BETTER SHIP LOADING HELPS OUR ALLIES

Economies of approximately 20 per cent in shipping weight and 50 per cent in shipping space have resulted from improved methods of packing merchandise for overseas practiced by the Quartermaster Department of the Army.

For the shipment of clothing and equipage, including such items as blankets, barrack bags, towels, shelter tents halves, bedding and other dry goods, in addition to wearing apparel, baling has been substituted for boxing, and the weight of the lumber saved.

Women are stevedores on the docks of France. There is a law to the effect that they shall not be required to carry packages weighing more than 70 pounds.

The Quartermaster Corps recommends to manufacturers supplying the Army many similar economies in packing and shipping which will result in even more pronounced space and weight saving.

REHABILITATION OF OUR WOUNDED SOLDIERS

Perhaps none of the various uses to which the proceeds of the Liberty Loan are to be devoted appeals more strongly to the American people than the rehabilitation and reeducation of our wounded men to train and fit them for useful and gainful occupations, when by reason of loss of sight or limbs or other injuries they are rendered unable to pursue ordinary vocations, is a work in which every American has a heartfelt interest.

Compensation will be allowed them and family allowances will be paid their families as if they were in actual service while they are taking the training, and every method known to science will be used to restore our wounded men to health and usefulness.

This work has been delegated by Congress to the Board of Vocational Education. The Board publishes at Washington a monthly bulletin, dealing with its work, called the Vocational Summary, which will be sent free to anyone upon request.

METHOD OF HANDLING ALLOTMENTS CHANGED

The method of handling soldier's allotments and family allowances has been changed by amendments to the war risk insurance law, which became effective July 1. The result will be a more speedy delivery of Government checks to the dependent ones of soldiers and sailors.

If the enlisted man desires Government allowances for his dependent parents, grandparents, grandchildren, brothers and sisters, he may make voluntary allotments to them, limited to \$5 per month where allotment is made to wife and children and \$15 where no such allotment is made.

Beginning with July pay the War Risk Bureau will handle allotments only to support family allowances, and then only in amounts required by law to support such allowances.

(Note—H. J. R. No. 27 passed the House of Representatives by a two-thirds vote, yeas 108, nays 22; and passed the Senate by a two-thirds vote, yeas 23, nays 4.)

Constitutional Amendments

House Joint Resolution No. 27 Proposing and amendment to Art. 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by changing Sec. 3, providing for a thirty-five cent tax levy for the maintenance of the public schools of Texas, and providing free text books in public schools of the State of Texas, and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution be so changed as to read as follows (creating a new Section 3):

Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and a poll tax of one (\$1.00) dollar on every male inhabitant of this State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and, in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollar valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriations from the general funds of the State, and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general or special law without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation; and all such school district, whether created by general or special law, may embrace parts of two or more counties. And the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts, and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such district, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties. And the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the district, voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax, not to exceed in any one year fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1918, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for the levy of a special school tax for the maintenance of the public schools of the State and to provide free text books in the public schools of the State of Texas," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for the levy of a special school tax for the maintenance of the public schools of the State, and to provide free text books in the public schools of the State of Texas."

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Section 4. That the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars, or so

the amendment to Section 10, Article 1 of the Constitution. Section 4. The sum of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds of the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of publishing, proclamation and election. (Note.—H. J. R. No. 2 passed the House of Representatives by a two-thirds vote, yeas 123, nays 4; and passed the Senate with amendments, by a two-thirds vote, yeas 21, nays 4; and the House concurred in Senate amendments by a two-thirds vote yeas 123, nays 0.)

COTTAGE CHEESE MENUS.

Cottage cheese will cut down your meat bills if you will use it for that purpose. Note these suggestions from the United States Food Administration.

SUGAR IS SCARCE.

The work of the submarine off the Atlantic coast early in June resulted in a great loss of sugar from Cuba and Porto Rico. This means that we must be especially careful in our use of this important commodity.

DATE PUDDING.

3 tablespoons cornstarch, 2 cups milk, 2 cups corn or maple syrup, 12 seeded dates cut up small, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Mix the cornstarch with 1/4 cup milk.

SPICE CAKE

With part of the sugar replaced by corn syrup. 1/2 cup fat, 1/2 cup sugar, 3 eggs, 1 cup syrup, 1 cup milk, 1/2 cup flour, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, 1/2 teaspoon ginger, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1/2 teaspoon allspice, 3/4 cups barley flour, 1 cup raisins.

FROZEN CUSTARD.

1 pint milk, 1 1/2 teaspoons cornstarch, 1/4 teaspoon cold milk or water, 1 egg, 1 cup corn syrup or sufficient maple syrup or honey for desired sweetening, 1/4 teaspoon vanilla. Scald the milk and add the cornstarch mixed with the cold milk or water.

FROZEN APRICOTS.

1 quart can apricots, Water, 2 cups corn or other syrup. To the syrup from the apricots add the corn syrup and sufficient water to make 1 liquid, and freeze the mixture.
