderate oven.

FROZEN CUSTARD. 1 pint milk

1½ teaspoons cornstarch
1½ teaspoons cold milk or water cup corn syrup or sufficient maple syrup or honey for desired sweetening 11/2 teaspoons vanilla

teaspoon salt Scald the milk and add the cornstarch mixed with the cold milk or water. Cook the mixture over hot water for 15 minutes. Add the eggs, slightly beaten, and cook the mixture for 5 minutes. Add the corn syrup and the salt and stir the mix-ture well. Strain it and cool it. Add the vanilla and freeze the custard in the same way as any ice-cream.
